

DESCENDANTS OF JOHN SCOTT OF ROXBURY, MASSACHUSETTS

JOHN ¹ SCOTT, born about 1646-50, perhaps in America, probably died in Roxbury, Mass., between 1715 and 1722; married in Roxbury, 29 May 1672, Hannah Duncan, daughter of Samuel and Mary Duncan, born in Boston, Mass., 28 Apr. 1651, died before 1722, probably in Roxbury.

John Scott, the founder of the line of Scotts in America, with which this genealogy deals, was probably not born in New England, although there is a chance that he is identical with a John Scott, son of Benjamin and Margaret Scott, born in Cambridge, Mass., 2 July 1646, living in 1671. (See appendix, p. 323.) He was an inhabitant of Roxbury, Mass., before 1672, the first mention found of him being in his marriage record. On 5 May 1677, he was admitted to the covenant of Roxbury church. He served in King Philip's War in 1675-6 (Bodge, p. 162). In 1683, he was paid by the town for "warding". He served on the "Jury of Tryalls" in 1695, and in that same year he received two grants of land in Woodstock, Conn. On 11 Apr. 1705, "Mr." John Scott was made Constable in Roxbury and on the fourth of the following March he was made Surveyor of Highways. 18 Aug. 1712, Isaac Morris, of Roxbury, with Mary, his wife, sold to a number of "partners" amongst them John Scott, six acres of land in Roxbury, and 14 July 1715, John Scott with these same partners, sold the land to Rev. Ebenezer Thayer. There is no record of his or his wife's death, but they had evidently deceased

before 1722, for in that year, John ² Scott, youngest son of John ¹ Scott, made his Will and although unmarried, leaves no legacy to his father or mother as he would have been likely to do if they were still living. There is a chance that it was John ² Scott who was one of the "partners" in 1712 as he was then a man of twenty-four years of age, but it was more probably the senior John Scott, as it is unlikely that an unmarried man of twenty-four would be one of the church trustees as these partners evidently were. Of John Scott's ten children only one lived to marry and perpetuate the name.

JOSEPH ² SCOTT (John ¹), born in Roxbury, Mass., 27 Mar. 1682, was baptised in Dr. Eliot's church on 7 May 1682, died, probably in Sturbridge, after 1753; married (1), in Roxbury, 8 Feb. 1704-5, Sarah Davis, who died in Roxbury, without issue, 1 Jan. 1705-6. He married (2), in Roxbury, 17 May 1708, Hannah Prior, daughter of James and Susanna Prior, born in Boston, Mass., 1 Sept. 1687, death unknown.

Joseph Scott was a weaver. He lived in Roxbury until about 1717 when he removed to Brookline. On the 2 Mar. 1712–3, he petitioned the town of Roxbury, for permission to build a "pue" in the place where the boys had been sitting. He only remained in Brookline a short time and was again a resident of Roxbury in 1724. While living in Brookline, he evidently attended the West Parish church of Roxbury, as he had three children baptised there during those years. In Brookline, in 1717, "Mr. Joseph Scott" was appointed Hayward, in 1720, Surveyor of Highways, and in 1723, Constable. In Mar. 1723–4, he was living in Boston, but returned to Roxbury before the following March. Between April and November 1733, he removed to Dudley, Mass., having purchased land there in August of that year. He lived in Dudley ten years, when he removed to

Sturbridge, Mass. He is called "weaver", "yeoman", and "husbandman". The last mention found of him is when he gave land to his son Benjamin, in Sturbridge, in 1753.

Suffolk Deeds, 31:7. Joseph Davis, Jr., of Brookline, Mass., and Elizabeth his wife, for £226 sell to Joseph Scott of Roxbury, Mass., weaver, dwellinghouse, barn, and land, in Brookline, 5 Feb. 1716–17.

31:15. Joseph Scott of Roxbury, weaver, and Hannah his wife, mortgage for £100 to the Mass. Commissioners, their property in Brookline, 13 Feb. 1716-17.

43: 95. Joseph Scott of Roxbury, weaver, sells to Richard Child of Woodstock, land in Woodstock. Hannah, wife of Joseph Scott, releases her dower, 20 Jan. 1724.

47:55. Joseph Scott of Roxbury, sells land in Woodstock to Abigail Williams "widow-wife" of Joseph Williams, dec'd., 18 Apr. 1726.

47: 132. Samuel Scott of Roxbury, blacksmith, and Sarah his wife, for £30 sells to his father Joseph Scott, one-half piece of land, in that part of Roxbury commonly called Pond Plain, given to the said Samuel and his brother James Scott, now a minor, by their uncle John Scott, late of Roxbury, dec'd., 5 Mar. 1732-3.

47: 129. Joseph Scott of Boston, yeoman, sells to Francis Gatcomb of Boston, merchant, land in Roxbury, bounded on Pond Plain, Hannah, wife of Joseph, releases her dower, 7 Mar. 1732-3.

123: 157. Joseph Scott of Roxbury, husbandman, and Hannah his wife, sell Timothy Harris of Roxbury, estate in Brookline, 24 Apr. 1733.

56: 58. Joseph Scott of Roxbury, husbandman, and Hannah his wife, sell for £460, to Samuel Griffin of Roxbury, cordwainer, land in Roxbury, with dwelling-house, mill, etc., 28 Apr. 1733.

Worcester Deeds, 16: 25. Joseph Putney of Dudley, Mass., husbandman, sells to Joseph Scott of Roxbury, Mass., 100 acres of land in Dudley, 23 Aug. 1733. Mehetabel, wife of Joseph Putney, releases her dower.

Dudley Town Records. 16 Nov. 1733. "Voted that Mr. Joseph Scott's house be the place to meet upon the Sabbath."

13 Mar. 1734. "Voted that Capt. Edmunds and Mr. Joseph Scott be a committee to agree with such persons as the Country road goes through their land." "Voted, Joseph Scott, tything-man."

26 Jan. 1738-9. "Voted to Joseph Scott Sen. ye pewe adjoining Wm. Carter's."

30 Mar. 1739. "Voted. Joseph Scott sener, Constable", and the same in 1740.

4 Sept. 1744. The meeting considered, "if the town will give to Mr. Jonathan Newell et al., of that pew which Mr. Joseph Scott built in our meeting house", "It was so voted, 13 Sept. 1744."

"Sturbridge, 30 Jan. 1744-5." Receipt from Joseph Scott for money received from Jonathan and Benjamin Newell of Dudley, for a pew he built in Dudley Meeting house.

Worcester Deeds, 17: 152. Joseph Scott of Dudley, sells to Moses Marcy of Sturbridge, for £1200, 100 acres of land in Dudley, with mansion house, etc., which land he purchased of Joseph Putney. Hannah Scott releases her dower. Witnesses: Joseph Scott, Jr., and Thomas Chandler, 15 July 1743.

30: 38. Moses Marcy of Sturbridge, for £675, sells to Joseph Scott of Dudley, 2 tracts of land in Sturbridge, one containing 143 acres, and the other

37 acres, with a saw-mill, 15 July 1743.

38:23. Joseph Scott of Sturbridge, husbandman, declares that he is owner of 2 certain tracts of land in Sturbridge, and he grants them to Benjamin Scott of same town, for £200, 25 Dec. 1753. Witnesses: Joseph Scott, Jr., and Josiah Dwight.

3. JOHN ² SCOTT (John ¹), born in Roxbury, Mass., 9 July 1686,

died in Roxbury, about 1722, unmarried.

John Scott of Roxbury, Mass., weaver, made his Will, 4 Apr. 1722, proved 1 May 1722. He gives to friend, Thankful Dana, for her kindness, £10; to brother Joseph Scott's two oldest sons, Samuel Scott and James Scott, the residue; and makes brother Joseph Scott, executor. Inventory £103, 8d. (Suffolk Probate, 22:535.)

4. SAMUEL ³ SCOTT (Joseph ², John ¹), born in Roxbury, Mass., 14 Feb. 1708–9, date and place of death unknown, but probably in Warwick, Mass., or Winchester, N. H.; married in Roxbury, 4 Nov. 1730, SARAH CHAMBERLAIN, daughter of Jacob and Sarah (———) Chamberlain, born in Roxbury, 27 July 1712, date and place of death unknown.

Samuel Scott removed to Woodstock, Conn., about 1733, but soon joined his father in Dudley. There is no record of birth or baptism of several of his children but the town records show that he was living in Dudley by 1734, for in that year he was made field-driver there. In 1735, he was appointed fence-surveyor. Before 1745, he had become a resident of Oxford, and by 1755, of Charlton from which town he removed to the vicinity of Athol before the fall of 1756.

In 1754, he had purchased land in "Gardner's Canada", now Warwick, Mass., and was living there in 1757. The last mention found of him is as a land-owner in Warwick in 1761, he owning one lot of land and his son, Samuel Scott, Jr., owning a separate one. The

records of the town of Warwick state that 6 July 1757, "money allowed to fortify Mr. Samuel Scott's house", and in 1759, Mr. Joseph Mayo, Col. Joseph Williams and Mr. Samuel Scott, were a committee to choose the location of a grist-mill. No record has been found of his or his wife's death, but he may have removed about 1765 to Winchester, N. H., with his sons. The town records of Winchester having been burned, the record of his death may have perished.

Samuel Scott of Roxbury, blacksmith, and Sarah his wife for £30 received from their father Joseph Scott of Roxbury, yeoman, sell to him one-half a piece of land in Roxbury, in that part commonly called Pond Plain, given to said Samuel and to his brother James Scott, now a minor, by their uncle John Scott of Roxbury, dec'd. 5 Mar. 1732-3.

Worcester Deeds, 6:241. Samuel Scott of Dudley, blacksmith, sells land

in Dudley to Jacob Chamberlain of Roxbury, 28 Oct. 1735.

20:493. Samuel Scott of Oxford, Mass., husbandman, mortgages his homestead in Oxford to Joseph Atkins of Newbury, Mass., 1 Nov. 1745.

24:248. Samuel Scott of Oxford, gives a bond to Elizabeth Dudley of Roxbury, 29 Oct. 1748.

28: 365. Samuel Scott of Oxford, Mass., yeoman, sells several tracts of land in Oxford, with house and barn, to Jacob Chamberlain of Roxbury. Sarah Scott releases her dower, 28 June 1743.

28:366. Samuel Scott of Oxford, Mass., sells to Jacob Chamberlain of Roxbury, land in Oxford, Dec. 1745.

28: 522. Samuel Scott of Oxford, Mass., mortgages property in Oxford, to Obadiah Macintire of Oxford, 23 Apr. 1750. Satisfied 1751.

36: 510. Samuel Scott of Oxford, sells land in Oxford, 11 Aug. 1755.

38: 499. Obadiah Sabin obtains judgment against Samuel Scott of Charlton, for debt. He is awarded four and one-half acres of land, 7 Dec. 1756.

Hampshire County Deeds, 2:290. Thomas Dudley of Roxbury, sells to Samuel Scott of Charlton, three lots of land in "Roxbury Canada", sometimes called "Gardner's Canada", the said Samuel Scott to build three dwelling houses and to make the land fit for plowing, the three lots being 1/63 of Roxbury Canada. 10 Feb. 1756.

3: 277. Ebenezer Hammond of the County Gore, so-called, of Worcester Co., sells to Samuel Scott of Charlton, land in a new township called Gardner's Canada, lying East of Northfield, 1 June 1756.

5:473. John Harris of Brookline, Suffolk Co., sells to Samuel Scott of Oxford, land in Gardner's Canada, 8 Aug. 1754. Filed 28 Aug. 1764.

Z: 288. Samuel Scott of a new Township called Gardner's Canada, sells to Abraham Scott of the same place, land in Gardner's Canada, 18 Feb. 1757. Wit: Josiah Willard, Josiah Willard Jr.

Z: 289. Samuel Scott of a new Township called Gardner's Canada, sells to James Scott of the same place, one right or share in Gardner's Canada, 28 Feb. 1757. Wit: Josiah Willard, Josiah Willard Jr.

1:415. Samuel Scott of Roxbury Canada, sells to James Scott of Roxbury Canada, 50 acres of land in Roxbury Canada, 14 Apr. 1759. Wit: Abraham Scott, Samuel Scott Jr.

He sells to others also, before 1761, amongst them being a Philip Goss who was afterwards of Winchester, N. H.

5. HANNAH ³ SCOTT (Joseph ², John ¹), born in Roxbury, Mass., 30 Apr. 1711, died in 1799, s. p.; married (1), in Dudley, Mass., on 26 Dec. 1738, William Edmands, son of Joseph and Mary (Pratt) Edmands, born in Lynn, Mass., 14 Mar. 1716, died in Halifax, N. S., before Nov. 1750. She married (2), in Oxford, Mass., 21 Feb. 1755, Ephraim Brown of Spencer, son of Benjamin and Anna Brown, born in Weston, Mass., 8 Apr. 1714, died before 1790.

William Edmands, husbandman, bequeaths to wife Hannah Edmands, now residing in Cambridge in New England, his household goods. To Benjamin Wilson, all bills, bonds, etc., in any part of His Majesty's dominions and he to be executor. He also bequeaths £12 for nursing and funeral expenses and the rest to his wife. Wit: Philip Richardson and James Dudley Bradstreet. Proved 22 Aug.

1750. (Halifax, N. S., Wills.)

Benjamin Wilson, of Leicester, late resident in Halifax, N. S., executor of the last Will of William Edmands, late resident of Halifax, husbandman, deceased, empowers Hannah Edmands, late of Cambridge, Mass., and now of Oxford, widow of said deceased and residuary legatee, to be his attorney to handle said estate and acknowledges receipt of his legacy, 12 Nov. 1750. (Worcester Co., Mass., Probate, 3: 162.)

Worcester Deeds, 34:324. James Wilson of Spencer sells to Ephraim Brown of Weston, Mass., land in Spencer, Mehetabel Wilson, releases her dower, 31 Jan. 1754.

39:551. Ephraim Brown of Spencer sells to Eleazer Ball of Rutland, land in Spencer, Hannah Brown releases her dower, 29 Mar. 1758.

JOSEPH ³ SCOTT (Joseph ², John ¹), born in Roxbury, Mass., 5 Nov. 1716, died in Nova Scotia, 23 Jan. 1761; married in Dudley, Mass., 27 Dec. 1738, Mary Edmands, daughter of Joseph and Mary (Pratt) Edmands, born in Lynn, Mass., 30 Aug. 1719, died in Nova Scotia, probably in Halifax, after 1798. Joseph Scott evidently removed from Dudley to Sturbridge, with his father, but before 1753 he had left Sturbridge for Ware. He served in the French War as a Lieutenant and tradition states that he commanded a body of men called "Scott's Rangers" and that Daniel Knowlton was his Lieutenant. After Acadia was taken by the British, and the French inhabitants scattered in 1755, the Government sought to colonize again with New Englanders and offered large inducements in 1760 to the soldiers who had helped to conquer Canada. Joseph Scott was given a grant of land in Onslow, N. S., and went there to prepare for his family. He either died on the voyage or after his arrival for one of the items in his inventory is "pay for a man to go to Boston, to get (his) clothes". Administration on his estate was granted to his widow Mary Scott, in 1761. She had been admitted to the Ware church in 1754. She removed to Brookfield, probably to live with her eldest son Abijah, before 11 May 1762, as she was "warned" by the town on that date. After her marriage to Daniel Knowlton, she removed to Nova Scotia, where her sons had become grantees in the right of their father. She was living in Halifax in 1798, when she sold by her attorney, Joseph Scott, land in Onslow.

Joseph Scott appears on a muster-roll dated at Ware River Parish, sworn to at Worcester, 5 Jan. 1758, of Capt. Jacob Cummings' company, Col. Israel Williams' Regt., which marched to the relief of Fort William Henry in Aug. 1757. Rank, Lieutenant. Marched from Ware to Kinderhook, 200 miles. (Mass. Archives, Muster Rolls, 95: 542.)

Joseph Scott appears on a billeting account sworn to at Boston, 13 Oct. 1758, rendered by Luke Bliss for victualling men who were sent to the relief of Fort William Henry when besieged. In Capt. Cummings' company. Belonged to Ware River. (*Ibid.*, 95: 470.)

Worcester Deeds, 15:39. Edward Kitchen of Salem, Mass., and Freek his wife, sell to Joseph Scott, Jr., of Dudley, Mass., 100 acres of land in Oxford, Mass., Dec. 1740.

18:39. Joseph Scott, Jr., of Dudley, Mass., husbandman, sells to Joseph Edmands of Dudley, 100 acres of land in Dudley that he bought of Edward Kitchen, 13 Apr. 1743.

28: 49. Joseph Scott, Jr., of Sturbridge, husbandman, sells to Moses Holbrook of Oxford, for £400, land in Sturbridge, 20 Apr. 1747.

7. EBENEZER ³ SCOTT (Joseph ², John ¹), born in Brookline, Mass., baptised in West Roxbury Parish, 29 May 1719, died in Winchester, N. H., 26 Oct. 1804, "in eighty-seventh year"; married in Thompson, Conn., 11 Nov. 1741, Mary Shapley, daughter of David Shapley, baptised in Killingly, Conn., 19 May 1719, died in Winchester, N. H., 27 Dec. 1785, "aged sixty-seven".

Ebenezer Scott was a resident of Dudley at the time of his marriage. In Feb. 1752, Mary, wife of Ebenezer Scott, was admitted to the Dudley church. In 1758, 1759, and 1762, he was made Deer-reive in Dudley and in 1763 he was a tything-man. He did not leave Dudley when his father did but probably remained there until about 1769 when he removed to Winchester, N. H., being preceded there by his nephews, the sons of Samuel Scott, who had been living there for a number of years. "Nov. 15, 1769, Ebenezer Scott and Mary, his wife, from Dudley, received and admitted." (Winchester Church Records.) In 1776, he signed the Association Test in Winchester. No Will or administration of his has been found.

19:215. Ebenezer Scott of Winchester, gentleman, sells to Ezra Haly of Winchester, cordwainer, land in Winchester, 16 Aug. 1791.

SARAH ³ SCOTT (Joseph ², John ¹), born in Brookline, Mass., and baptised in West Roxbury Church, 23 Dec. 1722, died before 1785; marriage intention published at Dudley, Mass., 2 Feb. 1739–40 to Lieut. John Dresser, of Oxford, son of Richard and Mercy (Peabody) Dresser, baptised at Killingly, Conn., 27 Jan. 1717, died about March, 1789 at Dudley. He married (2) in Sturbridge, Mass., 17 Dec. 1785, Patience Holbrook, who died 12 Apr. 1811 in Sturbridge, aged eighty-six years.

He owned land in common with his son David and a division was made. The heirs who had received property from their father in his life time were sons, John, deceased; Asa; David; Isaac; and James Dresser; and daughters, Sarah, wife of John Coburn; Hannah Lyon, deceased; Abigail, wife of Elisha Thompson; Mary, wife of Aaron Dresser; Prudence, wife of Asa Chamberlain.

The widow Patience entered into agreement with the children and gave an acquittance. As a received the estate and was ordered to pay portions to the children of John Dresser, deceased, a double share; to Benjamin; David; James; Isaac; and Joseph Dresser; and to Abigail wife of Elisha Thompson; and the children of Hannah Lyon, deceased. (Worcester Co., Probate, 17516.)

Benjamin ³ Scott was a miller, and lived for many years in Sturbridge, Mass., removing to Fitzwilliam, N. H., about 1777. With his son, Barachiah, who accompanied him, he built and operated a sawmill in Fitzwilliam. His family were all established in homes of their own before 1790, for he appears in the Census with only himself and wife as members of his family. Three of his sons and one grandson became physicians. His death is recorded at Sturbridge and he may have been living there at the time, or he may have died when on a visit to that town. There is no Will or Administration of his recorded in either Worcester Co., Mass., or Cheshire Co., N. H.

He served in the Revolution as Sergeant of Capt. Timothy Parker's company of Minute-Men which marched on the Alarm of April 19, 1775. Service 14 days. (Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 915.)

The marriage of John Scott in Boston, Mass., proves that he returned to Roxbury or Boston. Probably he spent some time with his kin in Roxbury, and it is also probable that Mary Trott was a relative since her mother was a Chamberlain as was also his mother. That this John Scott was a son of Samuel cannot be doubted. He was made a grantee of the same towns as his brothers, Abraham, James, and Samuel, he removed to N. H. about the same time they did, his wife was a member of the Winchester Church with them, etc. His marriage is proven in a letter of Dr. Nathaniel Harvey Scott of Wolfeborough in 1916 in which he states that his grandfather, Jonathan Boyden Scott, once told him that his (J. B. S.'s) grandmother's name was Trott, and after a long search the marriage was found on the Trinity Church records.

After his marriage, he lived in Charlton, Mass., where his father was living but evidently attended church in Dudley as in Sept. 1757, Mary, wife of John Scott of Charlton, was admitted a member of that church. In 1759, they had removed to Dudley, for in that year John Scott and his wife Mary and their child, were warned to depart the town. In spite of the warning, which was a mere formality in many instances, they remained in Dudley until 1763, when they went to Richmond, N. H. He seems to have been the only son of Samuel, who did not go to Warwick with their father, but he was made a grantee with them of Claremont and Winchester, as well as of Richmond. He settled in the last town near the border line of Winchester in a part of Richmond that was afterwards annexed to Winchester.

The Winchester, N. H., Church Records state that, "May 15, 1768, Mary, wife of John Scott, being dismissed and recommended by the Church in Dudley, was accepted by this Church" and admitted to Full Communion.

John Scott served the town of Richmond as Selectman in 1766, Constable in 1767, and Tything-man in 1775. In 1776, he signed the Association Test in Richmond.

According to the Census of 1790, his family consisted of himself, one male below sixteen years and three females. His son John Scott, Jr., died just before the taking of the Census and the male under sixteen was probably his orphaned grandson, Jonathan Boyden Scott. It seems probable that his second wife Joanna was dead, and that the three females were his daughters, Elizabeth, Lona, and Susanna, who were all unmarried in 1790. This supposition is borne out by the fact that John Scott's third marriage, occurring when he was about seventy-four, was probably occasioned by the marriages of these daughters, which threatened to leave him alone. An examination of the tax lists of Richmond show him there just after this third marriage, but he doesn't appear in the list of 1810 nor later. The only Scott in the tax list of 1810, is Lemuel Scott. John, Jr., was dead, Luke had removed to Pennsylvania, and it is obvious that John Scott, Sr., had also deceased.

Abraham Scott was a farmer. He resided for awhile in Warwick, and was probably married while a resident there and had at least one of his children born there. Sometime in June or July 1759, he removed to Winchester, N. H., where he lived for the remainder of his life. He was a grantee of Claremont, N. H., with his brothers, John, James, and Samuel. He signed the Association Test in Winchester in 1776 and served at Ticonderoga. (Rev. Rolls, N. H., ii: 54.)

JAMES 4 SCOTT (Samuel 3, Joseph 2, John 1), born about 1735-6, killed at the Battle of White Plains, N. Y., 28 Oct. 1776; married about 1760, Rhoda Rockwood, daughter of Nathaniel and Margaret (Phipps) Rockwood, born in Winchester, N. H., died after 1791, probably in Bernardstown, Mass. Rhoda was a widow for fifteen years and then she married on the 23 Feb. 1791, in Winchester, Lieut. James 4 Scott removed with his father to Warwick, and was given land there by Samuel Scott. He lived for awhile in Barre, Mass., but removed to Winchester, N. H., in 1759. He served in the Revolution as Corporal at Winter Hill under Doolittle, 6 Oct. 1775. (Rev. Rolls, N. H., vol. 2, p. 746; Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 916.) He lost three children in the month of September, in 1776, and was killed himself the following month. Rhoda Scott appears in the Census of 1790 as living in Winchester, alone.

Samuel Scott went with his father to Warwick, Mass., receiving one of the three houselots granted the latter in that town. He was an original grantee of Claremont, N. H., with his brothers, John and James. He lived in Winchester, N. H., removing there about 1760 and remaining until after 1780. Before 1790, he had removed to Barre, then called "Wildersburg", Vt., and in the Census of that year he is recorded with a family consisting of three males above sixteen years, one male below sixteen, and two females. The deeds of settlement of his estate apparently show only the two sons, Samuel and Philip, but he may have had a younger son or a daughter in 1790. There is some reason for thinking that his wife's name may have been Goss. It was illegible to the copyist of the Winchester records and the original records have been burned. Abigail was baptised in Winchester with her son Samuel, 16 Aug. 1767.

Samuel Scott signed the Association Test in Winchester, in 1776. He served in the Revolution as Private in Capt. Samuel Wright's company, Col. Nichols' regiment, which marched from Winchester and joined the Northern Continental Army at Bennington and Stillwater, 23 July 1777. He also served in Col. Samuel Ashley's regiment at Ticonderoga. (N. H. Rolls, 2: 205, 4: 96.)

Isaac Scott removed first to Richmond but did not stay long as he was admitted to the church in Winchester, N. H., 12 Feb. 1769. He signed the Association Test in Winchester, in 1776. He evidently left Winchester, between 1784 and 1790. The Census of 1790 gives only one Isaac Scott in New Hampshire or Vermont. This was Isaac Scott of Salisbury, Vt., who had a family consisting of two males above sixteen years, and six females, which exactly suits Isaac 4 Scott. He was evidently a resident of that part of Salisbury which became Leicester. The deeds of the latter town show that Isaac Scott deeded land to Salmon Scott, 1 Dec. 1792 and on 4 July 1792, he deeded land to one Parker, and on 5 July to Webster. He was in Leicester when the town was organized on 29 Mar. 1786-7 and later was Surveyor of Highways. The town clerk of Leicester, who sent the above deed references in 1916, reported that that was all there was about him on the records. The Probate for this section was burned in 1850. He probably removed about the time he sold the land if the town clerk made an exhaustive search.

Joseph Scott removed with his mother and the family to Onslow, N. S., and became a man of prominence in the new settlement. He had seen military service before his removal to Nova Scotia. He appears on a roll of men enlisted for the reduction of Canada by Lieut. Knowlton, 24 Mar. 1760, his birthplace being given as Sturbridge and his age as nineteen years. His first child was born in Onslow but about 1767, he is supposed to have removed to Horton, King's Co., N. S., and later to have returned to Onslow. His children are recorded at Onslow as born in Horton, but the land records call him "of Onslow" in 1771 and 1776, so it seems probable that only two children were born in Horton and that he returned to Onslow

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before 1771, and that the births were carelessly entered. He removed to Truro before 1797. He was Sheriff of Colchester Co., for many years and in 1782 was "Deputy Provost Marshal of Halifax County", this being before the establishment of Colchester Co.

No Will or Administration has been found, since no record of his

death or where it occurred is known.

He removed to Onslow, N. S., with his mother and family. Before 1773, he had removed to Sackville and by 1798 was in Birch Cove. He settled finally in Halifax, where he presumably died. It is possible that he removed to New York City but, as in 1818 he would be

seventy-six years old, it seems more likely that he would not have started life in a new place and that it was a son Asa ⁵ who removed to New York, and that Asa ⁴ had died before 1818.

Ebenezer Scott signed the Association Test, in Winchester, in 1776. He served under Capt. John Houghton, Col. Baldwin's regiment, in 1776. He also fought at Ticonderoga. (Rev. Rolls, N. H., 1: 427, 2:55.)

In the Census of 1790, there is in Winchester, an Ebenezer Scott, with four males above sixteen, and four females in his family. It is probable that Ebenezer ⁴ Scott remained with his father, Ebenezer ³ Scott, and is listed as a member of his family with his wife and children. If the opposite was the case and the father was living with Ebenezer ⁴ Scott, then the Census return would read family of Ebenezer Scott, Jr. Ebenezer ³ had only two sons, one of whom, Abel, is in the Census as head of family. His daughters were all married before 1790. His son Ebenezer ⁴ did not marry until he was thirty-five and at the time of the Census had a family of three girls and his wife, evidently the four females in the Census, as his mother had died in 1785. This leaves two males in the report not accounted for, but they may have been helpers, or relatives of his wife.

Ebenezer Scott of Winchester, yeoman, made his Will, 24 Feb. 1820, proved 24 June 1820. He speaks of having made arrangement with Levi Fay for the life support of his wife Celia. He gives to Elijah Scott, son of daughter Fanny Lane; to Levi Fay and his wife, Lucretia, "my daughter"; to daughters, Molly Wheelock; Fanny Lane; Sally Felton; Luthida Follett. Daughter Sally Felton's husband to have no use or supervision of her share. Executor, Henry Pratt.

Levi Fay, with Henry Pratt and Asahel Jewell on his bond, appointed guardian of Elijah Scott, a minor under fourteen, illegitimate son of Fanny Lane, formerly of Winchester, but now of Swansey, 26 Apr. 1821. (Cheshire Co., Probate, S. 302; 317.)

Abel Scott was a farmer and lived in Winchester, N. H., all his life. He appears in the Census of 1790, with two males above sixteen years, two males below sixteen, and two females. The probability is that he had more children but as the records of Winchester are gone and there is no Will or Administration, it has been impossible to ascertain if they arrived at age or not, however as there is no mention of them in the deeds, they probably, if ever existing, died young.

He served in the Revolution as a private in Capt. Nehemiah Houghton's company, Col. Nichols' regiment, joining the Continental Army at West Point, 10 July 1780. (New Hampshire Rolls, iii, 153.) Cheshire Co., Deeds, 30: 343. Abel Scott of Winchester, husbandman, sells

Barachiah Scott removed with his father to Fitzwilliam, N. H., where he was associated with him in the milling industry. He served in the Revolution, as a private in Capt. Ebenezer Crafts' company, Col. Larned's regiment, which marched 20 Apr. 1775, in response to the Alarm of Apr. 19, 1775. (Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, 15: 64.)

