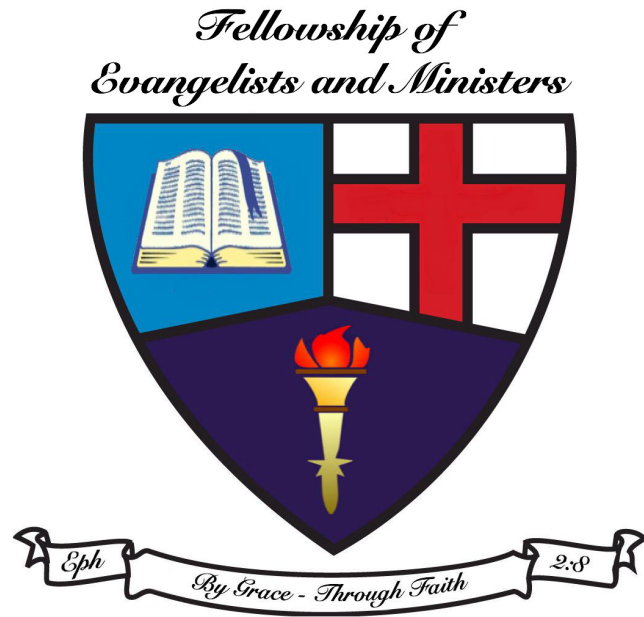
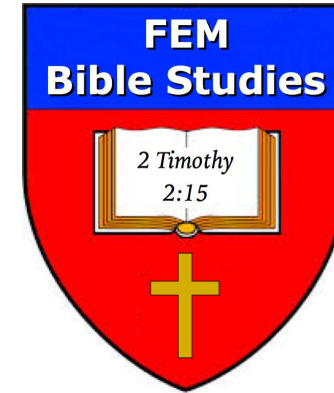

Introduction

You cannot write a good introduction until you know what the body of the paper is about. Consider writing the introductory section after you have completed the rest of the thesis, rather than before. Be sure to include a 'hook' at the beginning of the introduction. This is a statement of something sufficiently interesting to motivate your reader to read the rest of your work.

Conclusion

What is the strongest and most important statement that you can make from your observations? If you met the reader at a meeting six months from now, what do you want them to remember about your thesis? Include the broader implications of your results.

References

Cite all ideas, concepts, textual data that are not your own as footnotes on each page. Please use the small number e.g. 1,2,3 to identify footnotes. All references cited in the text must be listed.

Bibliography

After your conclusion, add, in alphabetical order, the sources you quote from, making use of the title, author, page, publisher and date format.

Section 3

The Inspiration and Canon of Scripture

1. Why is it important to have a proper understanding of the Doctrines of Inspiration and Inerrancy of the Bible?

2. Can you suggest reasons why some theologians claim that the Doctrine of Divine Inspiration might lead to a mechanical understanding of Scripture?

3. Each of the Gospels reveals the personality of the author. Additionally, they differ in details recorded. Explain how this can be true if they are truly inspired by God rather than the work of men.

4. There are some who state that the Old Testament does not have the same measure of Inspiration as the New Testament. How would you answer such a charge as this?
5. "Authority does not come from Earth but from Heaven" - discuss this in light of the Canon of Scripture.
6. Present an argument supporting the equal validity of the Canonicity for both Old and New Testaments.
7. Is the Apocrypha worthy of study for the Conservative Evangelical Christian? State your reasons for or against.

Section 4

The Doctrine of God

1. What do we mean when we state that God is a "Person"? Do you have a better way of expressing this to enquirers?
2. Write a short article on the links you see between the names and attributes of God.
3. (a) What does Holy Bible teach concerning the relationship between the Persons of the Godhead / Trinity?
(b) What are the special characteristics of each Person?
4. Theologians often use the word "Providence" instead of "God". Suggest reasons why this ought to be avoided when preaching and teaching God's Word.
5. Select two names of God; show their historical background and their relevance for the present-day believer.

Thesis

You are now required to submit a 20,000-word thesis. Your thesis must be typed not handwritten. It is advisable to make print a second copy of your work. Please discuss the subject of your thesis with your tutor before commencing.

Suggested structure for your thesis:

Title Page.

Title (including subtitle), author, institution, date.

Table of Contents.

List all headings and subheadings including page numbers.

Chapter headings and sub-headings if necessary.

Paragraphs should be double-spaced (as used in this study booklet).

1. Explain why the question of the Person of Christ is important to a proper understanding of Scripture.

2. Give an account of one evangelical theologian's view of Christ, and debate his conclusions.

3. From Scripture alone, prove that the Lord Jesus Christ is truly God.

4. What Scriptural evidence would you offer someone who believes the "Jesus Only" doctrine to reveal that his belief system is faulty?

Section 6

The Doctrine of the Holy Spirit

1. (a) What do you consider to be the Jesus' teaching concerning the Holy Spirit? (b) Do you think that there are any differences from, or additions to, what Jesus taught concerning the Spirit in i) Acts of the Apostles; ii) The Epistles?

2. (a) How far do you see the Holy Spirit at work in the Church today? (b) How do you think present activities in some churches compare with that of Apostolic times?

3. It is said that the Holy Spirit is the Executive Officer of the

Godhead / Trinity. Discuss this.

4. (a) How do you understand the phrase that speaks of the Lord Jesus Christ as "a man full of the Holy Spirit"? (b) Do you think this detracts anything from His Deity?

5. It has been suggested that the Holy Spirit is the neglected Member of the Trinity. (a) State whether you agree with this idea, and give your arguments as to how He might be accorded due recognition. (b) To what degree is it possible, if it is indeed possible, to over-emphasise the ministry of the Spirit?

Section 7

The Westminster Confession

1. (a) Outline the areas of conflict amongst evangelicals on the question of the Inspiration of Scripture. (b) Present the case from your own view.

2. (a) To what lengths should the theory of "accommodation" be carried? Give reasons for your view.

3. Read the chapters on Pagan (Infant) Baptism and Election in the Westminster Confession. Do you consider that there are Biblical grounds for the stand taken on these subjects? Provide Bible references reasons for or against each of these.

Section 8

Church History

1. What do we mean by the word "Church" in the phrase "The Church of Jesus Christ"?

2. What do you understand the words "Church History" to mean?

3. Where in Scripture do we find a record of the birth of the Church? Explain.

4. Please answer this four-point question:

a) How did the first persecution of the Church originate?

b) Who was the first martyr of the Church?

c) Where shall we find mention of the first Gentile Christian Community?

d) What do you know about the earliest Church council and why it met?

5. With regards to the evangelisation of the Gentiles, who were the two apostles with whom this great work was specially associated? Write a brief article on their ministry.

6. Some theologians teach that the apostolic age ceased in the first century. Argue either for or against this particular theory.

7. Answer the following two-part question.

a) Where do we find the first Apostles' Creed?

b) Briefly comment on each statement of the Apostles' Creed.

8. How many ordinances are ordained in the New Testament, and what are they?