In 1790, according to the Census, he was living in Fitzwilliam with a family consisting of himself, two sons below sixteen years and one female, his wife. After his decease she removed to Craftsbury, Vt., where her son Elijah had settled.

Alice Scott, widow, with Benjamin Bemis, physician, and Amasa Scott on her bond, all of Fitzwilliam, appointed administratrix of the estate of Barachiah Scott, late of Fitzwilliam, deceased, 14 Feb. 1810. (Cheshire Co., Probate, S. 172.)

Dr. Amasa Scott removed to Belchertown, Mass., before 1781 and began the practice of medicine. He served in the Revolution as a private in Col. Holman's regiment, of Massachusetts militia. was wounded by a musket ball in his right leg at the Battle of White Plains in 1776, and was pensioned therefor, on 4 Mar. 1795, until 16 May 1824. His pension papers state that he was a resident of Norwich, Vt., in 1823, having previously resided at Haverhill, N. H., and before that at Belchertown, Mass. (Rev. War Claims, S. File No. 19763.) He also served as a private in Capt. Gideon Stebbins' company, Fourth Hampshire Co. regiment, belonged on Alarm list. Company marched to Northampton, June 1782. Roll dated at Belchertown. (Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, 14:910.) He bought land in Belchertown, Mass., in 1781 and was still there in 1790 as the Census shows. He had in that year in his family two males above sixteen years, one below, and three females. About 1792, he removed to Haverhill, N. H.; succeeded Dr. Phelps whose house he bought and used as a private hospital until 1807, when he sold the estate. Between 1807 and 1815 he was evidently a resident of Peacham, Vt., as his daughters married in that town and his son was a resident there while away at college. It is probable that he went there when his brother, Dr. William Scott, removed to Craftsbury. He lived finally in Norwich, Vt., but may have lived across the river in Hanover for a short time. During his residence at Haverhill he served as moderator in 1801-2, and held other town offices.

He was evidently a skilful physician. During the spotted fever outbreak in 1815, when the physician of Warren had lost his life in the dreaded epidemic, the town sent to Hanover for Dr. Scott and it is recorded that he was more successful than all the other physicians in handling the disease, many of his patients recovering.

His wife's brother was Dr. Estes Howe, the first physician of Belchertown, and it is probable that Dr. Scott learned his profession of him.

Samuel Howe died in 1784 and Administration was granted to his widow Hannah. His personal property was divided to his children, Sylvanus; Estes; Moses; Benjamin Howe; Elizabeth, wife of Timothy Rice; Sarah, wife of Ezra Clark; Hannah, wife of Samuel Bradford, and Ann Howe, in March, 1785. On the 22 Apr. following, the real estate was divided and in the plan Ann is called "Ann Scott". May 28, 1793, Amasa Scott petitions for an accounting by the administrators, and states that his wife is an heir to the deceased.

Administration on the estate of Amasa Scott, late of Norwich, Vt., was granted to Constant Murdoch of Norwich, 3 June 1824, and the residue was distributed to the heirs (unnamed) 10 Dec. 1827. In the inventory are mentioned medical books and instruments.

Dr. Scott and his wife lie in the old cemetery at Norwich on the side of the mountain. Formerly in the center of the town it is now almost forgotten.

"In Memory Of Amasa Scott, Esq. who died May 16, 1824 aged 70 years.

All the days of my appointed time will I wait till my change comes."

"In Memory Of Mrs. Ann Scott wife of Amasa Scott, Esq. who died 5 of Aug. 1819 in the 57 year of her age."

In 1789 Nathan Cutler removed to Craftsbury, Vt., then called Mendon, with his third wife, Prudence (Scott) (Gerould) Cutler, and all their children, excepting little Mary Gerould, who was left at school in Sturbridge. They were the only family in town during the winter of 1789-90. Their nearest neighbor was Ashbel Shepard who lived six miles south in Greensboro. These two families made up the total population of what is now Orleans County during that win-Their grain was brought from Newbury on a sled, over fifty miles across snow from four to six feet deep. In the middle of the winter Mary Gerould came home. She was brought by Col. Joseph Scott, her uncle, as far as Ryegate, Vt., where she stopped for two weeks at the home of Squire Page. From there she was conveyed to the house of Deacon Elkins in Peacham, whose daughter Sabra had just married Mary's uncle, Dr. William Scott. After a short visit in Peacham, she went to Cabot Plain on horseback, and next morning reached home on a sled drawn by three young men, one of whom was her step-brother, Nathan Cutler. It was a big journey for a girl of thirteen years, in those days.

Benjamin Scott served in the Revolution. His name is found on a descriptive list of men raised in Worcester Co., to serve in the Continental Army; age twenty-four years; stature five feet eleven inches; complexion, light; occupation, blacksmith. Engaged for town of Charlton, 19 Apr. 1781 for term of three years.

Tradition says that Benjamin Scott's wife Anna, died and that he married a second wife and removed to New Jersey, where he had a

family.

- Col. Scott was one of Craftsbury's most influential citizens in the early days. He kept open house and many a family was assisted by him until they could establish themselves in the community. He was

always ready to help anything that would advance the interests of the town. He represented the town in the Vermont Legislature in 1794, 1797, 1798, 1815, 1817, 1825. He was judge of probate and held the office of Sheriff of Orleans Co., for fourteen years. He also served as a member of the Council of Censors for one year and was a member of the Constitutional Convention for two years.

Col. Scott served in the Revolution in Capt. Joseph Sibley's company, Col. Danforth Keyes' regiment, enlisted 8 July 1777, for six months, roll dated Providence, etc.; also, roll dated Sturbridge, 8 Dec. 1777; stationed at North Kingston; also from 1 Dec. 1777 to 3 Jan. 1778. (Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, 14: 923.)

He also served as a member of Capt. William Hutchins' company, in service of Vermont from 1 Mar. to 3 May 1779. (Vt. Revolutionary Rolls, 116.)

He also served in Capt. Benjamin Spaulding's company, Col. Moses Nichols' regiment, from 6 July to 20 Oct. 1780, as sergeant. (N. H. Revolutionary Rolls, iii: 159.)

He was granted a pension in 1832. He is always called "Colonel" Joseph Scott and probably rose to that office in the state militia after the war had ended. He is buried in his lot at North Craftsbury and lies surrounded by his family. The epitaphs of himself and his wife are as follows:

Dr. Perley Scott took an academic course at Leicester Academy and read medicine in the same town. He went to Craftsbury, Vt., in 1790, where he began to practice medicine. In 1794 he removed to Cabot Plain and in 1804 to Cabot Village. He was in active practice more than fifty years, serving in Cabot and the surrounding towns. During his long service, he made his calls on horseback but he never became too exhausted to respond to a request for his aid, whether from rich or poor.

Moses Tyler came to Richmond from Attleborough, Mass., in 1775. He was a justice of the peace and represented Richmond at the General Court for several years. He was a surveyor and conveyancer,

In his early life, Mr. Luke Scott was a drover as well as an Indian fighter. He removed to Knoxville, Tioga Co., Pa., in 1804, but a few years later settled at Clymer, where he died in 1828 on the homestead afterwards occupied by his son Rufus Scott. At the first call to fight the British in 1812 he responded and served his country well in that war, although there is no official record extant of his services.

Stephen Darling removed to Winchester, N. H., before 1790, as he was a resident there, according to the Census of that year, with a family consisting of himself and two females, one being his wife, Prudence, and the other probably his daughter Prudence. He removed from Winchester to Richmond, N. H., and lived on the farm Luke Scott had owned before his removal to Swanzey. In 1807, he sold his land in Richmond and removed to Pennsylvania, where his

daughters had settled. He appears in the Census of 1810, as a resident of Delmar Township, Tioga Co., Pa., with one male under ten years, one male over ten and under sixteen, and one female over ten and under sixteen, so it is evident that his wife had died. She probably died before he went to Pennsylvania. In the Census of 1820, he does not appear, and as tradition tells that his son Luke was left an orphan when a little boy, it is probable that he died shortly after 1810.

James Scott lived in Winchester all his life. He was a blacksmith and farmer. There is nothing to show whether his children by Eunice Lawrence ever lived with him or not, but they lived in New York where she did and he does not mention them in his Will, so presumably he arranged for them when he separated from their mother. There was, however, intercourse, between the children of the two wives, for a descendant of Elijah remembers William Humphrey Scott coming to visit them in New York when she was a tiny child.

James Scott of Winchester, gentleman, made his Will, 23 Sept. 1839. It was proved in April 1847. He bequeathed to son George Emerson Scott; sons Sylvester Scott; William Humphrey Scott; Roswell Hubbard Scott; and James Scott, Jr.; daughters, Hannah Huntley; Rhoda Robbins; Julia Scott; and Chloe Twichell; granddaughter Mary Ann Scott. He states that he has provided for son Lucius Scott. Residue to Sylvester Scott. Son, George Emerson Scott, to be executor.

Samuel Scott removed from Barre to Montpelier before 1800. He served under Capt. Timothy Hubbard, General Davis, in the War of 1812. His name appears on a roll of Plattsburg Volunteers made at Burlington, Vt., 10 Sept. 1814. Melicent Mack's elder sister Eunice, married Micaiah Ingham and removed to Berlin, Vt. She was living there in 1791 and had removed to Brookfield, Vt., by 1792. She had a son Alfred Ingham. It is probable that Samuel Scott met Melicent Mack while she was visiting her sister. Melicent spent the last of her life with her son Alfred and presumably died in Montpelier, aged.

It is said that he once wrote a love-letter to his financée in which he said, "I am burning some wood, to make some ashes to make salts to buy some things we need".

Samuel Fisher Archibald removed from Truro shortly after he was married to Olive Scott and settled in Musquodoboit, where he spent a long and useful life. At the time of his death in 1860, the *Morning Chronicle* published a long obituary of him, and in it said, "Few men have passed through life more creditably than Mr. Archibald". He was an Elder in the Presbyterian church and an honest, hospitable, generous man.

Ephraim Scott seems to have been the only one of Joseph Scott's grandchildren who returned to the United States. The exact date of his coming is not known but it was before 1789, for in June of that year he was married in Brookfield, and December he was made schoolmaster in Ware, receiving the following endorsement which is still in existence:

"This Certifies that Ephraim Scott of Ware appears to be a Person of Sober life and Conversation and as far as it has come to our Knowledge he is Possest with those Principles of Virtue & Morality as is injoined by Law for a School Master to be Possest with.

He continued to teach school in Ware, and the following certificates are treasured by his descendants:

After he ceased teaching he became a member of the school committee, in Ware and this receipt was recently given to his grandson, George Washington Scott, by a descendant of Phille Morse:

"Rec^d of Mes^{rs} Phille & Calvin Morse, twenty Six dollars fifty cents in full for their taxes committed to me for to collect for building a new Scool house in the first School District in the year 1808 I say Rec^d by me April 5th 1809 Ware

\$26.50 Eph^m Scott"

Capt. Scott was also a farmer and extensive land-owner. Retaining always his interest in school matters, he gave to the town of Ware a piece of real estate, to be used forever as a school lot. Owing to the burning of the records, the terms of the bequest are forgotten and the town has sold the lot. For a long time the statement of the terms was considered a tradition, but proof is in existence as in a deed from Capt. Scott later (recorded in the Hampshire County Registry) is the following clause, "reserving for the use of the first School District in said Ware for a School house lot and yard the same lot of ground that I the said Scott leased to said District for that purpose". His descendants have long known of this betrayal of his trust by the town of Ware, but have never chosen to take back the land.

Capt. Scott was early interested in military matters. It is very probable that he was a member of the military company of Ware for some time before he was commissioned lieutenant, but there is no extant record of this fact. He was commissioned by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, "Ensign" in the Fifth Regiment, First Brigade, Fourth Division of the Massachusetts Militia, 24 Aug. 1802; promoted "Lieutenant", 9 May 1806; promoted "Captain", 28 Aug. 1806. He served during the War of 1812-14 in Boston, Mass. The "Orderly Book of Capt. Ephraim Scott's Company of Infantry, May 1811", is still in existence and gives a good history of his activities in the War. When in 1814, the British appeared off Boston Harbor, Capt. Scott and a detachment consisting of Sergeant Breckenridge, a drummer and twenty-four privates went to the defence of Boston. Capt. Scott remained in command until 29 May 1815 when he received his discharge, being nearly fifty years of age. Breckenridge, his Sergeant, was asked once when Capt. Scott was first an officer and he replied, "I can't exactly tell but I believe he was Orderly Sergeant under Pontius Pilate". It is very probable that his service extended over at least thirty years of his life

Capt. Scott was also employed largely in contracting, apparently in building stone-wharves, etc. In 1811 he was in Richmond, Va., writing from there that he expected to return in August to Ware. He evidently did this but went back to Richmond, before March, 1812, accompanied by his son William, who died unmarried before

Capt. Scott deceased. From there he wrote home the following interesting letters:

Richmond Virginia June 30 1811.

Dear Son, we Rec^d your letter bearing date the 13th instant which informed us that you were all well &c and the further news that you therein wrote was very agreeable to us though we were very much put to it to Read it (there appeared to be some Information about things more than you ever sent us before (I have wrote a letter to You which I think likely you may have had before now) there was a Direction therein for you to go to South Hadley & call on Capt. A. Cooly for a Hundred & fifty dollars which he agreed to pay you for me a part of which at least 50\$ is to be paid to Gideon Shaw in order to enable him to come to Richmond (the other letter contains Directions therefore I shall not write them in this) tell him, Shaw, it is said to be the best time in Richmond for buiseness that ever was. If he should come he had better come Soon as Possable, there is jobbing plenty giting stone down for paithing Streets, men make five or 10\$ per day &c. Your uncle Morse's Factory, tell him If I should live to or at Home, I should likely be as forward in promoting the Publick good as my abilitys would admit of. If the people would subscribe two thousand dollars & no other man would go on with it perhaps I might myself. (we expect to git through with the heft of our Jobb in 3 or 4 weeks. We are glad to hear about Your fence & improvement on the ould farm, that is the surest way for a lively hood. I expect to be home Sometime in Agust (I did not expect that you would pay Jos. Field Esq. & Upham but maybe you can help them a little out of this last 150\$ after Gd Shaw is paid 50 or thereabouts &c.

If we read you letter Right you stated that you had paid Fields & Upham (I can not think how) I wish you to send me an explanation to that, have they attached property.

I have Rec^d a letter from Gid Shaw Dated June 27 at Ware he informing me that he is all Redy to come on only is waiting for a letter from me. (You had better see him as I have sent to you to furnish him with fifty dollars expense Money. You git it of Capt. Cooly, tell him it is all I can let him have till he gits here—tell him in answer to what he wrote about the Black people that it is a buisness that I should have no hand in (tell him the household furniture which he spoke for is Redy for Him) you will see him amediately after you Receive this letter. we continue to (be) tolerbale well all of us &c, July 7, Sabath day. E. Scott.

The first two sides were wrote last Sabath.

N. B. The weather is Said to be the warmest here that has ben for many years our white men can not work so well as the black now but I shall git done the heft Soon. I wish you to write how you come on with G. Shaw & when he sets out for Richmond—& how you paid Fields and Upham.

Richmond Virginia, Mar. 1, 1812.

I now Sit out to inform You that wee all arived here on thursdy the 27th of February all the way by land excepting Sixteen Miles by water, horse & all that was from New York to Elizabeth Town the first part of the Jorney went hard with me after a few days my coald seemed to brake & I razed moast beyond Discription—I was able to travel with the best of them the latter

part of the Jorney-My cough is pritty much done-we Traveled fifty fifty four miles one day—the mare Caried all baggage & one man all the way & Stood it well. John Hoar & David Lemon are to work for Mr. Cooly aboating through the Locks-William is tending Stoar near the Locks where I believe he will meet with good incouragement (I am about to work a few negroas, we have many aplications for buisness-I think I shall have no loss about the Locks—the Tail race is agoing to be continued no grate to compleate. I have seen the Directors they appear to be good natured about the Locks-I expect Capt. Cooly will come here in three or four weeks then the business will be settled somehow. I hope to git home If I live before having You must work it along. I think if you have a chance you had better Sell a pair or two of them three Year ould Steers to help git along—be Sure not to sell your Selves Short of Grain it will be verey Scarce & dear (About April or May I expect to send you money to pay that Lieut. Paige note, Warren Brown, some to Esq^r Field or others. If the Blessins of God should continue (let us Shew ourSelves men) To fear God & Keep his Comandments is our duty, remember. You write to me as soon as You Receive this, let us know (how) you come on. I am affectionately Yours in haist,

Richmond, March 1, 1812.

I now put my pen to paper to Informe You of my aRivall at Richmond we arived on the 27 of Feb all In Good health. I was verry sorry to leave my school In Ware But I hope it was for the Best I have Entered Into tending Store where there is a grate Deal of Buisness don Both wholesale and Retail I had an opportunity about as soon as got to Richmond which I opined to be Lucky for me but I do not (know) whether I shal continue in the store through the summer or not but you will no In my visit to you. father Is aBout to Commence In stone work here in Richmond. Buisness I belive Is a gooning to be as good as Ever it was In Richmond & as to the fires here they have been trouble. In this not onely the Theatre but a Large number of houses and Stores, In the Neighborhood where we used to live have been consumed with fire the house where Mr. Cooly Borded (Illegible line) your father boards there and the Rest of the Company only Myself I board with the gentleman that I Live with but I must say that it was a very pleasing thing to me to cum by Land, we had a fine vue of the Country till we got to Baltimore then we had a Bad time giting to Richmond the commodations were so bad I thought we hardly should make through but thank God we got safe through & give my Best Regards to all whome may take the pain to Enquire I should take grate pleashure in Recd a letter from any of them & fail not to Right as soon as you rec^d this. Yours W^m. Scott. To E. Scott, Ware.

These two letters are written on the same sheet of foolscap paper and addressed on the outside, being sealed with old-fashioned wafers.

On the 15 May 1818, Ephraim Scott, Joshua Lazell, Ephraim Scott, Jr., all of Ware, and John Ainsworth, of Brookfield, entered into an agreement with the Boston and Roxbury Mill Corporation, "to split and prepare in a suitable manner, rocks and stones from the Sumner ledge on the Dedham turnpike in said Roxbury", the stone

to be used to make a sea-wall. On the 3 May preceding, Ephraim Scott, Jr., wrote from Roxbury to his father in Ware, and said, "I come to Roxbury & begun with A. D. Williams on 23 Apl to work on his farm". Ellis Coney Scott was at this time in Boston and the letter shows that they are expecting their father to join them. Whether he went to Roxbury or not, there is nothing to show but if so, he could not have remained there very long because the next year on the 14 June 1819, he wrote to Ephraim, Jr., then in Ware, from Plymouth, Montgomery Co., Pa., and said in his letter, "We are Situated among the friend kwakers who are a people of good morrals & use no ardent Sperets", and adds "direct your letter to the Philadelphia Post Office to the Care of Capt. Thomas Durkee in that case we Shall git them immediately". The letter shows that he is digging a canal but has not yet begun to blast. On this same sheet of paper is a letter from Ellis Coney Scott showing he was with his father on this work which, he states, "is very hard I think the hardest that ever was".

Molly Coney, Capt. Scott's wife, left a sweet and fragrant memory that persists to the present day. Many of the treasured possessions of the family were lost in a fire but her sampler has been preserved and now belongs to her great-granddaughter. It is beautifully worked and is inscribed:

Molley Coney is my name,
New England is my station,
Stoughtonham is my dwelling place
And Christ is my salvation.
I was born in July 20, 1758 and in November
1773 I wrought this with my needle.

About 1824, Capt. Scott removed from Ware to Belchertown, where he spent the remainder of his life. The following anecdote of him in his latter days is very characteristic. He was attending a prayer meeting in Belchertown. The usual invitation was given for those who desired the prayers of the congregation to arise. For a while no one moved and then Capt. Scott rose in his pew, and standing there said, "The prayers of the righteous avail much, but the prayers of the wicked are an abomination to the Lord, so", added Capt. Scott, "if there is a thoroughly righteous man here, I would like to have him rise and pray for me". But no one arose.

He drew up a Will but it was never proved and administration on his estate was granted to Myron Lawrence, 2 Nov. 1841. The Will

reads:

I, Ephraim Scott of Belchertown, in the County of Hampshire and Commonwealth of Mass. co(n)si(d)ering the uncertanty of this mortal life and being of Sound mind memory Blessed Almighty God for the same do make and Publish this my last Will & Testament in manner as follows (that is to say)

first after the payment of my just Debts—I do give & bequeath my beloved wife an honorable Supoart to be had among her four sons if thay shoose to keep her & She is willing to Stay with Some one of them-If Not, then I order that my Extr. cause to be paid out of my estate a reasonable Sum for her Supoart during her mortal life. I allso give & Bequeath unto my four Sons, Viz. Ephraim Scott Junior, Ellis C. Scott, George W. Scott, Alexander M. Scott one hundred dollars Each of them to be paid five years after my Decease without Interest on the same—Allso I give & Bequeath unto Ruth Chamberlain or Upton, twenty dollars, to Her son Tho: Jefferson Chamberlain, thirty dollars, to Stephen Chamberlain her son ten dollars out of my estate, five years after my Decease without interest. Then what may Remain of my estate is to be eaqually Devided among the abovementioned Sons of mine or in that proportion all there is of mine left and I hereby appoint George W. Scott, Sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testament and hereby Revoking all former wills by me made—In witness wherof I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal the third of March in the year of our Lord, Eighteen Hundred and twenty-Eight. Signed Sealed Published and declared by the abovenamed.

Capt. Ephraim Scott and Molly Coney sleep side by side on a sunny slope in the Ware Graveyard. Their gravestone bears the following inscription of which the verse was composed by Captain Scott, himself:

CAPT. EPHRAIM SCOTT died Aug. 12, 1841 Aged 75 Mrs. Molly his wife died Feb. 11 1841 Aged 82.

Farewell vain world we have had enough of thee And now we are careless what thou sayest of us; Thy smiles we caught not nor thy frowns we fear. Our cares are past, our heads lie quiet here. What thou seest amiss be sure avoid, Search thine own heart and you will be well employed.

He was treasurer of the town from 1861 to 1870 and county commissioner from 1860 to 1862. He was a sincere church member and rarely missed attendance at the services of the Bethany Church.

Polly Scott was taken by her mother to Vermont and tradition tells that she never saw her brothers but once again. Jonathan Blood was a farmer, and had a large farm in Putney, Vt. About 1835, his farm was burned, all buildings with one hundred cows, grain, fodder, farming tools, etc., were a total loss, only the milk house remained standing. He left Putney and settled in New York, but brooded over his loss so much that he finally became mentally ill. He was obsessed with the idea that he would have to go to the poorhouse, and that his wife might give away her string of gold beads, so he hid them, together with several hundred dollars that they had succeeded in saving, so securely that they were never found. About 1845, he became so despondent that he hung himself

The picture was taken together; each has on a cap with a Bible in her lap. Grandma F. has on her gold beads, but Grandma B.'s are missing".

Jonathan Boyden Scott's father died when he was three years old and, his mother having married again, he was left to the care of his father's relatives. He had a very unhappy childhood. Shortly after his marriage, he removed to Livermore, Me., where he lost two little girls in a children's epidemic. He returned to Richmond, N. H., and from there went to Dalton, N. H., presumably before 1823 as his youngest child was born in Dalton. He settled in that part of Dalton, now called "Scott's Station" where he had a farm. This farm went to his only son, Nathaniel P. Scott, who lived on it his entire life.

Ephraim 6 Scott removed from Ware to Belchertown with his father in 1824. After the birth of two children there, he removed to Fredonia, N. Y., where his fifth child was born. From Fredonia, the family went West but the records sent by the descendants of the daughter, Ann Maria, state that she was born in Lowell, Mass., so it is probable that the family lived there for a short time. On the first of November in 1839, Ephraim Scott died and was followed on the twenty-eighth of the same month by his eldest son, William Coney Scott, then a boy of fourteen. The loss of husband and son in that wild country, far from her home, made life very hard for his wife and after April 1840, she returned to Belchertown, Mass., with her family and there the children grew up. Later the family returned to the West, this time to Illinois, where Lydia (Sherman) Scott had cousins by the name of Lazell. Lydia was buried in Princeville, and her son, George Washington Scott, in after years, had his father's body brought to Princeville and reinterred beside his mother.

Dear Brothers & Father.

I take this opportunity to inform you that we are all well, hoping these will find you in the same choice blessing bestowed on the human family. I rec'd your letter Thursday Baring date 15th Feb. stating death of one who first gave me existance, one who watched over my childhood and who reared with much anxiety her children with her parental affections and Motherly Care till all were advanced to manhood and became on this wide world actors for themselves and separated far and wide apart, twice has been called to the bereftment of her two oldest offsprings in a distant clime, without connections of friends and has gone never to return, has sustained all the losses and crosses of this Life which astonishes me when I think of what that woman has gone through and lived to see over 80 years of Pilgramage here on earth. Oh, it is

Mother who has paid the Last debt of nature gone never to return, that hand which is mighty to save to the Last can support in every trial and distress here and take to himself in the Last struggle, to himself in the Everlasting realms of Bliss.

Your mother's death gave me quite a shock. I had some thoughts that I see her this summer but Death has closed the scene nevermore to meet till the last trump shall sound come to Judgement.

You wrote her confinement to 2 weeks which (is) short but her Last hours very severe though the all killing conqueror was hard to discourage yet as the Spirit went to God who gave it as we have all hopes to be there and meet its God. In Peace to sing songs of Praise forevermore.—

To my father

The Partner of your life has left you alone & quit this world in Peace, shortly your turn will come, at the most that you will be called upon to pay the Last Debt of Nature and in another world appear, be prepared to meet your god, not like (ly) I shall see you again in this world and perhaps not another letter, the time is short at the most, be Patient and bear your affliction with resignation, the will of our father which is in Heaven be done. so I must bid Farewell.

Give respects to cousin Claricy Andrews for her care she took of my Mother in her Last sickness. . . . Likewise Dorcas who was in the Last dieing moments of Mother which was a great satisfaction. . . . I had not heard of uncle Eben's death before, I was going out there the day I recd your letter. I have not heard from Lydia since last Spring till now. . . . Our babes are very worresome and quite a task to take care of them but they will soon be large and less care, I hope to take care to bring them up but must take it as it comes. I want to see you much your home will now be lonesome. . . Your brother Ellis C. Scott.

As E. has left part of the sheet vacant I thought I would write you a few lines as I feell to sympathize with you in your present afflictions in the loss of our Dear Mother altho I never lost a parent but Dear Brothers and Sisters I have had to part with by death and I find that death makes a very lonesome house let its victim be ever so young but a dear Parent how great the loss and how heavy the stroke I think that you must be very lonely indeed now but nearest and dearest friends must part as death is in our land calling our friends one after another to the cold and silent tomb we see there is no way of getting away from it neither is there any respect of persons with God he takes those of our friends he sees fit and let us remember that we must shortly die and how soon we know not but I hope we shall all be prepared to go when we are called for and have our peace made with God that we may all as a family meet in heaven where parting will be no more I would therefore recommend you one and all to that Dear Saviour who died for us and who can bind up the broken hearted, put your trust in him Dear Friends and he will support you in your present affliction and remember that your loss may be her eternal gain I hope it may be a sanctified affliction to us all and enable us to put our trust in that friend that sticketh closer than a Brother and who is able to carry us through all our troubles and afflictions that we are called to pass through here and finally save us in his kingdom is the sincere wish of your friend S. S.

But I must tell you a little about our dear babes and close, they are very smart indeed they are six months old the last day of Feb. we call them George Washington and Susan Coney I wish our Dear Mother could have seen them before she died she would have been delighted with them, they are as playful as little lambs we think a great deal of them my health is not very good but comfortable, the rest are well and we all unite in sending love to our dear friends and sister Dorcas with the rest I too would thank her for kindness to our dear Mother in her last sickness and wish much health and prosperity I should like very much to see you all and hope you will make it convenient to come out this way as I think you would like the country very much, but I must close, from your sister,

Sophia Scott.

It is probable that they were living in Saybrook, Pa., when this letter was written.

On April 19, 1840, Ellis C. Scott wrote to his "Dear Brothers and Parents" a long letter. They apparently are all much worried over Lydia, the widow of Ephraim Scott, Jr., who died in 1839. He says. "I should have had a letter from Lydia but have not had any nor don't know whether I shall. I wrote to her when I wrote to you requesting her to write as soon as they got the letter, but nobody knows what will become of them, their situation is very bad no doubt but they are used to adversity to the extreme . . . the God that made them will protect them, if you have had a letter I wish you would write, the Portland Sally meant is 130 miles up the Lake from here then they are 130 miles south from that place I wrote to them where uncle Ebenezer Shearman lived and if she wanted to go East, she could get help but the ride is to great I think to go Back, that is all I know. . . . I am now with Father Doolittle if you get a letter from Lydia you had better write her to leave that part before they all die off". Sophia writes again on the same sheet, a long letter and in it she says, "It has been a long time since I have heard from any of you till since my Dear E. has returned this way and I can tell you that I am very glad to hear from you once more. I was very glad to hear once more from our dear Lydia to know where she was and that she was well but feel as though she had her troubles . . . " and in a postscript she writes," Dear sister

Dorcas. It gave me much pleasure to hear once more from you and to know that you are with our aged Parents . . . please accept my love and write soon, Sophia Scott".


In his early life, Mr. Scott lived for a number of years in Belchertown, Mass., but in 1853, when twenty-one years of age, he went west to Illinois and settled in Peoria County, where he purchased large tracts of land and engaged in farming. For ten years he continued in agriculture and then, in the Spring of 1863, he removed to Wyoming, Ill., and became interested in the mercantile business with John Wrigley. His untiring industry and fine executive ability soon brought him a deserved success, and in 1870 he established the banking house of Scott & Wrigley which became one of the leading financial institutions of that part of Illinois.

In a letter to his daughter, Harriett, dated 1 Feb. 1892, Mr. Scott wrote, "Just 29 years ago today, I came to Wyoming. Was in the mercantile business 7 years; 22 years ago today I went into the banking business; 39 years ago about this time of the year I left Massachusetts and started for Peoria, Ill., and landed in Peoria 39

years ago on the 18 day of next March".

Mr. Scott was married in 1858 to Mary Catherine, daughter of Enoch Cox, at her father's home in Essex Township. Mr. Cox had formerly resided in Londonderry, Ohio, but removed in 1840, when his daughter was only three years old, to Stark County, Illinois and finally settled on the farm where she was married. Both he and his wife, Sarah Drummond, came from Quaker stock whose sturdy characteristics and gentleness of heart descended to their daughter, Mary Catherine. During Mr. Scott's successive advancements in the business world and the cares and trials such progress necessarily entails, her life and personality were his refuge and comfort. They lived together for fifty-three years, surrounded by the love of children and grandchildren. At the time of their golden wedding anniversary the family wished to mark the day by appropriate ceremonies and rejoicings but the delicate health of Mrs. Scott prevented anything more than a family dinner. It is interesting to note that both their best man and bridesmaid were also living. Mr. Scott was the first to pass away, however, and as so often is the case, she survived him only a few months. For a number of years before her death she had been an invalid bearing her sufferings with uncomplaining courage. The worth to the community of her more than seventy years of life in it, was testified to by the loving sorrow of her neighbors, friends, and kindred when finally she fell asleep.

Mr. Scott was educated at Millbury Academy, Mass., and always took an active interest in school matters. He was a member of the school board in Wyoming for sixteen years. In March, 1892, he joined the Wyoming Congregational Church, and was an active member at the time of his decease. At the age of twenty-four, he became a Mason, and rose to the thirty-second degree in that order. He was a charter-member of Wyoming Chapter, No. 133, Royal Arch Masons, a member of the Knights Templars, Scottish Rite Masons, and of the Mystic Shrine. He was also a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, being treasurer of his lodge for fifteen years.

Mrs. Scott was a member of the Eastern Star and was an original member of the Wyoming Congregational Church.

Mr. Scott was proud of his clean, American ancestry and was a member of the Illinois Society of Mayflower Descendants and of the Sons of the American Revolution. He took especial pride in his grandfather, Capt. Ephraim Scott, of the War of 1812, and used to relate many anecdotes of him.

During his long life, for he was nearly eighty years old when he died, he was a good neighbor, a faithful friend, public spirited and at all times willing to do his part, whether for private or public good. His loss to the banking interests of Illinois was deeply felt and many expressions of sympathy and regret reached the other members of

the firm. His association with Mr. John Wrigley extended over a period of thirty-one years, of which twenty-four were spent in the bank. Mr. Scott was a warm, true-hearted man and a faithful friend. If he thought he was able to do any kindness for any person he was untiring in his effort to accomplish the end. His mind and character were so just in their formation that when a difference of opinion occurred he preferred to be the sufferer rather than risk being unfair. His death was mourned not only by his family, his large circle of friends, and his business associates, but by his town and State.

The following abstract is from a letter written to Mr. Scott's daughter by Mr. John Walters, of the banking firm of Scott, Walters & Rakestraw, which was founded by George Washington Scott.

"Of your father's early life I know very little except as I have heard him occasionally refer to it. I have often heard him speak of going to school at Millbury Academy in Massachusetts, and I have heard him say that when he was young he went to work in some manufacturing establishment in Massachusetts, 'but,' said he, 'that didn't suit me, I made up my mind I'd do business for myself and not be belled in and belled out of anybody else's establishment.' This was characteristic of his independent way of thinking and doing, and showed his early self-reliance. Later in life the same trait showed when he was offered the position of manager of the First National Bank in Peoria. He declined it saying he wouldn't want to work for anybody other than himself.

"I have often heard him speak of his mother with great affection and esteem for her goodness and strength of character, and he spoke too of his father who however, I think, died when he was young, and of his uncle Alexander Scott.

"Your father has often told me of his landing in St. Louis, when he moved West, on St. Patrick's day. Indeed there was hardly a St. Patrick's day came but what he would say, 'So many years ago I landed in St. Louis.' I think he first bought land near what is Duncan on the line between Stark and Peoria Counties and engaged in farming for a few years. I have heard from others that he was as successful a wheat raiser as he later was a merchant and banker. He came to Wyoming in the early 60's and bought the old corner store known as the Boston Store, and he lived in the house adjoining the store. He soon built up a good trade and about the same time John Wrigley came to Wyoming from England. Your father has told me how Mr. Wrigley, who was a blacksmith, would often come into the store at noon and eat his lunch there. One day he said, 'George, don't you want a partner?' 'Why?' asked your father. 'Because if you do, I'd like to go in with you.' 'Well,' said your father, 'if you will take the stock at what it invoiced on February 1st, you may come in.' 'That,' said your father, 'was the only agreement Mr. Wrigley and I ever made. There was never a scrap of paper between us.' And that was the simple beginning of the successful business partnership of Scott & Wrigley, merchants, which in 1870 became the banking firm of Scott & Wrigley. It was built on the trust of two good men in one another's character, honor and business ability; a trust which continued unimpaired till death separated them by the removal of Mr. Wrigley in 1894.

"Wyoming in those days was a small place, a few stores, a flour mill, a few

residences, a Methodist church and a frame two-room schoolhouse, and yet, as one looks back on the men and women who lived here then, he sees among them many of fine quality, young folks often from homes of refinement, and character, in the East. There was no railroad and life was slower, but not without interest. I have heard your father relate some of his business experiences of those days. When the war broke out prices went soaring rapidly and the firm of Scott & Wrigley was not slow to take advantage of the situation, and carried large stocks of goods which steadily and rapidly increased in value. When Lincoln was assassinated there was a sudden fall in values due to the shaken confidence, but your father told me he knew it would come back, and saddled the old gray horse, road to Galva, took the train for Chicago and bought about \$30,000 of dry-goods from Farwell & Co. He said that Charles Farwell came around and said, 'What are you going to do, Scott, set up a wholesale house?' But your father understood what he was doing and before the goods were shipped received an offer from Farwell's of \$10,000 to leave them in the house. Of course, he refused. I have heard him speak of his first trip to Chicago to buy goods. Marshall Field was credit man for Farwell's and said, 'Mr. Scott, have you any references?' 'Yes,' said your father, but did not show any. 'Well, where are they?' asked Mr. Field. 'Here, myself,' replied your father. Field said he guessed they were good enough and Scott & Wrigley were always good customers of Farwell's.

"When your father came to Illinois, land could be had as low as \$1.25 per acre and from that up to \$10.00. Your father had faith and began dealing in land selling to new comers. About 1865 there was considerable immigration from Ohio, and land began to advance till in 1870 when I came here, they were selling about \$40.00 (per acre). Your father told me about the first land purchase he made for the firm. It was an 80 acre tract near Castleton, which has recently sold for \$200.00 per acre. He bought it for \$1400.00 and said, 'Mr. Wrigley, I bought some land for you,' and told him what it was. 'Do you think we can afford it?' Mr. Wrigley asked. 'Just as you say,' your father replied. 'All right,' said Mr. Wrigley. They sold it at a good profit and your father said Mr. Wrigley never questioned anything he did afterward

in the matter of land purchases.

"In 1870 and 1871 the railways came to Wyoming and Scott & Wrigley sold out their store and went into the banking business, opening two establishments, one in the north end of Wyoming and one in the south for the coming of the two railroads had split the town into two sections. A. B. Miner & Co. of Chicago also opened a bank and for a few years there was a keen fight for the business, but Scott & Wrigley won out and Miner & Co. sold out to the Farmer's National Bank, which some years later in turn went out of business, selling out to Scott & Wrigley.

"I came to Wyoming in 1870, my father, mother and we five children coming from England in the 'Italy' and arriving in Wyoming in November. My father built the frame building adjoining to the present bank. I distinctly remember the first time I saw your father. I was walking up toward the north town, when a hack overtook me and your father jumped out and rushed up to me and commandeered me to take a message back to the store 'right away.' I was a quiet, shy, English boy and I wondered who that good-looking, handsome man was with the black eyes and the commanding manner who

sent me doing his business. I remember I felt quite honored and important to execute the errand. But there was no mistaking the fact that he was a man who had a lot of rush and go to him, and was accustomed to making things go. This was my first impression and it was correct.

"In 1872 I went to work in the Boston Store, and your father was always very nice to me, and took a good deal of interest in telling me things that would be of use to me as to little business habits, pointers, etc. As I look back on it, I appreciate very much, his kindness in doing so, and I did then, for, as I said, I was naturally rather a shy boy, and to have Mr. Scott take notice and talk to me in this friendly helpful way, betokened a naturally kind warmhearted man.

"When the Congregational Church was formed here with fourteen members, your mother was one of them, and your father was one of its staunch supporters. He did not become a member until 1890, but was a trustee earlier and no Sunday saw him absent from his place in church. He placed great value on the influence of the church in the community, and gave it both his material and moral support, steadfastly until his death. He was a good firm friend of the ministers and showed them many courtesies and kindnesses. In fact, the last call I made on him, the Sunday night before his death, he enquired very earnestly about the services and spoke most appreciatingly of the minister, Rev. William Moore, saying, 'Mr. Moore is a good man, and we must stand by him.'

"The relationship between him and his partner, Mr. John Wrigley, was more than a business relationship. It was a close, warm, personal, friendship, in which the utmost mutual confidence abounded. In business matters, Mr. Scott was the one who took the helm and drove ahead; Mr. Wrigley took care of the details. Both were men of excellent judgement, and boundless energy, and both were men of unquestioned probity, hard workers, and their business was built up on a sound foundation. They made the name of Scott & Wrigley a synonym for progressiveness, soundness and integrity. When in August 1894, Mr. Wrigley was stricken with the apoplexy which two weeks later caused his death, your father and his family were visiting in Massachusetts. He came at once, and nothing could exceed the unsparing energy and devotion with which he watched over him; and after Mr. Wrigley's death he was often moved to tears when he spoke of him.

"Your father always took a warm interest in the public schools and was for many years a director, and his influence was very potent for their improvement. He gave to his own children and to his grand-daughter an education in the eastern colleges, and was always interested in seeing that young people of worth received all educational advantages within their reach.

"In politics during pre-war times, he was a Democrat and a warm admirer of Stephen A. Douglas, but he became a Republican soon after the formation of that party and ever continued so. He took a keen interest in politics but never cared for any office. He also took a keen interest in foreign affairs and read widely on these matters. He was very fond of reading about foreign countries and took great pleasure in recalling the scenes and events of the European trip which he took with his family in 1884. He always expressed a great desire to visit Russia and Alaska, and he and Mr. Wrigley had planned to take the Alaskan trip in 1895, but Mr. Wrigley's death intervened.

"In 1895, after Mr. Wrigley's death, I entered the firm as a partner, representing the Wrigley interest, and our relations continued in the most cordial confidence until his death. He always kept a close touch on the business, and his judgement as to any important matter always remained the final arbiter, even after he ceased to hold the active management. He was kind and generous to those who worked under and with him. His judgement was sound as to equity in business and he always endeavored to mete this to others, as he expected to receive it and was quick to resent a wrong. I was impressed with his wide knowledge in business matters, his keen and usually correct judgement of men and affairs, and his sound New England vein of common-sense. He was a man, who had his lot been cast in a large growing city would have been one of our commercial princes.

"It was really a business education for a man to be associated with your father, to hear from time to time his observations on men and things, on habits and practices, and I enjoyed to ride with him over the country and listen to his remarks on the lands as we passed, on the history and qualities of the various farms. It seemed to me that he knew them all, and it seemed as though he and Mr. Wrigley had at one time or other owned a large share of them. I once asked him, 'Wouldn't it have paid you to have kept a lot of these farms?' and he said, 'No, we couldn't, and it paid us better to keep things moving. A man shouldn't want to always get everything there is in a piece of property. He should be willing to let some one else make something.'

"Your father has left his mark in many of the improvements of the town. It was he who set out the avenue of hard maple trees which make Galena Avenue so beautiful now, and he had much to do in acquiring the Central Park for the town. He took great interest in the building and improvement of the Congregational Church and parsonage; he had much to do with the inauguration of the City water-works and it was largely due to his foresight that the fine system of cement walks in Wyoming was laid out on a broad scale. One of the latest things in which he busied himself was the securing and erection of the fine iron cemetery fence.

"He was a warm-hearted, generous-dispositioned man, who had a heart to help good causes, a true and steadfast friend, having a keen sense of right and fairness, and withal a hearty dislike of shams; a man of strong moral character who has left his mark for good in the general welfare of the community.

"As a banker, he was sound, thorough, energetic, and his dealings with his customers were such that they became and remained his friends. In very many cases his advice and help has enabled deserving young men to make a good start in life and he has often been a helper to those in need."





DUNCAN

SAMUEL DUNCAN was an early resident of Boston. He appears in a case in Court 1 Dec. 1640, but there being a mistake in the presentment he was discharged. Savage says he was of Newbury, in 1738. Samuel Duncan of "Roxbere" appears in an Essex Co. Case in 1672. He apparently left no Will nor was there any Administration on his estate, so that it is impossible to obtain a full list of his children. He died in Roxbury, 19 Nov. 1693.* His wife's name was Mary. She was admitted to Roxbury Church, 11 May 1684.

JAMES PRIOR resided in Boston, Mass., in 1681, where he had three children born by wife Susanna. He probably died between 1687 and 1690, for on 13 Feb. 1690, Robert Watson married Susanna Prior in Boston and the only available Susanna is the wife of James Prior. What became of Robert and his wife Susanna is not shown by the Boston Records. It is interesting to note that both Prior and Watson are early Plymouth County names and that branches of the families went to Windsor, Conn. The name of Prior does not appear in the early probate or land records of Suffolk County.

EDMANDS

WILLIAM EDMANDS, born in 1610, a tailor, was made a freeman in Lynn, Mass., 6 May 1635. He deposed in 1652, "aged about 42"; in 1678, "aged 68th year"; and died in Lynn, 4 Aug. 1693, aged eighty-two. His first wife was named Mary and after her death in Lynn, 2 Mar. 1657, he married (2), in Boston, 1 Sept. 1657, widow Ann Martin, who died before him.

He was licensed to keep an Inn in Lynn in 1650 and remained the innkeeper for many years. He evidently lived in Chelsea, then called Rumney Marsh, near the Boston line. He was the residuary

legatee of Thomas Batt's estate in 1689.

There is an interesting case in the Essex County Court, pertaining to him and his wife Ann. One Henry Greene had a daughter Mary, who was afflicted with a "dangerous sore leg". He had placed her in charge of Dr. Comfort Starr of Charlestown, but she not getting any better, he left her with Mrs. Ann Edmands to see if the latter could effect a cure and guaranteed certain payment in case of recovery. Ann Edmunds evidently had a recognised skill in healing, as she is called in one place, a "doctor-woman", and the little girl became well. Greene, however, failed to pay as agreed and then Edmands sued him.

Administration on the estate of William Edmands was granted to John Edmands, of Lynn, 11 Sept. 1693. (Essex Probate, 8584.) The deed of division of his property was signed by John Edmands; Joseph Edmands; Samuel Edmands; Mary Hutchins.

JOHN ² EDMANDS (William ¹), born in Lynn, Mass., before 1640, died in Lynn between 6 Oct. 1701 and 6 Apr. 1702; married (1), in Lynn, 16 Dec. 1662, Sarah Hudson, who died 15 Feb. 1682. He married (2), about 1686, Mary ————, who probably was a widow George, and the sister of the wife of Joshua Blanchard, of Charlestown. John Edmands in his Will speaks of his "brother-in-law, Joshua Blanchard". An exhaustive search apparently proved that Mary was not a Blanchard, and as John Edmands' only sister married

a Hutchins, the only way that Edmands and Blanchard could be brothers-in-law would be by their wives being sisters. Joshua Blanchard had two wives, his first was named Elizabeth. She died 15 July 1688, aged twenty-one. He then married (2) Mehetabel—, who died 10 Jan. 1741–2 aged seventy-six. Mary, wife of John Edmands, named a child, Mehetabel, and it is probable that Mehetabel, wife of Joshua Blanchard and Mary, wife of John Edmands, were sisters. The date of Mary's death is unknown but she survived John.

John Edmands, of Lynn, husbandman, made his Will, 6 Oct. 1701, proved 6 Apr. 1702. He calls himself "sick and weake" and gives his whole estate to wife Mary until son Josiah is of age; he gives to daughter Mary Edmands; daughter Elizabeth Edmands; daughter-in-law Elizabeth George; son William to be maintained by wife until son Joseph is of age and if William then remains "lame and decrepid", Joseph is to care for him; to daughter Mehetabel when of age; to daughter Rebecca when of age and if she remains weak and sickly, Joseph is to care for her; youngest son Ebenezer Edmands to have the housing that was "my father William Edmands". Benjamin and Samuel, two sons, were to be put at trades when fifteen years of age; to daughter Hannah Edmands and to two oldest daughters, Mary and Elizabeth Edmands. Wife Mary to be executrix and brother-in-law Joshua Blanchard to be overseer. (Essex Probate, 307: 308.)

JOSEPH ³ EDMANDS (John ², William ¹), born in Lynn, Mass., 1 Mar. 1686-7, died in Dudley, Mass., between 20 June 1751 and 5 June 1768; married (Int.) in Lynn, 25 Oct. 1707, Mary Pratt, of Charlestown, perhaps daughter of Joseph and Dorcas (Folger)

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Pratt, who died before 1745, probably in Dudley. He married (2), in Woodstock, Conn., 6 Aug. 1746, Mrs. Bathsheba (Sanford) Holmes, daughter of Thomas and Christian Sanford, of Boston, and widow of David Holmes.

Joseph Edmands remained in Lynn, until about 1724, when he removed to a tract of land between Woodstock, Conn., and Oxford, Mass., called Kickamowadchaug, which later became the town of Dudley, Mass.

He made his Will, 20 June 1751, proved 5 July 1768. He gave to son-in-law Joseph Scott, and son-in-law David Cutting, being in full of their wives' portions of his estate; to daughter-in-law, Hannah Edmands, the late wife of son William Edmands, deceased, one shilling, he having had his share; to son-in-law Philip Newell, in full of his late wife Hannah's share; to son Benjamin Edmands; to grand-daughter, Mary Newell, in care of her father, Philip Newell, and if she dies, to be divided amongst her surviving sisters. "Whereas there is a certain Joynture made between me and my well beloved wife Bath-sheba dated Aug. 5, 1746" wherein it was agreed that if she survived me and should choose to leave my house she should have £100 inasmuch as she has been a loving wife she is to have £6-13-4 more. Son Joseph Edmands to be Executor and to have the residue. (Worcester Probate 18829.)

TACKLES

ALEXANDER TACKLES came with one of the Scotch-Irish emigrations from the north of Ireland. These people were really Scotch covenanters, who had fled into Ireland, as the Pilgrims went to Holland, in order to gain religious freedom. Finding, however, that the end sought was not obtained, they again emigrated and this time to America. Some of them settled in New Hampshire, some in Pennsylvania, and a large colony was established in Worcester Co., Mass. Alexander Tackles belonged to this last group. He was in Palmer in 1732, and was granted one hundred acres of land there in 1733. The name of his wife is not known, nor are there any records of their deaths. He had at least two sons, who removed to Onslow, Nova Scotia.

"William Tackles of Ware in the County of Hampshire, Province of Massachusetts Bay in New England yeoman sells to William Sterlin of Windsor, N. S., one and one-half rights of land at Onslow, N. S., 750 acres, etc."

CONEY

JOHN CONEY, an early settler of Boston, came from Boston, co. Lincoln, England. The family to which he belonged has been traced back by Mr. Willard Morse of New York, to one Robert Coney of Byam, France, who came to England with the Princess Isabella, Queen of Edward II of England (1307–1327). While there seems no reason to doubt that this Robert was the progenitor of the family, the pedigree as given by Mr. Morse has several obvious errors in it and seems scarcely worth printing here until corrected. Not having access to all the material on which this pedigree is based, it is impossible to correct it here and in the following account of the English ancestry of John Coney, certain possibilities founded on such authentic information as is given in the Morse pedigree is merely called to attention.

In the early part of the sixteenth century there were living in Frampton, co. Lincoln, England, John and William Coney. The Morse pedigree makes them father and son, which can not be correct. John, eldest son of the above John Coney of Frampton, was born in 1514, and his brother William was the third son and born therefore William Coney of Frampton, died in 1557 and at the time was not only a grandfather, but had several grandchildren. If he were identical with William, son of John Coney of Frampton, he would be about thirty-nine years old. Assuming that all four of his surviving children and the probable ones that did not survive were born before he was twenty-four, the last would have to be married before fourteen and all would marry equally early. In order to have three children before 1557, Roger, son of William, would have to be born when his father was about sixteen and be a father himself at about the same age. While this is not impossible, it is highly improbable especially as there is no proof that Roger was the first born child of William Coney. It seems quite evident that William Coney must have been considerably older than thirty-nine in 1557.

The Inquest P. M. on John Coney of Frampton in 1538-9, states that he was son of Robert Coney of Kirton and that the said John Coney's eldest son was twenty-three years old. The Morse pedigree makes this Robert Coney of Kirton, father of John, identical with one Robert Coney of Kirton who died in 1522 and whose eldest son was Thomas Coney aged twenty years and hence born in 1502. If John Coney

of Frampton, was son of this Robert Coney he could not have been born before 1504 since he must be younger than the heir, Thomas, born in 1502, and as John's eldest son was born in 1515, it would make him a father at the tender age of eleven years. The Morse pedigree defends this by pointing out the fact that marriages frequently occurred at an early age in England about this period, but granting this, the age at which marriage occurred has nothing to do with it, the age of physical maturity being much the same then as now.

The probability is that John and William Coney of Frampton were brothers and both sons of a Robert Coney of Kirton, and it also seems logical to suppose that the Robert of Kirton who died in 1522 was their older brother. If their father were son of Geoffrey and Elizabeth (Copledike) Coney, as the pedigree suggests and which there seems no reason to doubt, it would make John Coney of Frampton, a first cousin to that Richard Coney of Bassingthorpe whom John made guardian of his second son.

The pedigree makes the line of Geoffrey Coney to be as follows: Robert Coney of Byam, France, married a daughter of Sir John Houltbeck.

Sir John ² Coney (Robert ¹), married Jane Houlbridge, daughter of Sir John Houlbridge, and had sons Anthony and Robert.

Anthony ³ Coney (Sir John ², Robert ¹), married a daughter of John Friskeny, and had sons Richard, William, Robert and Anthony.

Robert 4 Coney (Anthony 3, Sir John 2, Robert 1), married a daugh-

ter of John Digby of Kirkby and had son Geoffrey.

Geoffrey ⁵ Coney (Robert ⁴, Anthony ³, Sir John ², Robert ¹), married Elizabeth Copledike, daughter of William, and had Anthony Coney and William Coney, and possibly was the father of Robert Coney of Kirton, and the grandfather of John and William of Frampton. His son, William, was the father of Richard Coney of Bassingthorpe.

The line seems clear back to William Coney of Frampton, although the compilers of the Morse pedigree call attention to the fact that it is not absolutely proven that William Coney of Boston, England, was identical with William Coney, son of Roger Coney of Frampton. All the evidence so far found points that way however and there is no scrap of evidence to militate against it.

What is known of the Frampton Coneys follows with the American pedigree, in which William Coney of Frampton is taken as the first proven ancestor and the individual from whom the generations are numbered.

John Coney of Frampton, England, born probably about 1490, died in Frampton, in the spring of 1539; married before 1515, Alison or Alice Pooles, daughter of John and Ann (Coney) Pooles, born 1498, died between 2 Apr. and 22 Oct. 1540.

John Conny of Frampton made his Will 27 Feb. 1538-9, proved in the Lincoln Consistory Court, 22 May 1539. He gave one part to Alison his wife, the other two parts to his four sons, John, Robert, William and Thomas, with oversight of John Pooles and Robert Whelpdale. If sons do their duties by their mother and be counselled by said John Pooles, etc. The parts given to sons William and Thomas to be in the custody of John Pooles and Robert Whelpdale until they be at lawful age. The part given to son Robert to be in the custody of Richard Conny of Bassingthorpe until he comes forth from his apprenticeship. Sons John Conny and Robert Conny to give to Thomas Pery and Alison his sister the day of their marriage. Sons John Conny and Robert Conny exes., John Pooles and Robert Whelpdale, supervisors. Witnesses: William Freyr, John Rowlott, John Howett, John Grene, Richard Luceman.

Inquest P. M., on John Cony of Frampton, taken at Boston, Lincoln, 12 Aug. 1539. John Cony and Alice his wife, late son of Robert Cony of Kirketon-Wellington, and Alice, daughter of John Pooles, late of Kirketon.

The said John Cony died and the said Alice survived him and is still living. The said John Cony died on the 22nd February, 30 Henry VIII 1538-9 and John Cony is his son and heir, aged 23 years at the time of his death.

Alice Coney, widow, of Frampton made her Will 2 Apr. 1540, proved 22 Oct. 1540 in Lincoln Consistory Court. She gave to Thomas and Alice Pery at the day of their marriage: to four sons, John Cony, Robert Cony, William Cony and Thomas Cony, under the oversight of John Pooles and Robert Wolpdale. John Cony and Robert Cony exes. Richard Cony of Bassingthorpe, supervisor. Witnesses: Robert Thompson, John Rawlet, John Pooles, Robert Rawlet, Richard Luceman.

WILLIAM ¹ CONEY (whose possible line is Robert, Geoffrey, Robert, Anthony, Sir John, Robert) of Frampton, was probably the brother of John Coney of Frampton and certainly the brother of Thomas Coney, Sr., of Kirton, who died in Aug. 1545. This Thomas Coney Sr., of Kirton, made a Will 12 Aug. proved 28 Aug. 1545, and directs that he be buried in the Church of SS. Peter and Paul. He gives to brother William Cony; to godson Mr. Kenelm Irby; to daughter Elizabeth, wife of William Pery; to Roger, son of William

Coney; to Thomas, son of Richard Coney; wife Agnes to be executrix; brother William Coney and Kinsman Thomas Coney, supervisors.

This will and that of John Coney of Frampton with the I. P. M. of the latter show almost conclusively that Robert Coney of Kir-

ton had at least three sons, Thomas, John, and William.

William Coney was born probably about 1500 and died in March, 1556-7, in Frampton, Lincoln, England. He was a yeoman, and it is evident that his wife deceased before he made his Will. In this Will which is dated 1 Mar. 1556-7 and proved 31 Mar. 1557, he gave to his three daughters, land in Kyrton; to John Wisdaylle of Frampton for the use of Thomas Coney, son of Roger Coney; to said Thomas Coney, land; to John Wisdayll, son of the said John Wisdaylle; to Johnne Wormslay, son of William Wormslay of Frampton, dec'd; to Alison Stubbs, wife of Johnne Stubbes of Boston; household stuffe to three daughters aforesaid and their children; to Johnne Coney and Thomas Coney a mare; to Margaret Coney, the daughter of Roger Coney; residue to Roger Coney and John Wisdaylle whom I make executors: Thomas Snell and John Stubbes, supervisors. Witnesses: Thomas Wasynge, Vicar of Frampton, Johnne Proctor, of Frampton, Richard Tonarde of Frampton.

Witnesses: Henrie Benson, Percival Morton; Robert Browne.

JOHN 4 CONEY (William 3, Roger 2, William 1), baptised in Frampton, England, 15 Apr. 1599. John Coney "Gent." was buried in Boston, England, 6 Apr. 1630. He married in Boston, 16 Dec. 1624, ELIZABETH HAWKREDD, daughter of Anthony and Isabel (Tuckney) Hawkredd, born in Boston, baptised there 8 Dec. 1605, died in New England after 1667 (p. 178). She married (2), in Boston, England, 1 Jan. 1632-3, Oliver Mellows and came to Boston, Mass., before Dec. 1634, evidently bringing with her, her son John Coney aged about five, and her daughter Mary aged about three years. By her second husband, she had baptised in First Church, Boston, Mass., (1) Samuel Mellows, 7 Dec. 1634; (2) Martha Mellows, 6 Mar. 1636; m. Joseph Waters of Milford; (3) Mary Mellows, 26 Aug. 1638; m. Emmanuel Springfield and returned to England. Oliver Mellows died in Braintree in 1638 and administration on his estate was granted to his widow in Dec. 1638. She married before 1641 (3), Thomas Makepeace of Dorchester. The records of the First Church of Boston give; "The 25th day of ye 5th Mon: 1641. Mrs. Elizabeth Makepeace lately called Mrs. Elizabeth Mellowes, but now ye wife of Mr. Makepeace of Dorchester, was granted lie of Recommendation thether". Thomas Makepiece died in 1667 and in his Will he gives: "to my wife's three daughters, vizt. unto Mary, the wife of James Dennis of Boston, and to Martha the wife of Joseph Waters of Milford, and to Mary the wife of Emanuell Springfield in old England", and to his "well beloved wife Elizabeth".

^{*} This supposition is supported by the fact that when John 4 Coney mentions his brethren in his Will, he names Thomas first and then William and if William had been the eldest son he would, if he followed custom, have named him first.

John Coney of Boston, England, gentleman, made his Will 2 Apr. 1630, proved 24 May 1630. He gives to son, John Coney; to unborn child; to wife Elizabeth; mentions father William Coney; Brethren, Anthony Hawkredd, Thomas Coney and William Coney, supervisors. Witnesses: William Coney, Mary Bonner, and John Downs.

JOHN ⁵ CONEY (John ⁴, William ³, Roger ², William ¹), baptised in Boston, England, 17 June 1628, died in Boston, Mass., 24 Dec. 1690; married in Boston, Mass., 20 June 1654, ELIZABETH NASH, daughter of Robert and Sarah Nash, born in 1635, died in Boston, 16 Dec. 1687, aged 52, buried in the Granary Burying Ground (p. 181).

John Coney first appears in the public records of Boston, Mass., when John Milom, cooper, assigned "John Coneyes Indenture for the term of six months", 12 Dec. 1649. This would make his apprenticeship expire on 12 June 1649 which was probably his twenty-first birthday, and if so he was five days old when he was baptised. On Feb. 25, 1655 he was appointed one of two packers of fish and meat for the town and also a "gager of cask" and was again chosen for that office in 1657. In 1669, he was made constable. In 1672 and 1687 he was "Clerke of ye market". In 1676, 1689–1690, he was made inspector of chimneys for the prevention of fires and in the last year is called "Mr. John Cony Sen^r". In 1678 he was one of a committee of six, two from each of the then existing churches, to receive subscriptions from the Second Church for the "Colledge".

He was evidently a man of considerable property, but no Will or administration of his estate has been found. He owned an estate on Copps Hill which was sold after his death by his son John and daughters Rebecca and Mary who signed the deed with "Thomas Walter Administrator of the said John Coney deced". Presumably the other children who would also have been of age in 1691 had died

before their father.

NATHANIEL ⁶ CONEY (John ⁵, John ⁴, William ³, Roger ², William ¹), born probably in Boston, Mass., about 1675, died in Boston, 19 Nov. 1742; married (1), in Hingham, Mass., 11 Oct. 1699, ELIZABETH GREENLAND of Boston, who died in Boston, after 20 Mar. 1710–11. He married (2), in Boston, 6 Sept. 1711, ABIGAIL (SKINNER) AGER, daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth (Maverick) (Grafton) Skinner and widow of Ebenezer Ager, born about 1685, and died between 1728 and 1736, probably in Stoughton, Mass. (p. 183). He was published in Rehoboth, Mass., 13 May 1736 to Mary Barney but presumably did not marry her. He married (3), in Boston, 27 Dec. 1736, Mary Royal, who died 30 Jan. 1749–50, aged eighty years, according to her gravestone in Copps Hill Burying-ground.

Nathaniel Coney's parentage is proved by two deeds recorded in the Middlesex County Registry. In the first (vol. 61, p. 52) dated 4 Mar. 1716, "John Coney of Boston . . . goldsmith eldest son and joint heir of John Coney of Boston aforesaid deceased" conveys to his brother Nathaniel Coney all the land "laid out to Mr. John Coney . . . five hundred acres on the north-east side of Merrimack River in the township of Dunstable", and in the deed it is stated that "whereas the said John Coney deceased left several children heires to the said lot as well as his other estate: now know ye hat I the said John Coney eldest son as aforesaid, out of that love and affection which I have and do bear unto my brother Nathaniel Coney of Boston aforesaid, Taylor, Have granted," etc. The other deed, dated 23 Jan. 1716-7, conveys the same property from "Nathaniel Coney of Boston, in the county of Suffolk in New England, Taylor", and Abigail, his wife, to Thomas Hutchinson of Boston, and he states that he "is the true sole and legal owner of the said land partly in right of my father John Coney late of said Boston, Cooper, who died seized thereof in fee, and the remainder was given and granted to me by my brothers John and Benjamin Coney and my sister Elizabeth Booth, who were children and heirs of my said father".

Nathaniel Coney removed about 1723 to Rehoboth, Mass. He may have lived for a short time in Sudbury as he had a child born there in 1722. Before 1728, he was living in Stoughton but apparently after his third marriage he returned to Boston. He died suddenly and on the 20 Nov. 1742, "In the sixteenth year of the reign of . . . George ye second before James Devonport one of the coroners of our said Lord the King . . . upon the view of the body of Nathaniel Coney then and their being dead", the jurors ruled, "that the sayd Nathaniel Coney on the nineteenth Instant,

being in his house in Boston aforesaid, by the act of God suddenly came to his death".

WILLIAM ⁷ CONEY (Nathaniel ⁶, John ⁵, John ⁴, William ³, Roger ², William ¹), born in Rehoboth, Mass., 29 Mar. 1726, died in Brookfield, Mass., 1 Nov. 1805; married (1), in Dedham, Mass., 27 Apr. 1749, Mehetabel Ellis, daughter of William and Abigail (Millett) Ellis, born in Dedham, 18 July 1727, died in Sharon, Mass., 14 Aug. 1777 (p. 194). He married (2), at Walpole, Mass., 14 June 1785, Mary (Carr) Robbins, widow of Aquilla Robbins, born 16 Feb. 1739, died 21 Mar. 1817. (Bible record.) Aquilla Robbins was born 10 Mar. 1710, and married, 30 Oct. 1730, Hannah Clark who died 8 July 1782. He married Mary Carr (Int. Walpole, 19 July 1783) after Hannah's death but only lived a short time, dying in Walpole on 20 May 1784 in his seventy-fourth year and called "husband of Hannah" in his death record.

William Coney lived in that part of Stoughton, that became Stoughtonham and later Sharon. He removed from there to Brookfield after 1778. He was a Revolutionary soldier. "William Coney, Stoughtonham (now Sharon) Private, Capt. Israel Smith's co., from Stoughton and Stoughtonham, which marched on the Alarm of April 19, 1775, service 3 days." (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, iii: 891.)

He made his Will, 18 Feb. 1804, proved 26 Nov. 1805. He gave "to loving wife Mary all estate both real and personal for life and then to be divided among my children". To granddaughter Betsey Coney, "that I brought up". Executors, William Coney of Brookfield, Ephraim Scott of Ware, and Daniel Coney of Brookfield.

An assent to the probate of the Will was signed by the widow Mary Coney, Phille Morse, James Breckenridge, and Ebenezer Gould.

9 Apr. 1817, William Coney and Ephraim Scott of Ware, and Daniel Coney of Brookfield were appointed administrators of the estate of Mary Coney.

THOMAS ³ PURY (William ², Richard ¹), born probably in Kyrton, England, about 1528, died there and was buried 25 Mar. 1592; married Anna or Joanna (Pooles) Gilson, daughter of Roger Pooles and widow of John Gilson.

Supervisor, Thomas Ogle of Pinchbeck, my wife's brother. (Lincolnshire Wills, p. 40.)

HAWKREDD

WILLIAM HAWKREDD, born probably about 1520, was buried in Boston, England, 16 Apr. 1575. He married before 1553 and probably about 1543, MARY FELD, daughter of Nicholas Feld of Boston, born about 1521, died after 1553. When William died he had a wife Elizabeth, who apparently was the mother of the children born from 1567 to 1574. In his Will, William gives to his daughter Joanne some property of her grandfather Feld, but does not mention Feld in connection with his next child Anthony, who was only a year old when Joanna married. The burial of Cassander Hawkredd is recorded at Boston, on the 10 May 1565, and it seems probable that Mary Feld was the mother of Joanna only, that she died after 1553, being mentioned in her father Nicholas Feld's Will of that date. and that William married (2), Cassandra, and that after her death, he married (3), ELIZABETH, to whom he gives the residue of his property after arranging for Joanna and Anthony, presumably because she was the mother of his other living children. There seems to be no other family of the name in Boston, at this period.

William Hawkredd, Alderman of Boston, co. Lincoln, made his Will 12 Apr. 1575, proved at Lincoln, 5 June 1575. He bequeaths to daughter Joanne, Androwe Leakes wife, certain articles that were her grandfather, Mr. Feld's; to son Anthonie Hawkredd, money in the hand of Androwe Leake until he comes to age of 21; to Elizabeth his wife, and she to be executrix. Witnesses: Henry Holland, Vicar

of Boston, John Gandrie, William Dalland.

ANTHONY 2 HAWKREDD (William 1), baptised in Boston, England, 3 Aug. 1561, died in Boston, 28 Apr. 1628; married about 1595, ISABEL Dowse, daughter of John and Cassander Dowse of Freiston and perhaps half sister of William Tuckney of Kirton, buried 22 June 1615. He married (2), 1 June 1616, ELIZABETH (HATCHER) AYSCOUGH of Thornton, widow of Francis Ayscough, upon whom he made a marriage settlement. He was a Mercer and was Mayor of Boston.

Anthony Hawkredd, Mayor of Boston, made his Will 12 Aug. 1626, proved 7 June 1628 at Boston. He bequeaths to wife Elizabeth; to son Anthonie Hawkredd; to son Samuel Hawkredd; to daughter Mary, wife of Thomas Conye; to daughter Elizabeth, wife of John Conye; to Samuel Conye and John Conye children of Thomas Conye; to son Samuel Hawkredd; to son John Hawkredd; to John Ayscough, his wife's son, at 21 years; son Anthony Hawkredd to be executor. with brother-in-law William Hatcher, friend George Thorrold, sonnes-in-law Thomas Conye and John Conye, supervisors at the discretion of John Cotton, Vicar of Boston and Anthonie Tuckney of Cambridge. Witnesses: Michaell Mitchell, Thomas Conie, William Tompson, Robert Reade. Inquest P. M. 1 Oct. 1628 of Anthony Hawkredd of Boston; Land in Boston, &c., in consideration of marriage to Elizabeth Ayscough of Thornton co., Lincoln, solemnised 1 June 1616. Anthony Hawkredd made his Will, 12 Aug. 1626, giving one-third part to son and heir Anthony Hawkredd and two-thirds to wife Elizabeth. Sons Samuel and John. Anthony Hawkredd died 28th Apr. 1628. Elizabeth, the widow, living at Boston.

NICHOLAS 2 FELD (Robert 1), born probably about 1500, died 29 Dec. 1553, at Boston, England. He was mayor of Boston, England, in 1546, and merchant of the Staple, of Boston, Lincoln.

Nicholas Feld made his Will 19 Dec. 1553, proved at Boston, 20 July 1554; he bequeaths to Joan Crosten, wife of John Crosten and sometime wife of son John Feld; to daughter Margaret, wife of Christopher Lodge; to daughter Mary, wife of William Hawkerig; to daughter Alice, wife of William Daland. Inquest P. M. taken at Lincoln Castle, 21 Sept. 1554. Nicholas Feld died 29 Dec. 1553, heirs, daughter Margaret, aged 30 years; daughter Alice, aged 26 years; daughter Mary, aged 32 years. (Prerogative Court of Canterbury.)

MARY ³ FELD (Nicholas ², Robert ¹), born 1521, married as first wife, probably about 1543, WILLIAM HAWKREDD (p. 176). It is doubtful if she was the mother of his son Anthony.

NASH

ROBERT NASH, a butcher, was in Charlestown, Mass., before 1640. He was possibly a son of Gregory Nash, an original church member there who died 12 month 1630. In 1641 he appears in a case in Court of John Edwards of Charlestown (Lechford). He removed to Boston before 1642, as his wife Sarah was admitted to the church there, 25 Feb. 1641-2. In 1641 he sued Walter Knight in the Essex court, and in 1644 he was sued by Edward Colcord of Hampton, Thomas Dexter of Lynn and Henry Ingram. This last case he appealed to the next quarter court of assistants. He was a debtor to the estate of Isaac Gross in 1649, and the estate of Henry Sandys owed him money on the account of Jeremiah Goold in 1651.

In the case of William Payne vs. Robert Nash in Sept. 1652 are the following interesting depositions: "William Follett deposed that about two years ago, Thomas Footman came to him with a note under the hand of Mr. William Payne and demanded 3000 pipe staves to be delivered aboard the boat of Robert Nash; and that about two days after Robt. Nash's boat came to the place where deponents staves were and the boatmen were taking them aboard".

"28: 7: 1652. Thomas Footman deposed that he met Robert Nash at the house of Robt Memham of Pusscataqua about two years ago, when said Robert Nash entreated him to demand three thousand pipe staves, upon a note from M^r William Payne from William Follet and he did so. They were 'tould down' by deponent and William

Follet and put aboard the boat of Robert Nash."

"Josua Nash, aged about nineteen years, deposed that being at Pascattaquack river with his father, having two vessels there, one of them had received damage at the Isle of Shoals and a good part of the goods was lost. Mending the vessel and meeting with Mr. William Paine at Mrs. Mendam's house at Pascattaquash his father asked Paine if he could spare him two or three thousand pipe staves, and he said he could; that said deponent went by his father's order in said bark to John Goodward and received of him two thousand pipe staves, not on Mr. Paine's account but on his father's. Then because he wished to get them near at hand, he went to James Buncker but could get none and Buncker sent them up Oyster River, where none could be obtained. He proceeded further and came to Anchor against Thomas Footmans house and Thomas came aboard.

Deponent told him he had a note from his father to receive of him enough staves to make up their lading. He received 3000 and gave a receipt and his father paid for them. His father being at Goodman Thomas' house the latter demanded pay for them." (Essex Quarterly Court Files, 1: 363.)

In 1660, Robert Nash agreed to build a lean-to (Lynetoo) to a house that he had hired of Matthew Barnes, milner, 19 Oct. 1659.

20 July 1659, Robert Nash of Boston, Butcher, with consent of Sarah his wife, sells William Bartholomew of Ipswich, land and buildings near the mill-creek in Boston. (Suffolk Deeds, 3: 397: 438.)

26 Apr. 1647, Robert Nash of Boston gave a bond to pay Hugh

Gunnison to Thomas Joy.

Robert Nash of Boston, butcher, makes John Thompson, master of the Elizabeth, his attorney to obtain a debt of Richard Comins, 27 June 1648, and on 7 Nov. 1648 he makes Thomas Widhouse of Pascatqs his attorney; 7 Dec. 1648 he gave a release to Mr. ffrancis Knight of Pemaquid; 17 Mar. 1648-9, John Shawe of Boston, butcher, gave a release of all dues to Robt. Nash; 13 Dec. 1649, Robert Nash, by power of attorney from Ralph Clark, dated 1 Oct. 1649, makes Jeremie Clark of Road Island his attorney; 24 Dec. 1649, Capt. Charles Dobson of Boston for "divers good causes", assigns his one-fourth share of the Barke Charles of Boston to Robert Nash his "well beloved friend" and his heirs; 15 Apr. 1650, Robert was a witness to the assignment of John Coney's indenture from John Milom to Capt. Elias Pilgrim; 11 July 1650, he sells to John Thompson of London, house and land in Charlestown which he purchased of Nicholas Davison, and 24 Dec. 1650, Edward Abbot bound himself as a servant to Robert Nash for two years from the 15 Jan. 1650-1. (Aspinwall.)

He apparently left no Will, and there was no administration on his estate. He died at Boston 13 Sept. 1661. His widow, Sarah, died "Nov. yº 14, 1688, aged about 89" and is buried in the Granary vard.

THOMAS SKINNER, "white bread baker" of Boston, was born in 1644, and died in Boston, 28 Dec. 1690, aged forty-six years. He married (2), about 1676, ELIZABETH (MAVERICK) GRAFTON, daughter of Moses and Remember (Allerton) Maverick, and widow of Nathaniel Grafton, baptised in Salem, Mass., 30 Sept. 1649, died in Boston, between 1687 and 1697. He married (1), 28 Dec. 1669, Mary Gould. Elizabeth Maverick married (1), 6 Apr. 1665, Nathaniel Grafton, who died at Barbadoes, 11 Feb. 1671, by whom she had, (1) Elizabeth Grafton, born Dec. 1667; (2) Remember Grafton, born 29 Sept. 1669; (3) Priscilla Grafton, born 12 Mar. 1671.

He bought an estate near Exchange place in 1673, and was a Freeman in 1690.

Suffolk Co., Deeds 9: 338. Thomas Skinner, of Boston, "white bread baker" and Mary his wife mortgage to Herbert Drury, mansion House and ground whereon it stands with work house, etc., on Shrimpton's Lane; 23 May 1676.

11: 393. Thomas Skinner of Boston in N. E., baker, and Elizabeth his wife, sell land in Boston, to John Aulgar, 16 July 1680.

11:321. Thomas Skinner of Boston, "loafe bread baker", with Elizabeth. his wife, mortgages property in Boston, to Samuel Shrimpton, 2 May 1680,

Essex Co., Deeds, 5: 31. 7 May 1679. Thomas Skinner of Boston, and Elizabeth, his wife, for £280 sell to John Turner of Salem in ye county of Essex, Merchant, all that their messuage or tenement within the township of Salem about one acre of land bounded on ye east side by Richard Flinder, on ye North side by William West and on ye West side by ye said John Turner and on ye South by ye Sea or Harbour.

11: 227. 26 June 1695, William Hewes, of Boston, and Elizabeth, his wife, Thomas Jackson, of Boston, and Priscilla, his wife, "said Elizabeth and priscilla are ye onely surviving daughters and co-heirs of their Honored father, Nathaniel Grafton late of Salem . . . marriner, deceased" quitclaim for £50 to John Turner all their right and interest in land in Salem, about one acre appertaining to estate of said Nathaniel Grafton, dec'd and now in ye present occupation of said Turner "bounded northerly by land sometime appertaining to William West easterly by land of Richard fflinder westerly by land of John Turner and southerly by ye Sea or harbour".

Suffolk Co., Deeds, 16:259. Thomas Skinner, of Boston, and Elizabeth, his wife, mortgage property in Boston to Samuel Shrimpton, 17 Nov. 1687, witnessed by Thomas Jackson who in 1696 appeared in Court and stated

that Thomas Skinner was dead.

Thomas Skinner left no Will and there is no administration of his estate on record. The probate records of Suffolk county (8: 305), give the following,—Thomas Jackson, merchant, of Boston, called friend by Agnes Skinner, aged 16, daughter of Thomas Skinner, and by Abigail Skinner under 14, appears as guardian to these two children, 3 Nov. 1698.

ROBERT MAVERICKE, clerk, of Awliscombe, co. Devon, buried at Awliscombe, 14 Nov. 1573, is the earliest progenitor known of the Maverick family of New England.* He is first mentioned in the Awliscombe registers in 1561.

PETER 2 MAVERICKE (Robert 1), clerk, was born probably about 1550, called "eldest brother" in Radford Mavericke's Will. died a violent death before 3 Feb. 1616-7, at Awliscombe, Devon. He married at Awliscombe, 7 Nov. 1577, Dorothy Tucke. Peter Bull alias Maverick was ordained as a deacon 15 Jan. 1573-4, and Peter Maverick alias Bull was ordained as a priest, 17 Mar. 1573-4. On 3 Nov. 1580, Peter Maverick alias Bull, clerk, was admitted to the perpetual vicarage of Awliscombe. A suit of his against William Champneys in 1612, has been of vital importance in determining the relationships of the early Mavericks.

† The Will of Radford Mavericke contains the following clause: "To my cousen Nathaniell Mauericke, my eldest brother's son"; the Register of Awliscombe, Devon, gives as baptised, "1583 Nathaniel Mavericke son of Peter Mavericke 24 June", and in the suit of Peter Mavericke against William Champneys it is stated that in the lease in question "the three lives named by the said Peter were those of his son Nathaniel Mavericke and of Samuel and Elias, two of the sons of John Mavericke, son of the said Peter". These three statements are conclusive proof that Peter was eldest son to Robert 1 Mavericke and place Samuel, Elias, Moses, etc., as sons of John 2 Mavericke and grandsons of the said Peter 2 Mavericke.

JOHN ³ MAVERICKE (Peter ², Robert ¹), born in Awliscombe, Devon, England, baptised there 28 Dec. 1578, died at Dorchester, Mass., 3 Feb. 1635–6, being, according to Winthrop, "near sixty years of age". He married at Ilsington, Devon, 28 Oct. 1600, Mary Gye, who came with him to New England and was living as late as 9 Oct. 1666. In 1665, Col. Cartwright states that Mr. Samuel Maverick, his fellow commissioner, "hath his mother, wife, children & brothers living there", in Massachusetts. Samuel Maverick, writing from Rhode Island, 9 Oct. 1666, to Secretary Sir William Morrice says that his mother "presents her humble service".

John Maverick was matriculated at Exeter College, Oxford, 24 Oct. 1595, aged 18, being described as a clergyman's son. He received the degree of B.A., 8 July 1599 and that of M.A., 7 July 1603, having been already ordained at Exeter as deacon and priest 29 July 1597. He may have been curate to his uncle, Radford Mavericke, in Ilsington, since he was married there. On 30 Aug. 1615, he was inducted at Silverton, co. Devon, by William Cotton, Bishop of Exeter, to the rectory of Beaworthy, co. Devon, on the presentation of Arthur Arscott, Esq., patron of the living. He remained there until he resigned shortly before his emigration, his successor being inducted 24 Mar. 1629-30. In this month John Mavericke was chosen one of the teachers of the Puritan Church organized at Plymouth, England. He sailed the 20 Mar. 1629-30 from Plymouth on the "Mary and John", one of the ships of the fleet under John Winthrop, arrived in New England, 30 May 1630, and settled at Dorchester, Mass. He was made Freeman 18 May 1631, and remained the minister at Dorchester until his death.

MOSES ⁴ MAVERICK (John ³, Peter ², Robert ¹), born in England about 1611 (deposed in Sept. 1662, aged 50 years; in Nov. 1665, aged abt. 54 years; in Mar. 1667, aged abt. 55 years, etc.), died at Marblehead, Mass., 28 Jan. 1685–6; married before 6 May 1635, Remember Allerton, daughter of Isaac and Mary (Norris) Allerton, born in Leyden, Holland, before 1620, died after 1652 (p. 191). He married (2), 22 Oct. 1656, Eunice (———) Roberts, widow of Thomas Roberts, born about 1628, (deposed in 1671, aged abt. 43), living 5 Dec. 1698.

He probably came to America with his father, Rev. John Maverick, and settled at Dorchester, Mass., where he was a proprietor in 1633. He removed to Salem, Mass., and was admitted a Freeman there, 3 Sept. 1634. He was at Marblehead by 1635; a proprietor there in 1637 and constable in 1643. He was licensed as an Innkeeper for many years and apparently was clerk of the Court as he signed many papers "for the court", this may have been because he was Clerk of the Writts (i. e., town clerk), he having been appointed to that office in 1664. He was made a "Commissioner to end small causes" in 1656, and was appointed to marry and take testimony in civil cases in 1658. He also served on the trial jury and the grand jury, while in 1674 he was made a selectman. In 1636 he paid to the General Court, the rent for Noddle's Island (now East Boston), having charge of his brother Samuel's affairs while the latter was in Virginia.

He made his Will, Jan. 1685-6, but did not sign it, and on its presentation at Court by the widow, Eunice, 30 Mar. 1686, some of his children objected to its provisions and it was referred to the next Court. Apparently, the Will was not allowed, for, 15 July 1686, Eunice, the widow, was appointed in Boston, administratrix of the estate of "Moses Maverick late of Marblehead deceased Intestate". In 1691 and 1693, Edward Woodman, son-in-law of Moses Mavericke, petitioned that the widow should make an accounting of her administration but final settlement of the estate was not made until 29 Nov. 1698. Among the documents on file in Salem in connection with his estate is the appointment, 22 Sept. 1693, of Edward Woodman, as guardian of his children, Remember and John, to receive their share of their grandfather Maverick's estate. The back of the paper is endorsed: "Daughters of Moses & Rember Maverick. Abigail Wards Children Eliza Skinner Remember Woodmⁿ dec^d her Child. Mary Ferguson Sarah Norman".

The unsigned Will of Moses Maverick was as follows:

* "I Moses Maverick being weak in body, but of sound memory . . declare ys as my last will & Testament. . . . Item I give & bequeath to my dear wife Eunice all my household goods & utensills of wt kind, nature quality or condition soever, to her owne proper behoof, thereof & there with to do, use, or dispose of att her owne will & pleasure: And ffurthermore my will is, that the whole remainder of my estate . . . abide and remain in the hands of my wife . . . during the whole te(r)me of her naturall life. Item after the decease of my wife my will is, yt ye whole estate then left be thus disposed of. I doe out of ye same give & bequeath to Moses Hawkes ve only surviving child of my daughter Rebecca deceased five pounds. Item to the four children of my daughter Abigail deceased, vizt Sam11: Ward, Abigail Hinds, Mary Dallibar & Martha Ward I bequeath five pounds aps to each of them: The rest of my estate whatever I give & bequeath to my four daughters, vizt Eliz: Skinner, Rememb Woodman, Mary fferguson & Sarah Norman to be equally divided among them. . . . I constitute my dear wife Eunice, Executrix of y's will, & in all emergent difficulties my sonne in Law Archebald ffurgeson Executor, & my loving ffreinds Sam¹¹: Cheever & Ambrose Gale Overseers of ye execution of ye same; And I do also by these ratify & confirme the bills of sale made to my two daughters Mary & Sarah for ye land & housing where they now dwell paying the Rent conditioned for to my wife during her life, and in witness . . . have hereunto sett my hand & seal this - day of January: Anno Dom: 1685"

No signature.

Administration on his estate granted to widow Eunice Maverick, who gave bonds with Anthony Checkley and John Waite of Boston, 15 July 1686.

"The Humble Petition of Edward Woodman Sen^r of Boston who Married Remember Maverick Daughter of Moses Maverick Late of Marblehead in Behalf of his Seven Children of his said Remember his Wife" was presented 29 Sept. 1691.

On the 22 Sept. 1693, "Remember Woodman, aged about Twenty yeares, and John Woodman aged about seventeen yeares Children of Mr Edward Woodman late of Marblehead", chose their said father for their guardian to handle the estate left them by their grandfather, Mr. Moses Maverick, dec'd.

The final agreement of the heirs was as follows:

"Know all men by these presents, that whereas some years since our honoured ffather mr Moses Maverick of Marble-head deceased Intestate, and Administration of the estate amounting by Inventory to the value of three hundred forty two pounds & 19⁸ was committed

to his Relict widdow Eunice Maverick, for the discharging of the Debts ffunerall charges &c due from the sd estate, and ffinding most, if not all cleared and paid, and designing an amicable agreement may be kept and maintained amongst the children and such as Legally represent them, to whom any part of what is left may belong, as also a creditable and comfortable maintenance for his aboves^d Relict Widdow and finding the housing much decayed and in a ruinous condition, We whose names are here subscribed, being all the children and grand-children of the sd Moses Maverick, and capable legally to act, and named as follows, Archebald flurguson Trustee for and in behalfe of his children by Mary his wife deceased; John Norman husband to Sarah the onely surviving daughter of the sd Maverick, & Moses Hawks the onely son of Rebecca the eldest daughter deceased for himselfe, and in behalfe also of Wm Hughes & Thomas Jackson marryed to Elizabeth and Priscilla Grafton, children of Elizabeth Grafton deceased, and by their Order impowred in this affair; Samuel Ward in behalfe of himselfe and his two sisters living and the children of his third and fourth sister deceased, descending ffrom Abigail Ward deceased; and Thomas Perkins marryed to Remember Woodman in behalfe of himselfe and all the Bretheren, children of Remember Woodman deceased; We above named doe consent, and mutually agree, that for the Ends abovesd, The whole estate now left, both Reall and personall, any of which may of right belong to us, be sold, and converted into money . . . the third part of the sd money be given freely to our honored aged mother Eunice Maverick, for her comfortable maintenance . . . and that the other two thirds be divided equally into six equal parts and the persons above named may have and enjoy the same equally . . . 29th of Novemb according to their degree of Relation. Anno Dom 1698.

ELIZABETH ⁵ MAVERICK (Moses ⁴, John ³, Peter ², Robert ¹), born in Marblehead, baptised there 30 Sept. 1649, died between 17 Nov. 1687 and 25 June 1695, probably in Boston, Mass.; married (1), in Marblehead, 6 Apr. 1665, NATHANIEL GRAFTON, who died at Barbadoes, 11 Feb. 1671. Mr. Nathaniel Grafton dying intestate, Elizabeth the relict brought in an inventory and was appointed administratrix. The Court ordered that she should bring up the children until they come of age, when they should receive 45¹¹ each, the house and land to be security.

ALLERTON

ISAAC ALLERTON, a young tailor from London, was married in the Stadhuis, Leyden, Holland, 4 Nov. 1611, to Mary Norris, a maid from Newbury, co. Berks, England. At the same time and place his sister, Sarah (Allerton) Vincent, widow of John Vincent of London, was married to Degory Priest, a hatter, also from London.

Allerton was made a Freeman in Leyden, 7 Feb. 1614. In 1620 he came on the "Mayflower" to Plymouth, New England. William Bradford in his list of the "Mayflower" passengers, mentions, "mr Isaac Allerton and Mary. his wife; with 3. children Bartholomew Remember & Mary. and a servant boy, John Hooke". John Allerton, a sailor who designed settling in the new Colony, died before the vessel sailed on her return. Whether or not he was any relative to Isaac is unknown.

Mrs. Mary (Norris) Allerton died on 25 Feb. 1621, of the illness which carried off over half of the "Mayflower's" company during the dreadful first winter. About 1626, Allerton re-married to Fear Brewster, the daughter of Elder William Brewster. She died 12 Dec. 1634. He married (3), before 1644, a wife Johanna. He settled in New Haven where he began trading with the Dutch, and on 20 Jan. 1642, sold his ship "Hope" to Govert Loockermans of New Amsterdam. The following year with Loockermans he had a grant of land in New Amsterdam on the Great Highway. He evidently resided there for some time but after 1647 and before 1651 he returned to New Haven. In 1654 he made a voyage to Virginia.

His inventory was presented in the New Haven Court, 5 Apr. 1659, his son Isaac being away at the time. After his return he produced his father's Will on 5 July 1659, and was appointed to settle the estate, but for some reason and in spite of the fact that the Court tried to have him keep it, he being "the deceaseds eldest or onely son" relinquished the trust. He purchased his father's house from the creditors and by deed of 4 Oct. 1660, conveyed a life interest in it to his step-mother, with remainder to his daughter Elizabeth. Mrs. Johanna Allerton died in 1682.

ELLIS

Among the early settlers of Dedham, Mass., were a number of persons by the name of Ellis. They were probably all related, but were unlikely to have been brothers and sisters. From the fragmentary data existing it seems probable that a widow Ellis, with two sons, Richard and Joseph, married Lambert Genery (or Chenery) and came to this country. It is quite possible that John, Thomas and Ann Ellis, also early settlers of Dedham, may have been her children or her step-children, but there is no proof of it.

*Lambert Genery signed the Dedham Covenant in 1636, as did also John Ellice, Richard Ellice and Joseph Ellice. In the list of admis-

sions to the church there are the following:

The wife of Goodman Genery, 4 Dec. 1640.

John Ellis, 1640.

"Ruth ye wife of brother Joseph Ellis" was received into Full Communion, 12 Feb. 1664, "she being ye daughter of or brother John Morse".

John Ellis married in Dedham, Mass., 10 Nov. 1641, Susan Lumber. She died 5 Apr. 1653, in Medfield, and he married (2), Joan, widow of John Clapp (p. 230) of Dorchester. He lived in Medfield, until his death, 2 Apr. 1697. Children (Ellis), John; Hannah; Samuel; Joseph.

Ann Ellis, married in Dedham, Mass., 19 Sept. 1638, Edward Culver; they had children (Culver), John; Joshua; Samuel; and Joseph; removed to Roxbury and thence to New London.

Thomas Ellis, married, 21 May 1659, Mary Wight of Dedham; they had children (Ellis), Mary; Abiel; Samuel; Thomas; Patience; Ruth; Thomas; Joanna; Juda.

Widow Ellis married (1) before 1620 ——— Ellis, and (2), probably before 1633, Lambert Genery. She died before 14 May 1658.

* Lambert Genery is said to have been first at Watertown and if so was in this country before 1636, for in that year we find him a signer of the Dedham Covenant. He married first, a widow Ellis, by whom he had two sons, John and Isaac Genery. She died before 14 May 1658, for on that date he married, second, Thamzin Hewes by whom he had, Mary Genery, born in Dedham, 24 Dec. 1659. He was born 1593, and died in Dedham 30 Jan. 1673-4. He deposed aged eighty years, 17 June 1673. He was admitted a Freeman in Dedham in May 1645 and served the town as constable in 1658-9. He made his Will 17 Feb. 1673, proved 4 Feb. 1674, mentions son John Genery; Isaac Genery; daughter Mary; son-in-law Richard Ellis, and daughter-in-law Ruth Ellis, widow; and gives to church in Dedham.

Richard Ellis presumably came to this country with his mother and step-father, Lambert Genery, and was a resident of Dedham by 1636. He was a wheelwright by trade but was a man of good education, as was also his younger brother Joseph, who served Dedham as its schoolmaster for a number of years. He was made sergeant of the military company of Dedham in 1659, holding this office until after 1683 when he became lieutenant. In 1659 he was a woodreeve, in 1660 served on a committee with Lieut. Fisher to treat with the Indians and later was on many other important committees. On 8 June 1692, he was made a deputy to the Massachusetts General Court. In 1671 Richard Ellis, in behalf of himself and Isaac Genery, notified the town of their hope of having found a copper mine.

Administration on his estate was granted to his widow, Elizabeth, and to John Ellis, his eldest son, 27 Dec. 1694, and the account of John Ellis, surviving administrator of his father, Richard Ellis, was filed 16 Sept. 1697. (Suffolk Probate, 3: 516; 11: 339.)

He was an innholder and wheelwright.

William Ellis of Dedham, yeoman, made his Will, 25 Mar. 1770, proved, 10 July 1778. He gave to son William Ellis; son John Ellis; daughters, Abigail Burt; Elizabeth Ellis; Hannah Bullard; Mehetabel Coney; Sarah Morse; and Deliverance Morse. (Suffolk Probate, 77: 181.)

WILLIAM FRENCH, who settled early in Cambridge, came in the boat with Harlakenden and Shepard. In the list of people who sailed "iiij July 1635, In the Defence de Lond . . . " are

He had a brother, John French, who also came to this country. John French had by a wife Joanna; John, born about 1635; Sarah, born Oct. 1637; Joseph, born 4 Apr. 1640; Nathaniel, born 7 June 1643. John French was a tailor. He was buried 16 Feb. 1645-6, and his wife Joanna was buried 20 Jan. 1645-6, in Cambridge.

On the 2 of April 1650, the Court granted "W^m ffrench right and power of administration upon the estate of his Bro: Jno ffrench deceased and doe confirme and allow of his disposall of the children". Oct. 6, 1657, "Leift W^m ffrench attested upon oath to his Bro: Jno ffrenches Inventory". In the account he renders the Court is the following: "pad more for placeing Forth of ye children: For Youngest beeing 3 yeares old to mr sparhauke", "Joseph to gooman for skooling", "for Cloathes for John in his placing to Tho brookes", "for Sarah placing her wth Bro: Fessenden". "Lieut. William ffrench appearing before the County Court at Cambridge, octo 1657," swore to the above account.

William French removed to Billerica in 1652 where he bought part of the Dudley Farm and had his house near that Ralph Hill who called him "brother" in his Will. He married in England about 16xx, Elizabeth, who was born in 1603, and died in Billerica 31 Mar. 1667-8, aged sixty-four years. He married (2), in Billerica, 6 May 1669, Mary (Lothrop) Stearns, daughter of Thomas and Mary Lothrop and widow of John Stearns, born in Barnstable, Mass., 4 Oct. 1640, living in 1735, "very aged". She married (1), Dec. 1656, John Stearns, who died 5 Mar. 1668-9 in Billerica. She married (3), 29 June 1687, Isaac Mixer of Watertown.

William French was lieutenant of the Billerica company for many years, being made so in 1647. He served Billerica as its deputy to

the Massachusetts General Court in 1660, 1663, 1664. He was born in 1605, according to his age on emigrating and his age at death, and so was thirty-five years older than his second wife. It seems probable that at the time of his marriage to her it was arranged that only her children by him should inherit his property for they are the only ones mentioned in its final disposition. The children given here are the ones credited to him, but it seems possible that the Sarah and John given in the list might have been the children of John French.

Lieut. William French died in Billerica, 20 Nov. 1681, aged seventyeight. The following petition was presented to the Court, 21 Dec.

1680:

"To the Honored County Court siting at Charlstowne the 21: of december 1680: the humbell petion of us whoe are the subscribers doe humbely shew that wheras our father John Sternes of Billerica now desesed: did leave us a small estat which is in housing and lands: and the housing and fenses being much decayed and in hazerd to be lost if speedy Caer be not taken to prevent it: it being left in the hands of our honered father in-law Leftenant french and our mouther: being administratrix to ye estat of our honored father John Sternes now desesed: our humbell request to this Honored Court is that they would be pleased to apoint a comity to devid that estat that soe such of the chilldern as are of adg may take kear to preserve theyre owne and that ther might be some meet person or persons apoynted to take caer of that which belongeth to such of the childern as are not yet of adg."

"Request of Selectmen of Billerica for the Court to take into consideration the condition of the family of one Lt. W^m ffrench; &c. Billerica, 18-10-1680."

"The Court being informed that Lt. W^m French of Billerica is by God's hand thorow impotency & weakness unfit to governe his Domestick conc^rnes At the request of his friend Deacon Tompson & his sonne Jacob ffrench are impowrd to assist his wife in the ordering & disposeing of his estate, so as may best conduce for the supply of the family 21 Dec. 1680."

The estate of Lt. William French of Billerica, who deceased the 20-9m-1681, amounting to £182-4-0, was divided, one third part to the widow and the remaining two thirds to the three children. To Mary French, now Sharpe; to Sarah French; to Hannah French. 20 Aug. 1722, Sarah Crosby, Mary Dunklen, and Hannah Child, receipt for their shares. The widow received £20 due her from her first husband's estate.

FISHER

THOMAS FISHER, of Winston, Suffolk, England, with wife ELIZABETH, was in Cambridge in 1634. He was made Freeman, 4 Mar. 1635, and removed to Dedham in 1637 where he was given a house lot, 28 July 1637. He died 10 Aug. 1638, while engaged in building the meeting house. After his death, his wife obtained permission to sell half of her lot "for the bringing up of the children". She was admitted to the church, 21 Aug. 1640, and died 31 Jan. 1652. The Rev. John Allen in his Will gave to his near kinsman, Samuel Fisher, his land at Wrentham, but just how he was related is not known.

SAMUEL ² FISHER (*Thomas* ¹), born probably about 1634, died in Wrentham, Mass., 5 Jan. 1702–3; "Samuel Fisher & Milcha Snow, dau. Thomas Snow of Boston were married 22nd March by John Endicott Gov.", 1659. She was born in Boston 30 Sept. 1638 and baptised in the First Church, aged about three years, 12 Sept. 1641, and died in Wrentham, 15 Mar. 1709–10 (p. 200).

The Dedham Church Records give:

"Samuell Fisher was received to full co'munion in all ye ordinances & his wife to ye co'munion of this church 31d 11m 63."

"Samuell ye sone & ——— daughter of ye said Samuell Fisher & his wife were baptised 28d 12m 1663."

"Millatiah, ye daughter of our brother Samuell Fisher was baptised ye 5^{day} 3^m 1667."

He settled in Wrentham even before it became a town and was deacon of the church there many years.

He made a very peculiar will which is recorded in the Suffolk County Registry:

"The Last Will and Testament of Samuel Fisher.

"My Deer Wife and Children I am now speaking my last to you which to me is Awful and I hope will be to you of Searious consideration, I know not yo day of my death therefore it behoveth me in each respect to be for

my great and last Change preparing, That I may lay in Store a good Foundation for the life to come. . . . Now concerning my Worldly . . . estate . . . I dispose . . . as followeth. . . . I leave my house and tillable Lands together wth what cows may Be reserved and moveables . . . to my Well beloved Wife Meletiah Fisher for her Supply during yo time of her Widdowhood . . . I give . . . to son Samuel provided he allows his mother the benefit of the premises during her life and that he pays to his sister Hannah George . . . and to his sister Elizabeth Ellis. . . . I give to my Son Ebenezer . . . I give to my daughter Meletiah Metcalfe. . . . I give to my daughter Abigail Farrington . .

"Thus I have divided my lands amongst my children, now concerning the rest of my estate That remains after my Wives decease to be equally divided amongst my children. Thus I leave my Fatherless children with the Lord and Lett my Widow trust in Jehovah with whom is Everlasting Strength and Righteousness, Amen so be it. That this is my last Will and Testam^t Witness my hand and Seale May the 22^d Anno Dni 1702.

SNOW

THOMAS SNOW, a barber, appeared early in Boston, Mass., where he was admitted to the church 5 Sept. 1644, having been made a Freeman 18 May 1642. He died during the winter of 1668-9. On the 16 Dec. 1667, with his wife "MILCHA", he mortgaged his house in Boston, to which was fixed the sign of the Dove. He made his Will 10 Nov. 1668, proved 28 Apr. 1669. He left his property to his wife "Milcah", she to dispose of the estate among his children. The widow married (2), William Wright, and in 1672, they sold Thomas Snow's pasture. She died intestate before 2 Aug. 1678, and the estate was divided among the heirs who were, Samuel Snow; Mehetabel Snow; Meletiah, wife of Samuel Fisher; Abigail, wife of William Wright, Jr.

MILLETT

THOMAS MILLETT was born in England in 1605. He came to New England in 1635, "In the Elizabeth de Lo: W^m Stagg master theis underwritten names brought Cert: from the minister of St. Saviors Southwark of their conformation,

Tho: Millett 30 Ursula Grenoway 32.

Maria Millet uxor 29 Tho: Millet ae 2."

He settled first at Dorchester, where his wife's father was living, and appears, with his wife, as a member of the church there, 26 Aug. 1636. He lived in Dorchester, until about 1655, when he bought land in Gloucester of William Perkins, removed there and became a Ruling Elder in the church. In 1657, he sued William Stephens for withholding a list of names of those who had pledged money for his support as Elder, he having received a call to preach there and knowing an amount of money had been subscribed to pay him for his labors. He served on the Jury of Tryalls in 1659. In 1663, the town again raised money to pay him for his work in the public ministry. He served on a coroner's jury in 1673. 3 June 1675, having removed to Brookfield, Mass., he sold land in Gloucester to Francis Norwood.

He married in England about 1632, Mary Greenoway, daughter of John and Mary Greenoway, born in England in 1606, died 27 Sept. 1682 (p. 205). He died in Brookfield, in 1676. The inventory of his estate, amounting to £128, was taken 23 Sept. 1676 and presented in the Ipswich Court, 26 Sept. 1676, by the widow Mary Millett. Agreement for division of the estate was made after her death, 27 Sept. 1682, between Thomas Millett, Nathaniel Millett, Sarah widow of John Millett, who was to have £12 "for the tending of their mother Mary Millett lately deceased"; Thomas Riggs and Isaac Elwell.

NATHANIEL ² MILLET (*Thomas* ¹), born in Dorchester, Mass., in 1647, died in Gloucester, Mass., 9 Nov. 1719, aged seventy-two years; married in Gloucester, ³ May 1670, Anne Lister, daughter of Andrew and Barberie Lister, born in Gloucester, ²⁴ Mar. 1651–², died in Gloucester, Mass., 9 Mar. 1718, aged sixty-six years (p. 206).

Nathaniel Millet resided all his life in Gloucester. 9 Nov. 1674, he sold the house and land on Town Neck which his father had given him and removed to the other side of Annisquam River, when he received a grant of land at Stony Cove. In 1699, he sold the property at Stony Cove, and settled at Kettle Cove where he spent the remainder of his life. The land at Kettle Cove, granted him in 1700, was not to be alienated from the family so long as any of them survived.

Thomas Millett and another man "were drowned at Presumpscot by the damming of the ice; raising an head of water in the night while they were asleep", or, as another authority has it, "by a land flood overflowing ye cottage, and carrying of it away".

GREENAWAY

JOHN GREENAWAY, a millwright, was an early settler of Dorchester, Mass. He probably came in the "Mary and John", in 1630. He applied to be made Freeman 19 Oct. 1630 and was made one, 18 May 1631. He was one of twenty men chosen by the town of Dorchester to manage its affairs in 1637. He left no Will but in 1651-2 deeded land to his daughters. He died shortly after. His wife was named Mary; she died in Dorchester, 23 Jan. 1658-9.

Suffolk Deeds, 1: 199:

"John Greeneaway of dorchester in New England milwright sendeth greeting, wheras Vrsula Greeneaway the daughter of the said John Greeneaway hath alwayes ben an obedient, loving dutiful and faithful daughter and servant vnto her aged father & mother, the said John Greeneaway and his wife & more especially in their weakeness and old age which is now Come vppon them . . . me, the said John Greeneaway . . . as a reward and Requittal vnto my said daughter Vrsula . . . as also in Consideration of her future maintenance. . . . Hath Given . . . unto the said Vrsula . . . all that . . . parte of my dwelling howse that lyes at the southwest end . . . during the life of the said John Greeneaway and Mary Greeneaway his wife . . . and (other property). To have and to hold all . . . after the death of the said John Greeneaway and Mary Greeneaway for euer [If Vrsula have no children, the premises after her decease . . .] unto my kinsman & servant Thomas millett the son of Thomas & mary Millett my sonne in Laue & daughter . . . he paying . . . vnto my daughter Ann Pearse & hir children . . . my daughter elizabeth Allen and hir children . . . to my daughter mary millett & hir other children . . . to my daughter susanna wales & hir children, if shee have any; . . . to my daughter Katherine daniell & hir children. . . . If the said Thomas millett die before he Come to enjoy the same & not have heires of his body Then his brother John Millett or other sonne of Thomas millett the father shall have the said prmisses . . . " Signed "the fifth day of the twelf month annoj domi 1650."

"I John Greeneaway of dorchester . . . for diverse good Causes and Considerations . . . and especially for the great love and fatherly Affecon that I beare vnto my sonne in law Robert Pearse and Ann Pearse my daughter now wife of the said Robt Pearse hath given unto the said Robert Pearse & Ann his wife all that my land . . . in the Pine necke . . . in dorchester . . . during their lives . . . and After their decease to Thomas Pearse, the only sonne of the said Robert and Anne . . . and if . . . Thomas . . . dye wthout Issue then . . . to Mary Pearse

and Sarah Pearse daughters of the said Robert and Ann equally to be divided . . . first of the twelf month 1650."

"This deed made . . . tenth day of the sixth month, Betweene John Greeneaway of dorchester in New England millwright . . . and william daniell & katherine his wife the daughter of the said John Greeneway witnesseth that the said John Greeneaway . . . in Consideration of the greate love & fatherlie Affection he hath unto the said william & katherine his sonne in law & daughter . . . doe give . . . all his . . . Right . . . in the Comons."

LISTER

ANDREW LISTER (Lyster or Lester), birth unknown, died in New London, Conn., 7 June 1669; married before 1642, BARBERIE —, who died in New London, 2 Feb. 1654. He married (2), JOANNA, widow of Robert Hempstead, after June 1655, the date of Robert Hempstead's death. He is credited with a third wife ANNA, who married, after his death, Isaac Willey, and died in 1692, but the name of Joanna and Anna are so often used interchangeably that it is possible that he only had two wives.

Andrew Lister was in Gloucester before 1642. He served the town as constable in 1646, and was licensed as an innholder in 1648. In 1649, Samuel Doliber of Marblehead sued Andrew Lister and the following letter was filed in Court. It is dated "Gloster, 10:8:1649", and is written by Andrew Lister:

"Samuel Daullouer my loue remembrd unto you this is to intreat you to send me word what you would have me to due aboute that I am to peay you for the cow that I bought of you I intreate you to send me word if you will tack it by a bill to mester Russell or to any marchant else and to send word by the first opetunity you can for I thincke . . . to fear it is my time to peay you now and so I reste yours in what I meay."

In 1650, he sold all his property in Gloucester and removed to New London, grants of land in that town having been made to a number of the men of Gloucester. In 1652, he was associated with Mr. Denison, Hugh Calkins, and John Elderkin in an attempt to drain the marshes. He resided on the neck and in 1664 was taxed on £170, being one of thirteen men in New London who had estates over £150 in value.

BATCHELDER

The Batchelder family of Essex County, Mass., finds its origin in three brothers, who came from the county of Kent, England, in 1637. The family lived in the vicinity of Canterbury for some decades, at least, before their emigration. The Canterbury Marriage Licenses give the following:

"Mark Bacheler of Minster in Thanet, yeoman, & Mary Fantinge,

of St. John's in Thanet, widow, at St. John's, 30 Oct. 1598."

"John Bacheler, of Minster in Thanet & Mary Stonehouse, of Chartham, widow, 17 Oct. 1595."

"Christopher Bacheler, of St. George's, Canterbury & Ann Deall,

of Teynham, maiden, 4 May 1586."

Anthony Bacheler, son of Christofer Bacheler, was baptised at St. George's, 17 June 1587.

Abigail Bacheler, daughter of Samuel Bacheler, Minister and Curate

of Denton, was baptised 12 Sept. 1617, at St. George's.

At St. Paul's, Canterbury, is recorded, 28 Aug. 1597, the baptism of

William, son of Cristopher Bacheler.

The Visitation of Kent, 1619, gives the marriage of Catharine, daughter of Christopher Bacheler of the city of Canterbury to Edward Kemp of Dover. The Marriage Licenses give, John Kemp of Dover & Catharine Bacheler of St. M. Bredin's, Canterbury, maiden, at Bridge, 21 July 1611.

It is quite probable that Mark and Mary (Fantinge) Bacheler, licensed to marry in 1598, were the parents of the three who came to

New England. They were:

Account of the administration on the estate of Henry Batchelder of Ipswich, deceased, intestate, is filed in the Essex County court. The widow had evidently been insane for some years after his death. He left no children and his nearest of kin were his brothers' children, as follows: the children of Joseph Batchelder who died before the intestate,

John, Elizabeth, and Hannah Batchelder; the children of John Batchelder who outlived ye uncle, John Batchelder, Joshua Batchelder and Hannah Batchelder; the children of Joseph Batchelder who are dead since their uncle died, Hannah Batchelder, alias Warner, who left children; the children of John Batchelder, deceased since the death of the uncle, John, and Josh Batchelder who left children. Distribution to John, Elizabeth, Hannah, children of Joseph Batchelder, deceased, brother to Henry, deceased; to John, Joseph and Hannah, children of John Batchelder deceased, brother to Henry, deceased. There is no date to this account but it was probably filed in 1696. The widow had been dead nearly ten years.

JOSEPH ² BATCHELDER, born probably on the Isle of Thanet, Kent, England, but perhaps at Canterbury, in 1604, died about 1647, in Wenham, Mass.; was licensed to be married as follows: "Joseph Batcheler of St. George's Canterbury, taylor, bachelor, aged 24 and upward and Elizabeth Dickinson, same parish, maiden, aged about 15, daughter of Susan Dickinson, same parish, widow, who consents as is testified by Richard Myles at Canterbury, Carpenter. At Thanington, 22 Sept. 1628. Elizabeth Dickinson was baptised at St. George's, 10 Apr. 1614." She was daughter of Robert and Susan (Kene) Dickinson, and died in Wenham, probably about 1657.

Robert Dickinson was chief warden of St. George's, Canterbury, and was buried 20 Apr. 1627. He married 22 Oct. 1611, Susan Kene, who was his widow in 1628. Their children were (1), Elizabeth, baptised 10 Apr. 1614; (2), Matthew, baptised 15 Sept. 1622; (3),

Peter, baptised 11 June 1626.

In a list of "persons who have taken passage from the town and port of Sandwich for the American Plantations, 9 June 1637", is found, "Joseph Bacheler, of Canterbury, taylor, Elizabeth his wife, one child and three servants". He was accompanied also by his brothers, Henry and John. He settled at Salem, Mass., where he was made Freeman, 16 Mar. 1638. He served as deputy in 1643. Besides his own property he brought with him stock and goods of a Henry Paramour of the Isle of Thanet, which he was to invest and sell and the proceeds of which he was to return to Paramour. Before he had a chance to do so, James Brocke, of Ratcliffe, mariner sued him for the goods entrusted to his care by Henry Paramour, in Apr. 1637 (Lechford), but the Court settled the case by allowing Joseph Batchelder a certain amount for his services and returning the rest to Henry Paramour, Gentleman, of the Isle of Thanet in Kent.

An inventory of his estate was taken 30 Mar. 1656-7 and states that Joseph Batchelder deceased about ten years ago. Administration on his estate was granted 31 Mar. 1656-7 to his son "Marke Bachelour". Mark brought into court, 1 July 1657, an inventory of his father's and mother's estates, amounting to £84 4d. It was ordered to be paid to his brother John, under twenty-one and his sisters, Elizabeth and Hannah, under eighteen.

ELIZABETH ⁴ BATCHELDER (John ³, Joseph ², —— ¹), baptised in Wenham, Mass., about 1674, died in Gloucester, Mass., 27 Mar. 1713; married in Gloucester, 18 June 1696, Thomas Millett (p. 202).

GOODALE

ROBERT GOODALE was born in England in 1604, died in Salem, Mass., between 12 Oct. 1682 and 27 June 1683, married about 1629 KATHARINE ————, born in 1606, died before 1668. He married (2), MARGARET ————.

Robert Goodale with his family sailed in the "Elizabeth" of Ipswich, the last of April 1634 and appears in the shipping list of that vessel as follows:

"Robert Goodall aged 30 aged 28."

"Robert Goodale Mary Goodale aged 4
Abraham Goodale aged 2

Isaake Goodale aged halfe a yeare"

He settled at Salem, Mass., where he was a proprietor by 1636. In 1668, he deeded land to his daughter Hannah Killum, and with wife Margaret he sold land adjoining. In 1672, there was a case in the Essex County Court which proves up various relationships in the family. A certain John Smith married a daughter of Robert Goodale, probably the eldest daughter, Mary. Zachariah, a son of Goodale, married Elizabeth Beacham, daughter of Edward Beacham. Elizabeth calls, in testimony, John Smith her "brother" and her "brotherin-law". Patience Goodale (wife of Isaac) and Hannah Killum call Elizabeth their "sister", etc.

Robert Goodale made his Will "aged", 12 Oct. 1682, proved 27 June 1683. He gives to wife, to daughter Elizabeth Bennett, to grand-child John Smith. The widow Margaret deposed in Court. He had evidently provided for his other children before.

SHERMAN

WILLIAM SHERMAN, the progenitor of the Shermans of Plymouth County, was in Plymouth before 1632. He probably came over in 1629, for in that year the Company in London gave liberty to William Sherman to bring in his kine from Northampton in fourteen days from Feb. 26, probably to be embarqued in the fleet with Higginson. He had lands granted to him at Green Harbor, in 1640. He married, in Plymouth, 21 Dec. 1638, PRUDENCE HILL, possibly sister of Ralph Hill, who apparently deceased before him. He left no Will, but in 1673, settled his real estate on his sons. His inventory was filed 30 Dec. 1680. He was buried at Marshfield, 25 Oct. 1679.

He apparently lived in Marshfield all his life. He made his Will, July 1712, proved 5 Feb. 1722, bequeathed to sons John and Samuel Sherman, land in Rochester; to son William Sherman, land in Marshfield; to grandchild, Joseph Lapham, his mother's share; to daughters, Bethia; Hannah; Deborah; Lois; and Eunice.

SAMUEL³ SHERMAN (John², William¹), born in Marshfield, Mass., 22 Feb. 1686, died in Rochester, Mass., 7 Sept. 1725, aged forty years; married about 1723, probably in Rochester, Charity Clapp, daughter of John and Dorcas (Earle) Clapp, born in Rochester, Mass., 18 Sept. 1701, died in Ware, Mass., 3 Apr. 1763 (p. 234). She married (2), in Rochester, 25 Sept. 1728, Stephen Andrews, son of Stephen and Bethia Andrews, born in Rochester, 5 July 1701, died before 1744. She married (3), in Rochester, 1 Jan. 1743–4, Joseph Thorpe, who died before 1749.

Charity Sherman, of Rochester, widow, was appointed administrator on the estate of her husband, Samuel Sherman, late of Rochester, deceased, 6 Oct. 1725. The inventory of his estate was taken 29 Sept. 1725 and amounted to £799-7-8. (Plymouth Co., Probate, 5: 93: 94.)

SAMUEL ⁴ SHERMAN (Samuel ³, John ², William ¹), born in Rochester, Mass., 3 Jan. 1724, died in Ware, Mass., 29 Jan. 1811, aged eighty-eight years; married (1), in Rochester, 20 Apr. 1749, Mary Snow, daughter of Prince and Mary (Sturtivant) Snow, born in Rochester, 30 Oct. 1729, died between 1753–1755. He married (2), in Brookfield, Mass., 8 June 1758, Jerusha Davis, daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Davis, born in Brookfield, 15 Feb. 1734–5, died in Ware, 6 Oct. 1798 (p. 245).

Samuel Sherman lived in Rochester until after 1753, when he re-

moved to Ware, Mass. He was a farmer. No will of his and no administration of his estate has been found. His gravestone in the Ware graveyard bears the following inscription:

"Mr. Samuel & Mrs Jerusha Sherman died as follows viz. Mr. Sherman died Jan. 29, 1811 in his 88th year Mrs Sherman died 6 Oct. 1798 in her 63^d year

Farewell our friends & children dear Devote your lives unto God's fear That you with him may always live This is the last advice we give."

Reuben Sherman resided all his life in Ware. At the age of eighteen he enlisted in the Army and served for three years. "Reuben Sherman of Ware. List of Men raised in the Continental Army from Capt. William Brakridge's (Breckenridge's) Co. 4th Hampshire Co. Regt. as returned by Lieut. Col. Ruggles Woodbridge, residence, Ware, enlisted for the town of Ware, enlistment 3 years; also, private, Capt. John Spurr's Co., Col. Thomas Nixon's 6th, (also given 5th) regt., Continental pay accounts from May 1, 1777 to Mar. 19, 1780. Reported discharged Mar. 19, 1780; also, same company and regiment, return of men who were in camp on or before Aug. 15, 1777 and who had not been absent subsequently except on furlough, etc., certified at Camp near Peekskill, Feb. 16, 1779, dated Highlands, enlisted Mar. 1, 1777, reported on command with Surveyor General; also, Capt. Spurr's (1st) Co., 6th Mass. Regt., Return for clothing delivered for the year 1780, receipt for said clothing dated Peekskill, Dec. 1779." (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, 14: 143.)

HATCH

The Hatch* family, from which the New England family descends, has lived for at least six centuries in Kent, England. The name is apparently derived from the Anglo-Saxon noun, haec, Middle English, hacche, later hatch, meaning a gate or wicket. When surnames first came into use, locations were frequently employed as the means of distinguishing two men of the same first name. As John living near the well would be called John at Well, and John, living by the Wood, John atte Wood. Later the prefix would be dropped or incorporated as a part of the name.

JOHN AT HECCHE, of Sellinge, co. Kent, England, probably was born about 1415, and died after 15 Nov. 1464. He had a wife Agnes living when he made his Will. He was undoubtedly descended from a family of Atte Hacches of the hundred of Calehill which contains the parishes of Charing and Westwell in which, contemporaneously with John, of Sellinge, were others of the name. He was probably a miller.

The Will of John at Hecche of Sellyng next Monks Horton, was made 15 Nov. 1464. My body to be buried in the churchyard of Selling. The residue of all my goods I give to Agnes my wife and Thomas my son; and I make them my executors. William Knight, John Parys, William Smyth, John Webbe, and William at Melle are the feoffees of my lands at Selling, by indenture dated 10 October 25 Henry VI [1446]. My woods upon my lands at Westwell and Charing to be sold to pay my debts and legacies. My feoffees to permit Agnes my wife, if she remain my widow to hold all my other lands and tenements until Thomas at hecche, my son, shall come to the age of twentyfour years, when he shall have one third of the lands. My son John to have a third of the lands when he shall come to the age of twentyfour years; and when my son William shall come to the age of twentyfour years, then my feoffees shall make over the lands to my three sons equally, forever, they paying to Agnes their mother 20s. a year during her life. If all my sons die before the age of twenty-four, then my wife Agnes shall have the lands for her life, and after her death they shall be sold and the money shall be employed to provide a

chantry priest to sing and pray in the church of Selling for the space of two years, the residue to be expended in charity for the poor of Selling and for the souls of my father and mother and all the faithful departed. If my wife shall marry before the said Thomas, John, and William reach their full ages my feoffees shall allow her 20s. a year and shall use the remainder of the profits of my lands for my sons and for the repair of my messuages and mills. To each of my feoffees for their pains 6s. 8d. (Archdeaconry of Canterbury, vol. 1, fo. 5.) There is no record of probate and no witnesses.

THOMAS ² AT HECCHE (John ¹), of Sellinge, co. Kent, must have been born about 1442, as he was at least twenty-one in 1464, when his father appointed him one of his executors, but was then under twenty-four. In some of the counties of England, it frequently happened that a minor was appointed executor, but this was never the custom in Kent. No will or administration of his has been found. He inherited a portion of his father's lands in Sellinge, married and became the father of a son Thomas. If it were not for the fact that minor executors are unknown in Kent, it might be that this Thomas was born much later, about 1458, and was himself the "Thomas the elder" whom the pedigree estimates to have been born about 1465 and to have been a son of Thomas born about 1442.

THOMAS ³ HACHE (*Thomas* ², *John* ¹), of Sellinge, co. Kent, was born probably about 1465. He held the manor of Hodyford, was assessed as "Thomas Hatche the elder" in the hundred of Street, in the subsidy of 1524, and died between 12 Dec. 1530 and 31 Dec. 1534. His wife's name is not known, but was possibly Agnes. He had at least six children.

The Will of Thomas Hache the elder of Sellyng besides Horton Monkyn, co. Kent, 12 Dec. 1530: To be buried in the churchyard of Sellynge. To every godchild 6d. To Thomas Hache, son of John and Elioner Hache, 40s., 20s. at the age of twenty-four and 20s. at the age of twenty-five to be paid by my son John. If the said Thomas die within age without heirs then it is to be paid to his sister Agnes, and if she died within age without heirs, reversion to my son John. To my son John, my best brass pot. To my daughters Agnes, Margarete, and Alice 6s. 8d. apiece. To my son William all debts he owes me and two silver spoons and to his daughter Agnes Hache 6s. 8d.

To Agnes, daughter of John Hache the elder my son, now dead, 6s. 8d. To Thomas Hache, John Hache the younger, Johane Hache, Agnes Hache, and Alice Hache, sons and daughters of John Hache, 6s. 8d. apiece. Residuary legatee and executor: son John Hache. Witnesses: Sir Robert Yong, vicar of Sellyng, William Harte, John

Knyght, William Hache, and John Smythe.

My last Will regarding my lands. To William Hache my son my manor of Hodyford and all those parcels of land, viz., Hodyford Broke lying in three parcels, a parcel called Horselife, one called Hodyford grove . . . etc. To my son John Hache my new house with the lands thereto belonging and all my other lands and tenements in Sellyng, he paying therefor to Thomas Hache, son of John Hache late of Sellyng, deceased, 40 marks as before specified. Proved 31 December 1534 by the executor, John Hache.

JOHN ⁴ HATCHE THE YOUNGER (*Thomas* ³, *Thomas* ², *John* ¹,) born probably about 1495, died in Sellinge, between 13 Apr. 1535 and 26 Apr. 1536. His wife, whose name is unknown is mentioned in his Will. He succeeded to lands and tenements in Sellinge including a "new house" which in the following year he devised to his three sons.

The Will of John Hatche of Sellynge besids Horton Monks, co. Kent, 13 Apr. 1535: To be buried in the churchyard at Sellynge.

. . To every godchild 12d. To every of my children two ewes. To my wife two kine, two hogs, six ewes, and half my household stuff. The residue of my goods to be sold to pay my debts and legacies by my executors, my wife and Thomas Marchall, to whom I give 6s. 8d. apiece. To John Marchall 3s. 4d. to help my wife with the writings. Witnesses: Thomas Dylnott the younger, Robert Cavell and Richard Hempsted.

My last will regarding my lands. A piece of land called Mewlyng and my mill beside Hythe to be sold, and the money, and also £9. 20d. which Thomas Dylnott owes me, to be used to pay my debts and legacies. Hodyforth mill and half the meadow to be put to farm and the money used for the same purpose. My sons Thomas, John, and Stephen to enter into my new house and lands at their ages of twenty years. My wife to have the other half of the meadow by the names

of Lytle Somerlies, greate Somerles, and Rayfelde until my children be twenty years of age, giving to each his share as he attains that age. To her also for life the house and lands at Somerfield, with reversion at her death to my children. If all my sons died under age, reversion to my daughters, the lands being equally divided. To each daughter 40s. at marriage. If all my children die, the money to be used to have an obit kept for twenty years, and the lands to be sold and the money to go to my brothers and their heirs. To Thomas Hatche, son of John Hatche the elder, 13s. 4d. Overseer, Maister Hayman, to who I give 6s. 8d. Proved 26 April 1536. (Archdeaconry of Canterbury, vol. 21, fo. 3.)

He married, about 1552, JOANE—, who married (2), before 25 Oct. 1574, Richard Brissenden. Thomas Hatche was churchwarden at Tenterden in 1565. His daughters are mentioned in his administration, his sons in the Will of his brother Stephen Hatche, and both are mentioned with their children and some grandchildren, in the Will of his eldest son John Hatche, in 1628–9. (See New England Historical and Genealogical Register, vol. 67, p. 45.)

Administration on the goods of Thomas Hatche, of Tenterden, co. Kent, deceased, intestate, was granted 13 Oct. 1568 to Joane Hatch, his relict, Thomas Browne of Tenterden, mercer, and John Brown, of Biddenden, mercer, being bound in £60. Inventory, £69 8s. 4d.

On 25 Oct. 1574, Joane Hatch alias Brissenden, administratrix of the goods of Thomas Hatch, exhibited her account, and the Court assigned to Winifred, Katherine, Elinore, and Elizabeth Hatch, daughters of the said Hatch, £3 13s. 9d., to be equally divided among them, and this is agreed to by Richard Brissenden, now husband of the said Joane. (Archdeaconry of Canterbury, Act Books, vol. 16, fo. 69.)

He married, probably about 1593, ANNE —, who was living as his widow at Tenterden, 22 Jan. 1629-30, when her daughter Anne was licensed to marry Thomas Beadle of New Romney. The Will of John Hatche in 1628-9 names his brother William's children.

Kent, England, probably, died at Scituate, Mass., 6 Nov. 1651; married probably a first wife who was the mother of Walter Hatch; married secondly, probably at Thanington, co. Kent, by license of 9 July 1624, JANE Young, of Thanington, born about 1596. She married secondly, at Scituate 31 Mar. 1653, Elder Thomas King and died at Scituate, 8 Oct. 1653. Her parents are unknown, but it is likely that Edward Young of Thanington, one of the bondsmen on the licence, was a near kinsman.

William Hatch resided at Ashford, Wye, and Sandwich, co. Kent, before coming to New England. He was a woolen-draper and merchant. He removed with his family from Wye to Sandwich about 1634. He embarked for America in Mar. 1634-5, sailing from Sandwich in the ship "Hercules" with his wife Jane, five children, and six servants. His cousin, Lydia (Huckstep) Tilden, with her husband, Nathaniel Tilden, and their children, sailed on the same ship. They all settled at Scituate, Mass. William Hatch built himself a house on Kent St., and was made freeman, 5 Jan. 1635–6. He returned to England but came again in Apr. 1638, in the "Castle." In 1643, he was chosen the first ruling elder of the Second Church of Scituate, and in August of that year, he, with his sons Walter and John, appears on the list of those able to bear arms in Scituate (over 16 and under 60 years of age). In the same year he was made lieutenant of the trainband.

William Hatch made his Will 5 Nov. 1651, exhibited in court 3 June 1652. "I William hatch the elder of Scittuate in the collony of New Plymouth in america Planter being weake in body but of p'fect memory Doe make this my last will and Testament. . . . I give . . . unto Jane my wife two milch cowes and my executors to keep them Summer and Winter upon my meddow grounds and theire encrease tell they exceed the number of six Item I give unto her halfe my Dwelling house During her life time as allsoe halfe the fruites of the trees in my orchyard", etc. "I give my Daughter Jane Lovell one milch cow to bee Delivered to her. . . . I give unto my grandchild John Lovell a cow calfe. . . . And if the lord give my Daughter Jane any more children then my will is that her next child shall have the first calfe of that calfe I give to her son John Lovell and the next child the next calfe and soe Successively. . . . Item I give to my Daughter Ann Torry one milch cowe. . . . I give to my grandchild James Torrey a cow calfe and the first calfe of her breed to my grandchild William Torrey and the next calfe of her to my grandchild Josepth and the next to my grandchild Damaris &c alsoe I give my Daughter Torrey the shipp pott; All the rest of my moveables goods lands and tenements I give and bequeath to my two sons Walter hatch and Willam hatch . . . to bee equally Devided between them Whom I appoint to bee the executors of this last will and Testament and to pay all my Debts and legacies In wittnes Wherof I have heerunto sett my hand and seale the Day and yeare above Written

WALTER ⁸ HATCH (William ⁷, William ⁶, Thomas ⁵, John the Younger ⁴, Thomas ³, Thomas ², John ¹) born in England, probably about 1623 (gave his age as fifty-nine years in 1681–2), died in Scituate, Mass., 24 May 1699; married (1), in Scituate, 6 May 1650, ELIZABETH HOLBROOK, daughter of Thomas and Jane Holbrook, born in England about 1634, died after 1669 (p. 223). He married (2), at Marshfield, 5 Aug. 1674, Mary Stable.

He settled in that part of Scituate called "The Two Miles" which became a part of Marshfield in 1788. He was a shipwright and owned a ship yard in Scituate. He also possessed an interest in an iron mine. He served as constable June 1655.

He made a Will 3 Mar. 1681-2, which was not proven, as his son Antipas having become mentally unsound, he made a second Will providing for his care 20 Aug. 1698. This was proved 2 Apr. 1701. In it he gave to eldest son, Samuel, a share in the iron works; to sons John and Israel, the fulling mill, corn mill, and two hundred and sixty acres of land; to youngest son Joseph, land in Freetown; to these four sons 3,375 acres of land that he bought of his cousin Thomas Hatch; he gave legacies to his wife Mary; daughter Jane Sherman; and daughter Bethia Ford.

JANE ⁹ HATCH (Walter ⁸, William ⁷, William ⁶, Thomas ⁵, John the Younger ⁴, Thomas ³, Thomas ², John ¹), born in Scituate, Mass., ⁷ Mar. 1655-6, died after 1722; married John Sherman (p. 211).

HOLBROOK

THOMAS HOLBROOK, was born in England in 1601 and died in Weymouth, Mass., between 1673 and 1676; married, probably in England, about 1617, Jane——, born in 1601, died in Weymouth, 24 Apr. 1677.

He was a resident of Broadway, Archdeaconry of Taunton, Somerset, England, before he emigrated to America. With his family, he sailed from Weymouth, England, "ye 20th Mar. 1635" (1635-6). The list of his family below shows an error, the age for John should be seventeen instead of eleven and this last age probably belongs to William. It is an evident error of the scribe who probably doubled two children together.

He settled at Weymouth, Mass., where he was a selectman in 1641, '45, '46, '51, '52, '54. He was granted land at Rehoboth, Mass., but

apparently never lived there. He was a Constable in 1669.

He made his Will "Anno Domini Dec. 31, 1668. Thomas Holbrook of Weymouth . . . being sick and weak in body . . . do make this my last will. . . . I give . . . unto Jane, my beloved wife, during her life my whole estate . . . and do request my son John Holbrooke and my son Wm. Holbroke and my son Tho. Holbrooke to be helpful to my wife . . . to . . . give their Mother the best advice as she is ancient and weak of body . . . I give . . . unto my endeared children all my estate . . . my wife Jane's decease, there being six of them, three sons and three daughters to be equally divided between them always provided that my eldest son John Holbrooke shall have a double portion and the rest of my estate to be equally divided, viz., unto my son Thomas Holbrook my son W^m Holbrooke unto my daughter Anne Rennolds, unto my daughter Elizabeth Hatch and unto my daughter Jane Drake. . . . I give unto my grandchild John Holbrooke the eldest, my sword. . . . I give unto my Grandchild Peter Holbrooke

my gun and my gray mare colt. . . . I give unto my grandchild W^m Holbrook my musket. . . . I make my loving wife . . . Jane Holbrooke, executrix during her life and at her decease I do appoint . . . executor . . . my loving son John Holbrook—

The mark of Thomas (T.H.) Holbrook"

In a codicil made 31 Dec. 1673, he gave his dwelling to his grand-child Peter. He died between 1674 and 1677, when the Will was proved. The widow Jane, died 24 Apr. 1677.

CLAPP

The Clapp family which settled early in New England came from Devonshire, England. The father of the celebrated Captain Roger Clapp was of Salcombe Regis when he made his Will, but it seems probable that the parent home was in Sidbury where, unfortunately, the parish records are gone. The transcripts of the parish have never been examined by anyone who has made the result available to searchers on this side of the ocean.

There were various emigrants of the name of Clapp, and many erroneous ideas of the relationship between them have been put in The examination of all the records in this family now in America, known to the author, gives the following probable pedigree. The Will of John Clapp of Dorchester, Mass., which is of great value, called Roger Clapp, "cousin", and from this it is assumed that Roger's father and John's were brothers. There are however other ways in which the two men could be "cousins", according to the custom of that day, when the word not only expressed the relationship between brothers' children, but also between an uncle and nephew or niece. If William Clapp of Salcombe Regis, were a brother of Nicholas Clapp of Venn Ottery, it seems probable that he was an older and presumably a half brother of Nicholas. It is unfortunate that only the briefest abstracts of Wills could be examined, as the full Wills might clear up some of the doubtful points. The line of interest here goes to Nicholas Clapp of Venn Ottery and Sidbury.

The line apparently begins with a William Clapp of Sidbury, who was born as early as 1500. At the time of his death, his wife was named Alice and she probably was the mother of his children. In his Will, made 29 May 1555, proved at Exeter, 25 July 1555, he calls himself, of Sidbury, in the parish of Harforde. He bequeathed to two daughters, Beaton and Joan, at time of making not married; to Thomas Ybden; to two of William Ybden's children; to Gyllam Badstone; to Alse ynglande; to daughter of same Alse; to "hye aulte of Sydbury"; to two of my son's children; to Richard Clappe; residue to

Alsse, wife: Wit: John Fullbrooke, Thomas Badstone.

This man was probably the great grandfather of Nicholas Clapp, and as he apparently had only one son, that son was the grandfather. If the Richard mentioned above is a grandson it is probably he that was the father, as there is reason to think that Nicholas' father was named Richard. If the Richard above was the son and evidently

only son of William, then the line would run William ¹, Richard ², (Richard?)³, Nicholas ⁴, but, of course, these intermediate names are merely hypothetical. (Richard?)³ born before 1650, perhaps married twice. 'The fact that Nicholas' mother, Christian Clapp, does not mention William, of Salcombe Regis, as a child, coupled with the omission of any mention of him in the Will of her son Peter, rather suggests that he may have been the son of an earlier marriage of her

husband, —— Clapp, if he were brother to Nicholas.*

(Richard?) Clapp died before 1608. Christian Clapp, of Sidbury, widow, sick of body, made her Will, 25 July 1608, proved at Exeter, by the executor, Nicholas Clappe, of Sidbury, 12 Aug. 1608. She bequeathed to the poor of Sidbury; to godchildren; "to god-daughter dwelling at Broadclist one Petecotte with browne charmlet bodyes; to Mary Clapp my gowne; to Elizabeth Clapp my sonn Nicholas, his wife, my cloak; to Prudence Clapp, Anne Crutchet & Ann Windsam all my lynninge aparell to be equally devided; to Ann Windsam my fetherbed a bolster a red cov¹let & the matres; to Prudence Clapp my cubbord at Pynhill & a Tableboard & a brasen Pann; to foresaid Ann Windsam £10 to be ymployd for her benefitt & if she dye before twentye then said £10 to remayne to Prudence Clapp: to my Daughter Eyde Crutchett, £10; to Richard Clapp, my son Nicholas, his son, one chest; to Ellen Lee my kyrtle; to Ann Windsham a brasen pan & a crock & my coffer; residue to sonne Nicholas Clapp and he to be Executor. Wit: William Ebdon & James Taylor".

NICHOLAS 4 CLAPP, born probably in Sidbury, was living there, married and with children in 1608, and was probably still living there in 1622. He removed to Venn Ottery, before Mar. 1631 with his son Richard who was married there in 1633 and who, apparently, always resided in that parish. It is inferred that Nicholas had not lived long in Venn Ottery at the time of his death in 1631, because the only items in the Venn Ottery register about him is the record of his burial, 14 Mar. 1631 (1631-2), and of his wife's burial, 24 Mar. 1631. There is also on the register, the burial of a Robert Clapp, 10 Sept. 1629. This may have been Robert, son of Nicholas, or his brother, Robert, who was living in 1622. Nicholas Clapp married before 1608, probably about 1603, ELIZABETH ———. He made his Will two days before his burial, dated 14 Mar. 1631-2, proved 29 Mar. 1632.

I give and bequeath to my dear and louving Wife my now dwelling house with all my lands both in ye necke and in ye woods w^{cb} to me doth appertayne during her naturall life and after my Wifes decease I give my house and land to the maintenance of the Ministry and a school in Dorchester forever, also I give to my dear and (loving) Brother Ambrose Clap what is due me still from my dear brother Richard Clap in England woh is three pound or thereabout, also I give to my louving brother in law Edward Clap three pounds of yt wch is in his owne hands, also I give to my louving Cousins Richard and Elizabeth Clap children of my brother Richard Clap one platter which I have at my brother Richards aforesaid, also I give my louving cousin Deborah Clap, daughter of ye said brother aforesaid one silver spoon weh is in her fathers hands, also I give to my louving cousins Nathaniel Ebenezer Sarah and Hannah, brother Nicholas children tenn shillings apiece, also I give to my louving cousins Elizabeth Prudence and Samuel Clap children of my brother Thomas Clap eight shillings apiece and ye rest of his children five shillings, also I give to my louving cousins Prudence Ezra Nehemiah & Susanna Clap each of them eight shillings apiece and all ye rest of my goods not given and bequeathed (my funeral discharged and just debts being payd) I give and bequeath to my dear and louving wife whom I make sole Executrix in Witnes whereof I have set to my hand. Postscript—Also I give to my cousin John Capen 8s 6d and to my dear and loving cousins Roger Claps children one shilling apiece furthermore I desire that my three friends my brother Nicholas my brother Edward and my cousin Roger Clap to be my overseers for the performance of this my last Will and Testament whereunto I set my hand.

THOMAS ⁵ CLAPP (Nicholas ⁴, —— ³, Richard ², William ¹), was born probably in Sidbury in 1609. Thomas Clapp Sen. deposed in

1678 aged "about 69 yeares". This would be more apt to be accurate than his age as given in his Will in 1684, when he would be older and not only more likely to err but also likely to magnify his age. Besides Nicholas calls Richard his eldest son and Richard did not marry until 1633. If Thomas was, as his Will says, in his eightyseventh year in 1684, he would have been born in 1597 and Richard must have been born as early as 1595, and it is evident that the range of births of all Nicholas' children must have been later from the other evidence regarding them. He married, probably second, Abigail , who died after 1684. He may have been first at Dorchester, but settled at Weymouth where he was made a Freeman 13 Mar. 1638-9. He removed to Scituate in a few years, being made a Freeman of Plymouth Colony, 5 June 1644. He was a deacon in the church, served the town as an officer and was deputy to the General Court. He died in Scituate, 20 Apr. 1684. His Will was proved 4 June 1684.

"I, Thomas Clap of Sittuate in ye Jurisdiction of New plimouth in New England ye nineteenth day of Aprill one thousand six hundred eightie & foure & in ye 87 yeer of my age being sicke & weake in my body . . . appoint this my last Will. . . . Item I give & bequeath unto Abigall Clapp my deare & well beloved wife . . . and . . . two boxes that were formerly my wives. . .

"Item I give unto my well beloued son Thomas Clapp Dedham

. . a double portion. . .

"Item I give . . . unto my well beloued son Samuel Clapp.

INCREASE ⁶ CLAPP (Thomas ⁵, Nicholas ⁴, —— ³, Richard ², William ¹), born in Scituate about 1649, died in Rochester, Mass., in 1715; married in Barnstable, Mass., Oct. 1675, ELIZABETH (BURSLEY) GOODSPEED, daughter of John and Joanna (Hull) Bursley and widow of Nathaniel Goodspeed, baptised in Barnstable, 25 Mar. 1649, died in Rochester, 26 June 1706–7, aged "about" fifty-nine years (p. 235).

He removed from Scituate to Barnstable where he lived for some years, and then settled in Rochester. In 1710, he bought land there of William Griffith.

JOHN ⁷ CLAPP (Increase ⁶, Thomas ⁵, Nicholas ⁴, —— ³, Richard ², William ¹), born in Barnstable Mass., Oct. 1676, died between 31 Mar. 1752, and 1 Apr. 1754, in Rochester, Mass.; married about 1700, Dorcas Earl, daughter of Ralph and Dorcas (Sprague) Earl, born in Dartmouth about 1680, died before 1752 (p. 240).

John Clapp lived all his life in Rochester. He made his Will 31 Mar. 1752, proved 1 Apr. 1754. He gave his estate to his son Ebenezer, with a small legacy to son Benjamin, he having had his share by deed. Ebenezer was to pay legacies to "his sister Charity, my daughter", and also to "my daughter Elizabeth" and "my daughter Mary". The various heirs receipted to Ebenezer Clap as follows: "I, Charity Thorpe of Ware River, a place so-called in the county of Hampshire who am one of the heirs of the late John Clap of Rochester, Plymouth County deed" for her share, witnessed by Samuel Sherman and Thomas Andrews; and Elizabeth and Kenelm Winslow for her share; and Mary and John Briggs, for her share.

She married (2), Rochester, 25 Sept. 1728, Stephen Andrews, son of Stephen and Bethia Andrews, born in Rochester, 5 July 1701, died before 1744. She married (3), in Rochester, 1 Jan. 1743–4, Joseph Thorpe.

BURSLEY

JOHN BURSLEY came to New England very early, perhaps before Governor Endicott. In 1629, he was at Wessaguscus, now Weymouth, associated with Mr. William Jeffrey. He married in Sandwich, Mass., 28 Nov. 1639, Joanna Hull, daughter of the Rev. Joseph Hull (p. 237). He died in 1660 and she married second, Dolar Davis, who died in June 1673, aged about eighty. She outlived him and died after 1686.

Mr. John Bursley was the deputy to the General Court from Weymouth in May 1636, and was placed on a committee to take valuation of the estates in the Colony. He was again elected with two others in September, but the representatives were considered too many for a town of the size of Weymouth, and with one other he was dismissed. In Nov. 1637, he served on a committee to settle a boundary line. In May 1639 he removed to Barnstable, Mass., with Mr. Joseph Hull and others. In 1643 and 1645 he was at Exeter, N. H., and in 1647 at Hampton, N. H., and Kittery, Me., but he only visited these places for the purposes of trade, his family continuing to reside in Barnstable. In 1645, he was constable in Barnstable, and in 1647 he served on the Grand Jury. For awhile after his marriage he lived with his fatherin-law, but about 1650 he removed to a farm in West Barnstable. where he died in 1660. His inventory was taken 21 Aug. 1660 and amounted to £115. At the time of his marriage he must have been about forty and his wife about twenty years old.

REV. JOSEPH ² HULL (*Thomas* ¹), born probably in Crewkerne, Somerset, England, about 1595, died in New England 19 Nov. 1665; married (1), in England, Joane, who died after 1632. He married (2), in England, Agnes ———, born 1610, died after 1665.

Joseph Hull was educated at St. Mary's Hall, Oxford, being graduated from there 14 Nov. 1614. For the next five years he served as a curate under his elder brother, William Hull, vicar of Colyton, in Devon. Having been ordained a clergyman in the Church of England, he was made rector of North Leigh, in the Diocese of Exeter, and served there for eleven years, but he voluntarily resigned his post in 1632 and went back to the vicinity of Crewkerne and there gathered together a company of one hundred and six persons and with them set sail for New England 20 Mar. 1635. The shipping list of this colony was found in 1870 and gives the family of the Rev. Joseph Hull, the name being spelled Hall excepting in the case of the two youngest children.

In all he had twenty-one families in his charge and they settled in that part of Dorchester called Wessaguscus, now Weymouth. On

the 8 of July 1635 the lands on which they had settled were granted to them by the Massachusetts Colony. In September of that year, he was made a Freeman and he served as a deputy to the General Court in Sept. 1638 and Mar. 1639. In Sept. 1638 he was elected a magistrate. In 1639, Mr. Hull, with seven of the families under his charge, removed to Barnstable and built himself a house there. In 1639, he was a deputy to the Plymouth Colony Court and made a Freeman of that colony. 1 May 1641, he was excommunicated from the Barnstable Church, "for his willful breakeing of communication with us and joyning himselfe a member with a companie at Yarmouth to be their pastour; contrary to the advise and Counsell of our church". His wife was also excommunicated but in 1643 they were re-admitted into the church communion. He then removed to Dover, N. H., where he remained for some years, but about 1659 he went to the Isles of Shoals. He died 19 Nov. 1665, and his wife Agnes was appointed his administratrix.

JOANNA³ HULL (Rev. Joseph², Thomas¹), born in England in 1620, probably in North Leigh, Devon, died after 1686 in New England; married John Bursley (p. 235).

EARLE

RALPH EARLE, Captain, was born in 1606, and died in Portsmouth, R. I., about 1678. He married Joan Savage, born about 1595, died after 1699, but whether she was his only wife and the mother of his children is not known. Sewall says in his diary under date of Friday 15 Sept. 1699, "Mr. Newton & I rode to Newport: see Aged Joan Savage now Earle by the way. Her husband Ralph Earle was born 1606 and his wife was ten or eleven years older than he; so she is esteemed to be one hundred and five years old".

Ralph Earle was in Newport by 1 Oct. 1638. On 30 Apr. 1639, he signed a declaration with others binding themselves into a community, which became Portsmouth. In 1640 he sold land to William Baulstone. He was made innkeeper, 26 Aug. 1647, was treasurer of the town 2 July 1649 and 1650, and was a member of the General Assembly, 29 Apr. 1650. He joined a Troop of Horse in 1667 and was later made its captain. In 1651 he was tax assessor and served on the Grand Jury in 1669.

He made his Will 19 Nov. 1673, calling himself "of Portsmouth". He gave to eldest son, Ralph Earle; to Ralph, the son of son William Earle, to three daughters, Mary, wife of William Cory; Martha wife of William Wood; Sarah, widow to late Thomas Cornell. He made his wife Joan, his executor and his friend John Tripp, the elder, his overseer.

Portsmouth Records, printed. "Bee it knowne to all men . . . that I Ralph Earll of Portsmouth on Roade Iland . . . Senior . . . doe ffreely . . . giue . . . unto my sonne william Earll . . . a peice of land . . . in the Towne of Portsmouth . . . I do herewith put my hand & seale this 5th day of Aprill. Anno (1655) Ralph Earll"

RALPH ² EARLE (*Ralph*¹), born about 1632, died about 1716, in Dartmouth; married before 26 Oct. 1659, Dorcas Sprague, daughter of Francis and Lydia Sprague of Duxbury, Mass., birth and death

unknown (p. 241).

Ralph Earle settled first in Portsmouth, R. I., with his father, who is first called "Senior" in the Records in 1651. He was made a Freeman there, with his brother William, 11 May 1658. On Oct. 26, 1659, Francis Sprague of "Duxburrow", planter, gave to his sonin-law Ralph Earle of "Road Iland", one half his share of land at Coaksett and Acushena. On the 16 of Dec. 1659, Ralph Earle "of Portsmouth on Road Iland", sells to Robert Hazard of Portsmouth, with the consent of Dorcas, his wife, "my Quarter share lott and portion of land which is the quarter part of one share that belongeth to thirty foure; which thirty foure is where the first purchasers of the land Comonly Called by the Indian Names of Cushena and Acoaksett in the Jurisdiction of New Plymouth", etc. This deed is signed also by Dorcas Earle and witnessed by Thomas Browning, Thomas Cornwell, John Cornwell. This is evidently the land given him by his father-in-law, Francis Sprague. Later he removed to Dartmouth. There are no dates of birth recorded for his children and the Earle Genealogy gives him no daughters, but deeds in Bristol County prove he had at least three.

Ralph ² Earle left no Will, but 13 June 1688, he, for love and affection, conveyed to son Ralph Earle, one half of Elizabeth Island; Oct. 20, 1689, he gave son William Earle, 100 acres of land in Dartmouth; 10 June 1692, he gave to son Joseph Earle 200 acres in Dartmouth and at other times he gave land to his son John and to various grandsons. Administration on his estate was granted to his son John Earle, 6 Jan. 1717.

DORCAS ³ EARLE (Ralph ², Ralph ¹), born probably in Dartmouth about 1680, married about 1700, John Clapp (p. 233).

SPRAGUE

FRANCIS SPRAGUE, the ancestor of the Plymouth County Spragues, came with his wife, Lydia, in the "Anne", which arrived at Plymouth in July, 1623. He probably brought with him his daughters, Ann and Mercy. He died about 1668, and his wife died before him.

He shared in the division of land in 1623, and in the division of cattle in 1627, at which time he gave the names of his children as Ann and Marcy. In July of this year he signed an agreement with William Bradford and others pertaining to the carrying on of the fur trade. He was taxed 1632–3 at Plymouth but shortly after settled at Duxbury. He was made a Freeman of Plymouth Colony 17 June 1637, and was licensed to sell spirituous liquors. In 1641, he is listed as owning land on North River. In 1644, he deeded land to his son-in-law, William Lawrence, and in the same year became a proprietor of Bridgewater, but never lived there. In 1659, he deeded land to his son-in-law, Ralph Earle, of Rhode Island. He continued to keep the Inn until 1666 and died within a year or so as his son succeeded him in the business.

Plymouth Colony Deeds. Francis Sprague of Duxbury, planter, gives to son John Sprague, dwelling house in Duxbury but he is not to enter into possession thereof until after the decease of his father, the said Francis Sprague. 27 Apr. 1661.

His first wife, ELIZABETH ————, died there and was buried 4 May 1658. He married (2), in Roxbury, 21 Oct. 1658, ALICE THORPE, who died in Roxbury and was buried there 24 Feb. 1667. He married (3), about 1668, JANE ————, who died in Watertown, Mass., 12 May 1714.

He made his Will, 6 Dec. 1683. He bequeaths "unto my daughter Elizabeth, I consigne over a bill of twelve pounds and a trunck that was her mothers to gether with all the things in it . . . unto my son Mathew and Jonathan when they come of age . . . orchards . . . neer my son Joseph's . . . my beloved wife . . . sole executrix My three eldest Sons John and Samuel and Joseph . . . have received their portions already.

SAMUEL² DAVIS (William ¹), born in Roxbury, Mass., 21 Feb. 1645, died in Northampton, Mass., 26 July 1690; married (1), in Northampton, 4 Mar. 1668, Hannah Edwards, daughter of Alexender and Sarah (Baldwin) (Searle) Edwards, born in Springfield, Mass., 18 Feb. 1644, died in Northampton, 11 Sept. 1680 (p. 246). He married (2), in Northampton, 23 Feb. 1680-1, Elizabeth Smead, daughter of William and Elizabeth (Lawrence) Smead, born 20 May 1662, died in childbirth, 26 Aug. 1682. He married (3), Hannah——, who married in 1691, Nathaniel Pritchard.

Samuel Davis removed to Northampton in 1668. In 1682, he was living in Deerfield, in 1685 in Northfield, but returned to Northampton before 1690. In 1676, the wife of Samuel Davis was presented at court for wearing a silk hood in a flaunting manner and fined for the offence. He was one of a mining company in 1680 and sold his shares to Medad Pomeroy in 1681. He contributed to the support of Harvard College in 1672–3.

His estate was ordered divided 31 Mar. 1691. To the widow "Mary" (sic) Davis; to his five children; to the eldest son; to the second son; to the three daughters. The sons were to have the lands at Northfield but the eldest son was to have two-thirds and the youngest one-third. In 1702, the estate paid to "Hannah" Pritchard on account of her first husband Davis.

EDWARDS

ALEXANDER EDWARDS settled in Springfield in 1643, but removed to Northampton in 1653 where he had received a grant of land. He was granted land in Springfield in 1643 and 1645, "& besides ye 3d allotments to Alexander Edwards . . . there is 7 akrs now granted to him at his request as a free gift: in all he is to have 18 akrs, he requested ye said 7 akrs in recompence of a houselott which he thought was due to to him when he married the widdow Searles" (Springfield Town Records). He held a minor town office in 1648 and 1649. After his removal to Northampton he was granted land there until he finally owned a considerable acreage. In 1658 he contributed toward the settling of the Rev. Mr. Mather, as the minister. With three others he built a gristmill in 1659 but sold his share in 1661, and in that same year he signed the church covenant. He also owned part of a lead mine. He lent his financial aid to Harvard College in 1672-3. In 1690 a fatal fever prevailed in the River towns, and eleven of the original settlers were its victims and among them was Alexander Edwards. He died 4 Sept. 1690. He married in Springfield, Mass., 28 Apr. 1642, SARAH (BALDWIN) SEARLE, widow of John Searle, and undoubtedly the daughter of Richard Baldwin of Cholesbury, Bucks, England (p. 249). She died before 1690.

Item. I give unto the poure men's box of Aston Clynton iiiid. . . . Item. I do give to Alis, my daughter xxti marks sterling to be payd her at the tyme of her mariage. . . . Item, I gyve to Agnes, my daughter, xii1i to be payd when she cometh to the age of xix yeres. Item: I will to Cicelly and Letise my daughters, either of them x¹ⁱ to be likewise payd to them when they come to the age of xix yeres; & yf it so forteyn that either of them do departe frome the worlde and die before this legacie be payd, then I will their parte to be equally divided betwyne the other sisters being alyve. Item: I will to John, my sonne, my farm at Dongrove, in the parish of Chessam, wth all the landes to the same belonginge to hyme and to his heires forever, when he doth come to the age of xxiii yeres; and if . . . the sayd John . . . die before he come to the sayd age without yssue, then . . . the sayd farme to return to Henry, my sonne, and to his heirs forever. . . . I gyve to Richard, my sone, my ten'ts in Cholesbury, with all lands belonging to the same, with the resydue of my yeres, the wch shall remayne in my lease, the wch I hold of Master Xpofer Ashefyld, gent., by indenture, the said ten'ts, wth their apptnees to have to hyme . . . when he shall come to the age of xxiii yeres; and yf he . . . die before he shall come to the age of xxiii yeres without issue then . . . to remayn to the next heires. And in the meane tyme, I gyve to Ellen, my wiffe, and to Henry, my sonne, the proffits of the Rents of my sayd howsses and lands towards the bringing up of my children jointly together. Item; I will to Hewghe Baldwyn, my brother's sonne, vi¹ⁱ xiith iiii^d, to be paid to him wthin iiii yeres after my decease. I will to every godchild that I have alyve iiii^d. Item; I give to every my tenents, iiii^d. Item: I will to every of the children of John Straces, every of them a yewe & a lambe. . . . The Resydue . . . I gyve to Ellen, my wife, & to Henry, my sonne . . . whom I make . . . my executors. Also, I do put in trust my welbeloved brothers, John Baldwyn & John Apuke, to be my overseers . . . ; thes witnes Thomas Barnard, John Hutlow, Harry Paracha Will're Donalty. Proved 61 Ech. 1559, 8"

"In the name of God, Amen. The xxvth day of (torn) in the year of our Lord MVLXVI . . . I, Elyn Baldwyn, of Donrig, in the p'ish of Aston Clynton, . . . wedowe . . . being syck in body; but hole in mynde . . do . . make . . . my . . . testament body to be buried in the Churchyarde of Aston Clinton aforesaid. Item: I give to the mother Churice of Lincoln, iid. Item: I will to the Chancell of Aston Clynton, iid. Item: I will to the pore people of Aston Clynton, xiid. Item: I gyve . . . unto Rychard Baldwin and to Sylvester Baldwyn, my son Henry Baldwyn's children, each of them, xiid. The Resydewe, I gyve onto John Baldwyn, my son, whom I do make my sole executor. . . I do appoynte my son, Henry Baldwyn, to be my overseer. . . . Thses witnesse George Baldwyn, Henry Baldwyn, Willm Putnam, Rychard Baldwyn.

RICHARD ² BALDWIN (*Richard* ¹), born after 1530, probably in Aston-Clinton, was probably the father of Richard ³ Baldwin, of Cholesbury.

RICHARD ³ BALDWIN (probably *Richard* ², *Richard* ¹), weaver, of Cholesbury, made his Will, 23 Dec. 1630, proved 16 May 1633. He gives to wife Isabell; to son Nathaniel; to son Joseph; daughter Mary Pratt; her daughter Mary, her other two children; to daughter Hannah and to other two daughters Christian and Sarah at 21 years, to the poor of Cholesbury. Residue to eldest son Timothy and he to be executor.

SARAH ⁴ BALDWIN (Richard ³, probably Richard ², Richard ¹), probably born in Cholesbury, Bucks, England, about 1615, died in Northampton, Mass., before 1690; married (1), in Springfield, Mass., 19 Mar. 1639, John Searle, who settled in Springfield, in 1638, and died there 11 Aug. 1641. He was granted a houselot 13 Sept. 1638 and his widow was granted another in 1641. He was probably that John Searle, son of James Searle, who, with his brother William, was baptised 20 Aug. 1613, Bledloe, Bucks. John and Sarah (Baldwin) Searle, had a son John Searle, born in Springfield, 30 Mar. 1641. She married (2), 28 Apr. 1642, Alexander Edwards (p. 246).

CLESSON

MATTHEW CLESSON, an early settler of Northampton, Mass., is said to have come from Ireland. He took the oath of Allegiance on the 8 Feb. 1678. In 1668 he signed a petition against imposts. He married, 22 Dec. 1670, MARY PHELPS, daughter of Nathaniel and Elizabeth (Copley) Phelps, born in Windsor, Conn., 21 June 1651, died in Northampton, 15 Apr. 1687. The history of Northampton states that he was probably an indentured servant but he became prosperous. He bought the homestead of Thomas Lewis in 1667 and sold it to Solomon Stoddard in 1684. His house was burned by the Indians in 1675, but the town gave him other land to compensate him for the loss of his house. In 1672-3, he contributed to the support of Harvard College. After the death of his first wife he married (2), 21 Nov. 1701, SARAH HEDGE, and at the time he made his Will, his wife was named Susannah. He died in Deerfield about 1716. His Will was made in 1713, and proved 7 Nov. 1716. He calls himself in the Will, "late of Northampton", and appoints his sons, Joseph and Samuel, his executors. He directs that they arrange a suitable support for his widow Susannah, but if she does not choose to accept it. then she is to have one third part of the realty for life. The sons, Joseph and Samuel Clesson, are given an equal share in the real estate. The daughters, Thankful Davis and Mary Bartlett, given a cow and steer and utensils in the house after the widow's decease. A legacy was given to four grandchildren, the children of daughter, Elizabeth Hannum, but their names are not mentioned.

THANKFUL² CLESSON (Matthew¹), born in Northampton, Mass., 19 Sept. 1673, died in Brookfield, Mass., after 1719; married in Northampton, 28 Oct. 1695, Samuel Davis (p. 243). On the Records at Northampton, she is called Thankful "Mason", but the division of her brother's estate prove her to have been Thankful Clesson.

PHELPS

WILLIAM PHELPS, the founder of the Phelps family in America. came to New England before 19 Oct. 1630, applying on that date to be made a Freeman. Savage says he may have come in the "Mary and John", and as he settled at Dorchester, it is probable that Savage is correct. He was possibly from Tewksbury, England, son of a William and Dorothy Phelps, but the proof given in the Phelps Genealogy does not seem sufficient to establish this as fact. said to have brought a wife and six children with him and he certainly had children born before he came to New England, and a wife came with him who died in 1635. He served on a jury, 9 Nov. 1630, and was constable in Dorchester, 27 Sept. 1631. The 9 May 1632, he was one of a committee of sixteen for raising of a public stocks. Mar. 1634, he served on a committee to determine the boundaries between Dorchester and Roxbury and in this same year was a delegate to the Massachusetts General Court. 8 July 1635, he again served on a boundary committee, this time to settle bounds between Wessaguscus and Barecove, and again was deputy in this year. the fall of 1635, he removed to Windsor, Conn., where he was a magistrate from 1639-1643, 1645-1649, and 1656-1662. He served as deputy to the Connecticut General Court from 1645-1657.

William Phelps married (2), in 1638, MARY DOVER, who was a passenger in the "Mary and John", and who died in Windsor, 27

Nov. 1675.

On the 22 Apr. 1660, he made an agreement with his son Timothy who was about to marry Mary, the daughter of Edward Griswold, by which Timothy was to live with him, the said William Phelps, and enjoy the use of his land while he and his wife lived and at their deaths to inherit the whole, excepting a legacy to William, the son of son Samuel, Timothy paying legacies also to daughter Mary; to son William; to son Samuel; to son Nathaniel; and to son Joseph.

William Phelps died in Windsor 14 July 1672, in his seventy-third year. This would make him born in 1699-00. William, the son of William and Dorothy Phelps of Tewksbury, England, was baptised

19 Aug. 1799, so the age at death and the baptism check.

NATHANIEL² PHELPS (William¹), born in England about 1627, died in Northampton, Mass., 27 May 1702; married in Windsor, Conn., 17 Sept. 1650, widow ELIZABETH COPLEY, who died in Northampton, 6 Dec. 1712. He came to New England with his father, and resided in Windsor, Conn., until 1656, when he removed to Northampton Mass., and was made a Freeman there on 11 May 1681.

Elizabeth Copley had two children by her husband Copley, (1) Thomas Copley; married Ruth Denslow; (2) Elizabeth Copley m. (1), 1665, Praisever Turner; m. (2), 1676, Samuel Langton; m. (3), David Alexander. She left a Will in which she mentions sons Nathaniel and William Phelps; daughter Abigail Alverd; children of daughter Mary Clesson, deceased; son-in-law Matthew Clesson; son Thomas Copley; and Samuel and John Lankton; lands of husband to be divided equally between sons Nathaniel and William Phelps; proved 4 Feb. 1712–13.

Nathaniel Phelps, Sr. made a Will that was proved at Northampton Mass., 2 Sept. 1702. He gives to widow, Elizabeth, sons Nathaniel and William, sons-in-law John Alverd and Matthew Clesson; widow to have use of all property and the right to give what she desires to her son Thomas Copley and her grandsons Samuel and John Langton. He suggests that his friends Ebenezer Strong and Medad Pomeroy render any assistance necessary in settling the estate.

WHITCOMB

JOHN WHITCOMB, the progenitor of the Whitcomb family in America, came from Taunton, Somerset, England. He was married at St. Mary's, Taunton, 26 Nov. 1623, to Frances Coggan. He came to New England about 1635 and was a proprietor of Dorchester. Mass., in 1636. About 1640, he removed to Scituate, Mass., and was admitted a Freeman of Plymouth Colony, 3 June 1652. Two years later he removed to Lancaster, Mass., where he died 24 Sept. 1662. His widow Frances died there 17 May 1671. He left no Will and 7 Oct. 1662, his widow Frances and "soe many of the children of the deceased as therein is concerned" petitioned the court to sanction a division of his estate. These petitioners were, Frances Whitcomb, the widow; John Whitcomb; Jonathan Whitcomb; Job Whitcomb; Josiah Whitcomb; Mary Whitcomb; Abigail Whitcomb. (Midd. Pro. 2: 67-70.) The other children known to be living, i.e., Catharine Elmes and Robert and James Whitcomb, were in Scituate and doubtless had received their shares of his estate.

ROBERT ² WHITCOMB (John ¹), was born in Taunton, England, and baptised there in St. James's Church, 20 Dec. 1629, died in Scituate, Mass., about Jan. 1696–7; married in Rhode Island, by a Quaker preacher in 1659, to Mary Cudworth, daughter of General James Cudworth, and remarried to her, 9 Mar. 1660. She was baptised in

Scituate, 23 July 1637, and died there before 1682 and probably before 1675 (p. 262). He married (2), Mary ———, who survived him.

Robert Whitcomb evidently remained behind in Scituate, when his father went to Lancaster, he being about twenty-three years old. It is possible that his father gave him his property in Scituate and for this reason he was not included in the distribution of the Lancaster estate. He evidently sympathised warmly with the suffering of the persecuted Quakers, like his brother-in-law, Rodolphus Elmes, and like James Cudworth, whose daughter he was soon to marry. Court records show that Robert and Mary (Cudworth) Whitcomb were married by a Quaker preacher in Rhode Island, and the marriage was deemed illegal by the Court and they were ordered to be remarried by a Puritan minister, which was done 9 Mar. 1660. Officers were appointed by the Court to apprehend the Quaker preacher, "Henry Hobson of Road Iland and to take securities for his appearance at the Court at Plymouth to answer for his derision of authoritie in counterfeiting the solemnising of the marriage of Robert Whetcom and Mary Cudworth".

Administration on the estate of Robert Whitcomb, late of Scituate Deceased, was granted to Mary Whitcomb, his widow, and Israel Whitcomb, his eldest son, 2 Feb. 1696-7. (Plymouth Co. Probate, 1:252.)

JAMES ³ WHITCOMB (Robert ², John ¹) was born in 1668, probably in Scituate, Mass., died in Rochester, Mass., 26 June 1728, in

his sixty-first year; married in Scituate, 22 Nov. 1694, MARY PARKER, daughter of William and Mary (Turner) Parker, born in Scituate, in 1667, died in Rochester, 30 Nov. 1729, in her sixty-third year (p. 263).

James Whitcomb was a "setwork cooper". He removed to Rochester, Mass., after 1700. He made his Will, 22 Sept. 1727,

proved 1 Dec. 1730.

"In the Name of God, Amen, this twenty second day of September, Anno Domini One thousand Seven hundred & twenty Seven, I James Whitcomb of Rochester . . . Setwork Cooper . . . do make . . . my last Will.—I Give . . . to Mary; my dearly beloved Wife The whole Improvemt of all my Estate . . . during her natural Life Excepting what I shall Reserve out of it & give to my Daughter Mary and to my two Grand daughters Mercy & Mary Chapman, the children of my Daughter Joanna Chapman Deceased—Item; I give to my two sons Nathaniel & James. . . . I tem, my Will is that my son Robert also have. . . . I give to my Daughter Mary Davis . . . to my three sons . . . my sons Nathaniel & James joint executors.

Nathaniel Whitcomb removed from Rochester to Hardwick about 1742. He served the latter town as a selectman for five years, between

LOT ⁵ WHITCOMB (Nathaniel ⁴, James ³, Robert ², John ¹), born in Rochester, Mass., ² May 1739, died in Stockbridge, Vt., ⁷ Apr. 1797; married in Hardwick, Mass., ⁹ Dec. 1762, Lydia Nye, daughter of Samuel and Lydia (Benson) Nye, born in Rochester, ²⁸ Jan. 1744–5, died in Stockbridge, ²² Feb. 1831 (p. 277).

Lot Whitcomb removed to Barnard, Vt., in 1775, but was obliged to leave on account of Indian raids, and returned to Hardwick for a while. Later he went again to Barnard with his wife and family. Lydia (Nye) Whitcomb is quoted by her granddaughter as saying that at one time she was the handsomest woman in Barnard, as she was the only woman there. Before he went to Barnard, in 1766, he built a bridge over the Ware River. In 1778, he served on the Committee of Safety. He enlisted as a private, 11 Sept, 1776, in Capt. Benjamin Watts' company. (Vermont Rev. Rolls, 819.)

CUDWORTH

DR. RALPH CUDWORTH, whose birthplace is unknown, but who probably belonged to Lancashire, entered Cambridge in 1588-9, received an A.B. degree in 1592-3 and an A.M., in 1596. He was a Fellow of Emmanuel College, and lecturer at St. Andrews, Cambridge. and was made Vicar of Coggeshall in Essex, 4 Apr. 1606, succeeding Thomas Stoughton, who had been the incumbent there since 1600 but for some reason was deprived of the living. Dr. Cudworth resigned the living in 1607 and in 1609, became Vicar of Aller in Somerset, and chaplain to King James I, remaining there until his death in 1624. He was succeeded by the Rev. John Stoughton, who shortly after Dr. Cudworth's death married his widow, and in 1632, resigned the living at Aller, and became Curate at St. Mary Aldermanbury in London. Stoughton was also a Fellow of Emmanuel, receiving his degree of A.B., from Cambridge in 1610-11. death of Dr. Cudworth's widow, who was probably the first wife of Stoughton, he married Jane Brown, daughter of John Brown of Frampton in Dorset. His brothers, Israel and Thomas Stoughton, were early settlers of Dorchester, Mass., and it is probable that James Cudworth came to New England with them.

These Stoughtons were presumably the sons of the Rev. Thomas Stoughton who was the Rector of Coggeshall, just preceding Dr. Ralph Cudworth. An early account of John Stoughton says: "In October [1635] Dr. Stoughton of Aldermanbury in London, who had married Cudworth's widow of Emm. and had the same living given by the College in the West country whence a carrier bringing some monyes for his wives childrens portions he was traduced (as it seemeth) to be a favourer of New England, and a collector of contribution for ministers there, &c.; so that a pursevant was sent to the carrier and many halbard-men for him and his study was sealed up, &c., but within 2 or 3 days re cognita he returned with credits in the earl of Hollands coach".

Rev. John Stoughton died in May 1639. He made his Will 4 May 1639, proved on the following 20 May. He mentions his wife, Jane Stoughton, his daughters Jane and Mary. His wife Jane was made executrix, and he appointed her father John Browne, of Frampton, in Dorsetshire, Esq., overseer. Robert Edwards and Edmund Foord of London, Merchants, were the witnesses. (Harvey 69.)

Dr. Ralph Cudworth's wife was "of the family of Machell and had been nurse to Prince Henry, eldest son of James I".

Dr. Cudworth had at least the following children:

i. James 2, b. probably before 1606 and in Cambridge, came to New England.

ii. REV. RALPH, b. in 1617, in Aller in Somerset, was admitted pensioner of Emmanuel College, Cambridge, in 1632. He received his A.B. in 1635 and his A.M. in 1639. In this latter year he was elected a Fellow of Emmanuel and became a popular tutor. Parliament appointed him master of Clare Hall in 1645 and regius professor of Hebrew. He was installed in the college living of North Cadbury, Somerset, in 1650, and elected Master of Christ's College in 1654, retaining this last position after the Restoration.

In 1662, he was presented by Archbishop Sheldon to the rectory of Ashwell, Herts., and in 1678 installed prebendary of Gloucester. He d. 26 July 1688, at Christ's College. His dau., Damaris Cudworth, who became the second wife of Sir Francis Matcham, of Oates, Essex, was a friend of Locke, and evidently inherited some of her father's genius for she wrote, in 1696, a clearly reasoned "Discourse Concerning the Love of God".

In 1647, he preached a fine sermon before the House of Commons. Many of his mss. have never been printed; in 1731 Bishop Chandler published one, called "A Treatise Concerning Eternal and Immutable Morality", which was a really valuable contribution to ethics. His great work, however, and the one which has made his name known was called "The True Intellectual System of the Universe". Published in 1678, it is singularly broad-minded and displays great erudition; its almost endless digressions somewhat obscure its real value. It is unique in its marvelously honest statement of its opponents' views, and he has been accused sometimes of Atheistic tendencies himself, because he stated fairly what he intended to refute. "He has raised", says Dryden, "such strong objections against the being of a God and Providence that many think he has not answered them"-"the common fate", adds Shaftesbury, "of those who dare to appear fair authors".

Langford, Jr."

GENERAL JAMES ² CUDWORTH (Ralph ¹), was probably born in Cambridge, England, before 1606, if we assume that he was older than his wife. Her name is unknown, but she died between 1673 and 1682, probably in Scituate, Mass. They were probably married just before he came to New England. The exact date of his arrival is unknown but he was here before 1634 and perhaps came in 1632, with Mr. Hatherly to Boston. In Dec. 1634, he wrote a long letter to his step-father, Rev. John Stoughton, dealing mainly with religious matters but in it he mentions his "unkels", evidently Israel and Thomas Stoughton. (N. E. His. Gen. Reg. 5: 350.) He was made Freeman in Scituate the same year, 1634, and with his wife joined Mr. Lothrop's church, 18 Jan. 1634–5. In 1641, he removed to Barnstable, where he remained for a few years, returning to Scituate in 1646, and making the latter town his home for the rest of his life.

He was Deputy to the Court from 1649-1656 and Assistant to the Governor, 3 June 1656, '57, and '58. He evidently possessed the same type of liberal mind as his famous brother, Ralph, with the same keen sense of justice and love of fair play, and was against the persecution of the Quakers. This brought him into conflict with the bigoted rulers of the day and in 1658 he was accused of being an opposer of the government, was left out of civil office, deprived of his military command and two years later was disfranchised. The accusation was based on a letter to a friend (Mr. Brown?) then in England and who had been an Assistant in Plymouth Colony. It was dated at Scituate in 1658 and is very long. In it he says, "As to the state & condition of things among us, it is sad, and so like to continue The antichristian, persecuting spirit is very active, and that in the powers of this world. He that will not lash persecute and punish men that differ in matters of religion, must not sit on the bench nor sustain any office in the Commonwealth. Last election Mr. Hatherly and myself were left off the bench and myself discharged of my Captainship because I had entertained some of the Quakers at my house thereby that I might be the better acquainted with their principles: I thought it better to do so, than with the blind world to censure, condemn, rail at and revile them, when they neither saw their persons nor knew any of their Principles". He then scores the inhuman persecutions strongly and adds that he is "no Quaker", but that he will not persecute them. In July 1673, Capt. Cudworth "by a full & clear vote is accepted and re-established in the Association and body of this Commonwealth", and he was made Assistant again from 1674.

Cudworth was as prominent in military matters as in civil. He was made Captain of Scituate company in 1652, but lost his command, in 1658. In 1673, he declined the office of Commander-in-Chief of the forces of the Colony, writing to Governor Winslow, an interesting letter and giving as one reason for his refusal, "my wife as is well

known unto the whole town, is not only a weak woman but has been so all along; and now by reason of age, being sixty-seven years and upwards, and nature decaying so her illness grows strongly upon her". In 1675, however, he was appointed "General and Commander in Chief of all the forces that are or may be sent forth against the enemy". It is possible that his wife had died and so he felt himself able to accept what he had hitherto declined. In 1681, he was made an Agent for the Colony to England and was Deputy Governor. In 1682, he went to England but shortly after his arrival in London in the autumn of that year, he contracted smallpox from which he died. He made his Will in the spring in 1682, dividing his estate into six parts, son James was to have two sixths; son Israel, one sixth; son Jonathan one sixth; daughter Mary's four children, viz., Israel, Robert, James, and Mary Whitcomb, one sixth; daughter Hannah Jones, one sixth.

PARKER

WILLIAM PARKER settled early in Scituate, Mass., becoming a Freeman there in 1640. He married (1), in Plymouth, April 1639, Mary, daughter of Thomas Rawlins, who died in Aug. 1651. He married (2), in Scituate, 13 Nov. 1651, Mary, daughter of Humphrey and Lydia (Gamer) Turner, baptised in Scituate, 25 Jan. 1634–5, died after 1684 (p 264).

William's first child was a daughter named Mary. She died suddenly in 1666 and he named his little daughter, born 1667, after her.

He died in 1684 and in his Will, gave certain lands to his son, Joseph, made specific bequests to daughter Patience Randall and grandchild Stephen Totman; gave the homestead to wife Mary and at her death to be divided between Miles; Nathaniel; William; Lydia and Joseph.

MARY ² PARKER (William ¹), born in Scituate, Mass., about 1667, died in Rochester, Mass., 30 Nov. 1729, aged sixty-two years; married in Scituate, 22 Nov. 1694, James Whitcomb (p. 256).

TURNER

HUMPHREY TURNER, a tanner, born about 1594, came to Plymouth before 1628, and was made Freeman there in 1632-3. He removed to Scituate, where he became a member of the church, in 1634. He served the town as an officer and was a substantial man. He married Lydia Gamer, who died before 1673. He died in 1673, aged seventy-nine years.

He made his Will 28 Feb. 1669, proved 5 June 1673. He gives to son John, the elder; to young son John; to sons, Daniel; Joseph; Nathaniel; Thomas; daughters, Mary Parker; Lydia Doty; grand-children, Humphrey, son of Thomas; Mary Doty; Jonathan, Joseph, and Ezekiel, sons of John Sr.; Abigail, daughter of Nathaniel. Executors, Nathaniel and young son John.

BLACKMER

WILLIAM BLACKMER, nephew of Peter Collamore, and probably son of —— and Joan (Collamore) Blackmer and grandson of Thomas and Agnes (Adams) Collamore of Northam, Devon, England, came to New England in 1653, when Peter Collamore, having no sons, wrote to his brother in England to send him one of his nephews for an heir. Peter Collamore, however, wanted an heir of the Collamore name and so his nephew Anthony Collamore, son of his brother John Collamore, came over in 1665.

Peter ¹ Collamore (probably brother of Sir John Collamore of Luscott who died in Braunton, Devon, in 1605 and mentioned in his Will, John, Thomas, Philip and Mary, children of brother Peter, deceased) had an eldest son, Thomas Collamore, born 20 Sept. 1570. Peter's estate was administered by his wife Edith and by William Blackmore. Children, John Thos., Phillip and Mary.

Thomas ² Collamore (Peter ¹), born in Northam, England, 20 Sept.

1570; married 11 Jan. 1608, Agnes Adams and had:

John ³ Collamore, b. Nov. 1608. Mark Collamore, b. Feb. 1610.

Peter Collamore, b. Dec. 1613, came to America.

Joan Collamore, b. Oct. 1616; m. —— Blackmer. Son William came to America.*

William Blackmer was killed by the Indians, 21 Apr. 1676, and his house in Scituate was burned. In 1683, Peter ³ Collamore made his Will and gave to his wife Mary; to Peter Blackmer; to John Blackmer; to Phebe Blackmer and to William Blackmer and to the children of Anthony Collamore, etc.

William Blackmer married in Scituate, 17 July 1666, ELIZABETH (CURTIS) BANKES, sister of William, Richard, Thomas and John Curtis, and probably widow of a brother of Richard Bankes. She married (3), 24 Jan. 1677, Jacob Bumpas, and died after 1687 (p. 269).

The inventory of the estate of William Blackmer of Scituate was filed in court 6 July 1676. Elizabeth, the relict, gave oath to its

truth 3 Oct. 1676. It amounted to £61-15-6.

JOHN ² BLACKMER (William ¹), born in Scituate, Mass., 16 Dec. 1669, died in Wareham, Mass., between 20 Feb. 1744 and 6 Nov. 1751; married (1), in Rochester, Mass., 18 Sept. 1700, Anna Branch, daughter of John and Mary (Speed) Branch, born probably before 1680, died before 1725 (p. 272). He married (2), in Rochester, Mass., 10 Mar. 1725, Sarah Norcutt.

John Blackmer did not marry until he was over thirty years of age. In 1698, when his brother William died, the latter left property to John and his sister Phebe, and to the children of his brother Peter, but not to any children of John, so it is unlikely that he married before 1700. He removed to Rochester before 1700, but when Wareham was set off from Rochester in 1739, his property fell in that town.

He made his Will 20 Feb. 1744, proved 6 Nov. 1751. He gives to wife Sarah; son William; son John; daughter Phebe, "with what she hath had"; daughter Elizabeth. Son William is to have the estate and to pay legacies to the others and after his wife's decease, the residue is be to divided "equally between my four children". Son William to be executor.

CURTIS

Among the early settlers of Scituate were four brothers and a sister by the name of Curtis. They were the children of Richarden Chambers by a first husband. She was probably widowed in England, married there, Thomas Chambers, and came with him to New England bringing with her the Curtis children, who were presumably of a fair age at the time. In her Will she gives her clothes to her son Thomas's wife and gives to his daughter Elizabeth, although her own daughter Elizabeth was living in the same town with her at the time. She only mentions two of her children in her Will, John and Thomas, but that the others were of the same family is proven by the distribution of John Curtis's estate a few years later. This might be explained by supposing that Richard, William and Elizabeth Curtis were children of her husband, Curtis, by a former marriage, but it is evident that Thomas Curtis must have been born by 1626 and unless Elizabeth was twenty years older than her third husband, she must have been born after Thomas. Unfortunately no dates in connection with these people have yet been found.

Richarden Chambers died about 1672, in Scituate, Mass. She

made her Will 18 Nov. 1672, proved 29 Oct. 1673.

"I, Richarden Chambers of Scittuate, in the jurisdiction of New Plymouth in New England, widow, being weake in Body but in pfect mind and memory for which I doe most humbly thank God Almighty, doe make and declare this to be my last Will and Testament in manner as followeth; Imprimis, I give and bequeath unto Abigail Curtice, the wife of my son Thomas Curtice, all my wearing clothes. Item, I give and bequeath unto Elizabeth Curtice, daughter of my son Thomas Curtice aforesaid the full sum of ten pounds in money Goods or Cattle; and whereas my husband Thomas Chambers deceased A day or two before he died did manifest and declare before Leiffte Torrey and Sarah the wife of Abraham Sutliffe and in my hearing that it was his Will that his son in law John Curtice should have his house and land bothe upland and Marshland lying and being in Scittuate and Marshfield Imediately after my death; And as it was my husbands will soe I doe hereby declare that it is my will That my son John Curtice shall have and Injoy the said house and land Imediately after my decease, to be Injoyed by him and his heirs forever. All the Rest of estate; my debts and legacyes and charges of funerall being deducted, I give unto John Curtice my son aforesaid whom I

doe hereby constitute and appoint to be the sole executor of this my last Will and Testament; whom I do hereby appoint to pay my debts and legacyes. In witnes wherof I have sett my hand and seale this eighteenth day of november one thousand six hundred Seaventy and two, 1672.

He died 21 Apr. 1676, and she married (3), 24 Jan. 1677, Jacob Bumpus, son of Edward and Hannah Bumpus, born in Marshfield, Mass., 25 Mar. 1644. She died after 1687, probably in Rochester, Mass.

BRANCH

SIMON BRANCH,* the date and place of whose birth has not been found, was buried at Tenderden, Kent, England, 8 Oct. 1614. He married at Rolvenden: "1585, Symon Branche and ALICE STOOKES mayden, married 6 June". She married (2), EDWARD HASLEMAN and was living in Halden, in 1619.

Simon Branch, of Tenterden, Kent, made his Will, 20 May 1614, proved 7 Nov. 1614. He gives "to Peter Branch my sonne fiue poundes of lawful mony of England to be payde vnto him by my executrix within one yeare next after my decease". To Susanna Branch, daughter, £5. Residue to wife Alice Branch and she to be executrix. Wit: Samuel Little and Steeuen Little.

He married (2), about 1633, MILDRED ————, who was buried at Halden, 20 Sept. 1637.

Peter ² Branch was a carpenter. He apparently was of a roving disposition, as he lived within a few years in Nettlestead, Frittenden, Biddenden and Halden. Shortly after the death of his second wife, he emigrated to America with his son John, and died on board the ship, "Castle", during the voyage. He left the following Will; "Peter Branch late of Halden in Kent in owld England Carpenter,

Tenterden in Kent my Sonne John Branch to provide for and oversee him for eleven yeares from henceforth, dated the 16th daye of June 1638 . . . and my whole estate to be kept by s^d Thomas Wiborne who shall pay all my debts out of s^d estate. If my s^d sonne dye before y^e end of s^d time then the saide Wiborne shall give to Widowe Igleden the late wife of Stephen Igleden or to his children or to her children she had by him five pounds. Item, I give to Thomas Wiborne for keepinge of my sonne eight pounds. If my sonne John dye before eleven yeares what remayne in y^e hands of said Wiborne to go to the pore of those three congregations, of Concord, of Sittuate & to that congregation wich a company that goes in the Shipp called the Castle, if there be a company of them, if not to be divided (among) the afores^d two congregations. My son John Sole Executor & Thomas Wiborne my feafeere to whom I comitt the oversight of my Will."

JOHN ³ BRANCH (*Peter* ², Simon ¹), born about 1628 in Kent Co., England (his father makes the term of his minority to expire eleven years from 16 June 1638), died in Marshfield, Mass., 17 May 1711; married in Marshfield, 6 Dec. 1652, Mary Speed, died after 1711.

John Branch, of Marshfield, made his Will, 6 July 1699. He calls himself "well Stricken in yeares" and gives to his son Peter; his daughter Elizabeth Sumers; his daughter Mercy Spooner; his daughters, Remember and Anna Branch; makes his wife, Mary, his executrix but if the estate is not fully settled at time of her death, then daughters Remember and Anna are to serve as executors. He signed a codicil to this Will 20 May 1701, in which he states that since making the Will, he has given to daughter Anna her share of his estate and so he revokes bequest to her and gives all residue to Remember. He also gives 20s. to "daughter Mary Branch". The Will was proved 15 June 1711.

NYE

RANDOLF NYE, said to have come from Denmark,* settled in Sussex, England, in 1527. He is mentioned in the Rolls as excusing himself on account of illness from attending the Assize held at Lewes. He held land at Uckfield, co. Sussex. He died about 1547. His son and heir was William Nye.

WILLIAM ² NYE (Randolf ¹), died before 1556; married AGNES, daughter of Ralph Tregran, of Ballancé-Horned, Herts. He studied for the ministry and became Rector of the parish church of Ballancé-Horned before 1547. 2 Edward VI, (1548-9) he claimed the land which his father had given unto him in Uckfield. His son and heir was Ralph Nye.

RALPH ³ NYE (William ², Randolf ¹), born about 1533; married 18 June 1555, Margaret Merynge of St. Mary Woolchurch. Children:

have been son of Thomas Nye by an earlier marriage than that to Katharine Poulsden in 1583.) 4 July 1637, he granted to his youngest son, Thomas Nye, four acres in Biddenden, and states in the document that his "oldest son Benjamin having gone to New England", he gives it to Thomas.

daughter of Rev. Thomas Tupper (p. 278).

He came to New England in the ship "Abigail" in 1635. He removed to Sandwich, Mass., about 1637. In 1643, his name appears on a list of inhabitants of that town able to bear arms. In 1650 he was plaintiff in a case in Court, and in 1654 he contributed money toward building a meeting-house. In this year he served the town as Surveyor of Highways. 17 July 1657, he agreed to pay a certain amount yearly on the minister's salary, and he took the Oath of Fidelity in this year. 18 May 1658 he was chosen on the Grand Jury. In 1661 he was made Constable and served again on the Jury in 1662. He was on a Coroner's Jury in 1664 and in 1665 was one of a committee to settle a road dispute. He was granted more land at Sandwich in 1669 because he had built a Mill at Little Pond. he served on a common land committee and, in 1673, was again constable. His last service was in 1674, when he was made Tax-collector.

There is apparently no Will or administration of his estate.

JONATHAN 7 NYE (Benjamin 6, Thomas 5, Thomas 4, Ralph 3, William², Randolf¹), born in Sandwich, Mass., 20 Nov. 1649, died in Sandwich, between 7 July 1744 and 13 May 1747; married (1),

about 1679, Hannah ——, who died after 1689. He married (2),

about 1690, Patience Burgess, died after 1744.

Jonathan Nye was a miller. He was very aged when he died, being in his ninety-eighth year. In 1712, he gives to his son Ichabod Nye, weaver, of Middleborough, land in Plympton, given to him, the said Jonathan, by his father, Benjamin Nye, late of Sandwich, deceased.

(Plymouth Co., Deeds 10: 425.)

Jonathan Nye, of Sandwich, "being grown in years", made his Will, 7 July 1744, proved 13 May 1747. He gives to his wife Patience, all of his personal estate for life, and then to his three daughters, Patience, Abigail, and Zurviah, and states that the rest of his children, namely, Mary, Sarah, Jabez, Joanna, Ichabod, Jonathan, Joseph, Benjamin, Thomas, and David, have had their portions of his estate. He made his wife Patience and his son Joseph his executors.

TUPPER

THOMAS TUPPER, a shoemaker, was a proprietor in Lynn, Mass., before 1637. He removed to Sandwich where he became a prominent man. He was a preacher to the Indians, was appointed to marry people in 1650, served as selectman many years and beginning in 1652 was a deputy to the General Court for many years. His son Thomas is said to have been born 16 Jan. 1638, when his father was sixty years old. The Sandwich records give

BONHAM

GEORGE BONHAM was born about 1618 probably in England, and died in Plymouth, Mass., 28 Apr. 1704, aged eighty-six years; he married at Plymouth, Mass., 20 Dec. 1644, Sarah Morton, daughter of George and Juliana (Carpenter) Morton, born at Leyden, Holland, in 1618, died in Plymouth, Mass., 25 Aug. 1691 (p. 283).

In the early Plymouth records are found three of the name of Bonham or Bonum, Nicholas, Ruth and George, and probably they were all members of the same family. Nicholas Bonham, married 1 Jan. 1658, Hannah, daughter of Samuel Fuller, and had (Bonham), (1) Hannah, b. 8 Oct. 1659; (2) Mary, b. 4 Oct. 1661; (3) Sarah, b. 16 Feb. 1664. He removed from Barnstable where he was living to New Jersey about 1679. Ruth Bonham married 17 Mar. 1646, Richard

Smyth.

George Bonham was made a Freeman in Plymouth in 1657. On the 1 Nov. 1647, with consent of his wife, Sarah, he sold land there to John Faunce, the deed being witnessed by Manasseh and Jane Kempton, Sarah's step-father and her mother. In 1653 he bought land of Richard Sparrow of Eastham, and Mr. William Paddy of Plymouth, and in 1656 he purchased more land of Richard Sparrow and some of John Rickard. All this land was in Plymouth. 17 June 1659, he bought more land there of Nathaniel Masterson. He built a house in Plymouth in 1678, which is still standing. A year later, on the 21 Feb. 1679, he deeded land to his daughter Ruth and her husband Robert Barrow. He witnessed the will of Capt. Thomas Southworth, his cousin by marriage, in 1669. With Nathaniel Wood, "Bro: George Bonum" went to Taunton to represent the Plymouth Church at the ordination of Rev. Samuel Danforth, 21 Sept. 1687. There was a George Bonham who sailed for America, 20 June 1635, in the same ship with a John Gorham. His age is given as thirty-one and if correct he can not be the same man for the Plymouth records say: "George Bonan Senior deseaced Aprill 27th 1704, being upward of 85 yer of Age".

George Bonham lived in that part of Plymouth that became Plympton in 1707 and was again set off as a part of Carver in 1790. His burial lot is in the old cemetery now in Carver. He left no Will but the land records establish his family. Ten acres of land were laid out to "George Bunum Juner" belonging to a meadow his father had

on the 7 Oct. 1701.

MORTON

GEORGE MORTON, the founder of the Morton family in America, was probably born in Harworth, Nottingham, England, an adjoining parish to Bawtry, Nottingham, and Austerfield, York. There was a family of Mortons there at the time and it is known that he was associated with William Bradford in his early life. "George Morton, merchant, from York in England, accompanied by Thomas Morton, his brother, and Roger Wilson, his acquaintance, with Juliana Carpenter, maid from Bath in England, accompanied by Alexander Carpenter, her father, and Alice Carpenter, her sister, and Anna Robinson her acquaintance", were married in Leyden, Holland, 2 Aug. 1612, the banns being published 6 July 1612 (p. 285).

George Morton came in the "Ann" in 1623 and was assigned eight houselots with Experience Mitchell. He brought with him his wife and five children. He served the Colony in an official capacity and is called by one authority, "The Agent", of those of his sect in London. He is believed to have been the author of "Mourts Relation", an early account of New England, published in London in 1622. He was evidently a man of worth and it is unfortunate that his services to the Colony were ended by his untimely death in June 1624, at the

age of thirty-nine.

In 1669, his son, Nathaniel Morton, wrote a history of New England called "New England's Memorial", and in it under the year 1623 he states: "About fourteen days after came in the ship, called the Ann, whereof Mr. William Pierce was master. Two of the principal passengers that came in this ship were Mr. Timothy Hatherly and Mr. George Morton. . . The latter of the two forenamed, namely Mr. George Morton, was a pious, gracious, servant of God, and very faithful in whatsoever public employment he was betrusted withal, and an unfeigned well willer, and according to his sphere and condition, a suitable promoter of the common good and growth of the plantation of New Plimouth; laboring to still the discontents that sometimes would arise amongst some spirits by reason of the difficulties of these new beginnings but it pleased God to put a period to his days soon after his arrival in New England, not surviving a full year after his coming ashore. With much comfort and peace he fell asleep in the Lord, in the month of June, anno 1624". His widow married (2), Manasseh Kempton, and died 19 Feb. 1664, aged eighty-one years.

CARPENTER

ALEXANDER CARPENTER, who is the ancestor of so many Americans, through the marriages of his daughters, apparently never came to America. He was in Leyden with the Pilgrims about 1611, and had gone there from Wrington, Somerset, England. Apparently he returned to Wrington later, as his daughter Mary was living there in 1664. William Bradford, who had married her sister, Alice, the widow of Edward Southworth, wrote to her, in that year, inviting her, since her mother had deceased and she was alone, to come to America and make her home with them, and addressed her at Wrington. She accepted the home thus offered her and outlived her sister by many years.

The Plymouth, Mass., records give as consecutive entries, although those preceding and following show that these were entered up much

later than they occurred, the following:

"Mistris Alse Bradford deceased the 27th March 1670.

Mistres Mary Carpenter deceased the 20th day of march 1687, being Entered into the 91 year of her age.

Mistris Precila Cooper desceased on the 28th of desember 1689 being Entered in to 92d yeare of her age"

The Plymouth Colony records give the date of Alice Bradford's death as the 26th Mar. 1670.

JENNEY

JOHN JENNEY, the progenitor of the Jenney family in New England, came to Plymouth in 1623. He had been associated with the Pilgrims in Leyden, Holland, for some years before the sailing of the "Mayflower". The records of Leyden give us the marriage of "John Jenney, single man, brewer's man, from Norwich in England, now dwelling at Rotterdam accompanied by Roger Wilson, his acquaintance, with Sarah Carey, single woman, from Moncksoon in England accompanied by Joanna Lyons her acquaintance", on 1 Nov. 1614.

He was granted fifty acres of land 5 Mar. 1637-8, "lying on the east side of the Six Mile Brook . . . to be a farme belonging to the towne of Plymouth and to be called by the name of Lakenhame". From 1636-1641, he served as Assistant to the Governor. In 1636, he was given the right to erect a gristmill and the privilege of making

salt. He traded with the Dutch, for several years.

land and fell asleep in the Lord".

The New England Memorial says of him: "One of the principal passengers that came in her (the ship 'Little James') was Mr. John Jenney who was a godly though otherwise a plain man yet singular for publicness of spirit setting himself to seek and promote the common good of the plantation of New Plymouth who spent not only his part of the ship (being part owner therof) in the general concernment of the plantation, but also afterwards was a leading man in promoting the general interest of this colony. He lived many years in New Eng-

He made his Will, 28 Dec. 1643, and his inventory was filed 25 May 1644 so he died between the two dates. "I John Jenney of New Plymouth . . . do think meete to settle that estate the Lord in Mercy hath bestowed me. . . . I do give unto my oldest sonne Samuel Jenney a double portion. . . . I give unto Sarah my loving wife whom I ordain my Executrix. . . . Also whereas Abigail my oldest daughter had somewhat given her by her grandmother and Henry Wood of Plymouth is a sutor to her in way of marriage my will is that if she the said Abigail will dwell one full year with Mr. Charles Chauncey of Scituate before her marriage . . that then my said daughter Abigail . . . have my full consent to marry the said Henry Wood . . . the rest of my children viz John Abigail Sarah and Susanna. . . . My worthy friends Mr. Wm Bradford now Governor of Plymouth and Mr. Thomas Prence . . . Executors . . . I have hereunto sett my hand & seal the xx viiith December Anno dom 1643.

Sarah (Carey) Jenney survived her husband and died between the 12 Aug. 1655 and 18 Feb. 1655-6. "Aprill the 4th 1654 Mris Sarah Jeney of Plymouth being sicke and weake in body . . . think good to Despose of som smale thinges that is my owne proper goods leaving my husbands will to take place according to the true Intent and meaning thereof; I bequeath to my Daughter Pope my bed and furniture therunto belonging one bolster two pillows and pillowbeers three blanketts one old Rugg one paire of sheets, further I bequeath to my Daughter Sarah Pope all my wearing Clothes to Despose of them to my Daughter Abigaill Wood and to my grandchild Sarah Wood as they have need excepting two of my petticoats which have not been worne which I give to my Daughter Sarah Pope for her paines further I bequeath to my son Samuell Jeney and to my Daughter Abigaill Wood my Mare equally to bee Devided between them; further I bequeath to my son Benjamin Bartlett all my pte of Cattle that is in the hands of Josepth Warren. . . . Aug. 18, 1655, she added a codicil to the Will, making more specific bequests, and makes her "loving ffrinds capt: Standish Elder Cushman Thomas Clarke and Thomas Pope to bee the overseers". The Will was proved 5 Mar. 1655.

SAMUEL ² JENNEY (John ¹), born in Leyden, Holland, about 1616, died in Dartmouth, between 22 Nov. 1685 and 16 Apr. 1692; married Anne Lettice, daughter of Thomas and Anne Lettice (289).

Samuel Jenney spent the early years of his life in Plymouth. 6, 1633, Sam Jenny the sonne of John Jenney by the consent of the said John hath bound himself apprentis to Kanelm Winslow of Plymouth, joyner for the full term of fouer yeares during wch time the said Samuel shall doe faithful service as becometh an apprentice to the said Kanelm."

In 1635 he served in Lieut. Holmes' company against the Pequot Indians. He was surveyor of highways, 3 June 1657, constable of Acushnet, 3 June 1662, and served on a coroner's jury in 1678. He removed to Dartmouth before 1685, and in that year he deeds land to his son Samuel in Dartmouth and mentions in the deed "his mother my wife". The 23 Nov. 1685 he deeds lands for love to son Lettice, son John, son Mark and son Job.

He made his Will the 25 Nov. 1685, proved 16 Apr. 1692. He gave his estate to his wife Anne for life and then to sons John, Job, Samuel, Lettice and Mark, and daughters, Susannah, Elizabeth and Ruth.

LETTICE

THOMAS LETTICE was in Plymouth before 1636. He was a carpenter and was made Freeman of Plymouth Colony 6 June 1653. He served on the jury and was a town officer. His only son died in childhood. His wife, whose name was Anne, died in Plymouth, 2 July 1687, aged eighty-one years.

John Cooke, Sr., sold him a house and garden, the 2 Aug. 1653, and on this same day, Thomas and Ann Savory apprenticed their son Thomas Savory, Jr., aged about five years, to him until the boy should be twenty-one years old. Thomas Lettice died between 25 Oct. 1681 and Oct. 1682.

He made his Will in 1678, the full date not being given, but swore to it 25 Oct. 1681 and it was proved Oct. 1682. "I Thomas Lettice of Plymouth . . . bequeath unto my three daughters viz Anne the wife of Samuell Jenney, Elizabeth Cooke widow; and Dorethy the wife of Edward Gray five shillings apeece." Wife Anne was to receive the residue and to be executrix.

BENSON

JOHN BENSON, aged thirty years, came in the ship "Confidence", 11 Apr. 1638, from Caversham, in Oxfordshire, England. He brought with him, his wife Marah and two children, John and Mary, both under four years of age. He settled at Hingham but removed to Hull. In 1645, with Anthony Eames, and others of Hingham, he petitioned the General Court at Boston for leave to settle at Whitehead Hill on account of long standing differences in Hingham. This petition was refused but it was about this time that he went to Hull, where he is mentioned as a townsman in 1662, 1671, and 1676, and called John Benson, Senior. He was proprietor of the gristmill in 1667.

John Benson died in Hull, 13 Jan. 1678. His wife Marah or Mary died 14 Dec. 1681.

"In the Name & ffearre of God Amen I John Benson Sen being but weake and decaying in bodily Strength yet in full & perfect understanding and memory and willing to Set my house in order respecting that portion of outward good things which the Lord hath betrusted me with I do therefore hereby make this writing my last Will and Testam^t. . . I do Inprimis Give and bequeath to my Son John and to my Son Joseph all my lands and Comons & orchard equally to bee distributed and divided betwixt them and my home lott that I bought with the dwelling houses on it do give to my Son Joseph and the other lott to John, and that house plot which I have already verbally given to my son Hall my will is that hee shall not sell it without giving my Son Joseph the refusall thereof and the meadows also to be divided betwixt them equally. To my son John I do give a double portion of all my movables after my wives decease and a single portion of all my movables to my Son Joseph after my wife decease. Moreover I doe will that my Son John and my Son Joseph shall pay legacies equally and alike to my daughters or theire Children, that is to Say, ffive pounds to my daughter Combs and five pounds to my daughter Hall and five pounds to the children of my daughter Shore deced----

"Item I leave and bequeath the use of my whole Estate both reall and personall to my wife Marah Benson, to bee at her ordering and dispose for her use and comfort during her naturall life And do constitute my beloved wife Sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testament And for the full confirmation of this Writing of my last Will and Testam^t I do hereunto Subscribe my hand and Seale

John × Benson."

"Joseph Benson presented this Inventory 25 Mar. 1679 at the time of the probate of the Will affirming that his mother the Exec* was lame and unable to come abroad."

"To bee annexed to the Will of John Benson, Sr."

"29 Dec. 1681. Marah Benson, sole Executrix of this within Written Will, being departed this life, full power and authority to administer all and singular the goods Estate and credit of the Testator John Benson Senior is committed to his two Sons John Benson and Joseph Benson, etc."

A true inventory of the movables of the Estate of John Benson Senior which he left to his widow who deceased 14 Dec. 1681—£64 03s. 6d. taken 3 Jan. 1681. Joseph Benson adm^r swore to the Inventory.

Bond. "John Benson of Oxford in the Colony of New Plymouth Joseph Benson and Joseph Prince of Hull" give bond since Marah Benson, relict and Sole executrix of the Will of John Benson Senior, late of Hull, is departed this life and the abovesaid John and Joseph Benson are appointed administrators of their father. Undated, but evidently Jan. 1681.

JOHN ² BENSON (John ¹), born about 1635, probably in Caversham, England, died in Rochester, Mass., 10 Mar. 1711. His wife was probably that Mary Benson who died in Rochester, 25 Feb. 1711. (Rochester was for awhile after its incorporation in Barnstable County, where the land records have been burned. This loss makes it impossible to learn much of John Benson of Rochester.)

He left no Will and of his family only the children proved by the following deeds are known to have been his.

JOSEPH ³ BENSON (John ², John ¹), born probably in Hull, Mass., before 1670, died in Rochester, Mass., 9 July 1737; married (1), in Sandwich, Mass., 20 Aug. 1695, Charity Clapp, daughter of Increase and Elizabeth (Bursley) Clap (p. 233), who died in Rochester, 8 Feb. 1697-8. He married (2), in Rochester in 1699, Deborah Smith, born, probably in Taunton, died in Rochester, 22 Jan. 1710-11. He married (3), about 1712, Lydia ———, who survived him. Joseph Benson apparently lived all his life in Rochester.

Plymouth Co. Deeds, 16: 48. Joseph Benson of Rochester, sells land in Rochester, to John Briggs. Lydia, wife of Joseph Benson, releases her dower, 2 Sept. 1718.

Administration on the estate of Joseph Benson, late of Rochester, deceased, intestate, granted to Lydia Benson, his widow and relict, 28 July 1737. Sureties, Samuel Wing and John Allen. Witnesses: Sarah Winslow, Mary Winslow. Inventory of £671, filed 14 Sept. 1737.

Noah Sprague of Rochester, appointed guardian unto Priscilla Benson daughter of Joseph Benson (Jun.) late of Rochester, deceased, minor under 14, 20 Apr. 1738.

In the account of settlement of the estate are the following items of interest, "bed in dispute being given his daughter", "Another bed that was given to ye daughter that was married before his decease & not carried away". "Mary Ellis, claims as due her as Administratrix part I think but not all here due, I pray the Honr'd Judge's advice on it." (Mary was the widow of Aquilla Benson, son of Joseph, and his administratrix.)

The proprietors' records of Rochester give under date of 5 May 1740, 14 acres and 99 rods laid out to the heirs of Joseph Benson, dec'd, those mentioned being, Priscilla Benson, daughter of Joseph Benson, Jr. dec'd, and Aquilla Benson, son of Aquilla Benson, dec'd,

who was son of Joseph Benson, Sr., dec'd, and Deborah Austen, granddaughter of Joseph Benson, laid out at request of Noah Sprague, guardian of Priscilla and Aquilla and agent to Deborah.

COX

WILLIAM COX, the earliest ancestor to whom this family of Cox can be undoubtedly traced, was living in Newcastle County, Delaware, before 1721. He was probably there much earlier, and may possibly have been born there, but owing to the paucity of record it is impossible to prove it. The probability is that he was son of an earlier William Cox, who with wife Amy was also living in Newcastle County, and who conveyed land to this William Cox in 1734. This is so probable that it is assumed in the following pedigree to be correct, although it is impossible to prove it. It is known that William Cox, the proven ancestor had at least one brother in this country and probably more.

WILLIAM ¹ COX, born probably about 1660, married AMY——, and was living in Newcastle County, Delaware, in 1719. He is called both yeoman and laborer in different records. He is first mentioned in the land records in 1719, as the following deeds show:

Newcastle County, Delaware, Deeds, S. 1, 32. 25 May 1719. William Cox, yeoman, Newcastle County, conveys to Jacob Stilly of same, land on the North side of Christiana Creek, formerly belonging to Justass Cock. Signed by mark.

G. 1, 115. 10 May 1721. William Aubrey of London, Great Britain, merchant, and Letitia his wife, parties of the first part, Samuel Logan of Philadelphia, merchant, Rees Thomas of Philadelphia, parties of the second part and William Cocks of Newcastle County, Delaware, yeoman. The deed recites that William Penn granted the Manor of Henning, on the South side of Brandywine Creek, said Manor being partly in Newcastle County, Delaware, and partly in Chester County, Pennsylvania, to his daughter Letitia, who later became Letitia Aubrey, the wife of William Aubrey, and that it was part of this Manor that was conveyed to William Cocks and was located in Newcastle County.

G. 1, 226. 10 July 1721. Another conveyance between the same parties

for more land in the same Manor and in Newcastle County.

H. 1, 25. 16 Nov. 1725. Henry Dickeson of Newcastle County, yeoman, and Ruth, his wife, conveys to William Cox of Newcastle County, yeoman; recites the deed by James Logan and Rees Thomas, Attorneys for William Aubrey and Letitia, his wife, dated 8 Nov. 1725, conveying land to Henry Dickeson being part of land located partly in Newcastle County, Delaware, and partly in Chester County, Pa., which William Penn granted to his daughter Letitia Penn, and which land in this deed Henry Dickeson conveys to William Cox, being land in Newcastle County.

I. 1, 149. 20 Nov. 1729. Robert Reynolds, of Cecil County, Maryland, cordwainer, son of Robert Reynolds, late of the city of Newcastle in New-

castle County, Del., gentleman, deceased, and William Kellum of Brandywine Hundred, Newcastle County, yeoman, and Mary his wife, daughter of the said deceased, convey land in Beaver St., in the town of Newcastle and county of Newcastle to William Cox of Newcastle.

K. 1, 293. 21 Dec. 1734. John Embly and Thomas Embly of Newcastle County convey to William Cox, laborer, of Newcastle County, land on the

West side of the Delaware, on the North side of Christiana Creek.

K. 1, 297. 4 Jan. 1734-5. William Cox of the town of Newcastle, laborer, and Amy, his wife convey to John VanLeavenigh, land on Beaver Street in the town of Newcastle, being the same land that was conveyed by Robert Reynolds, William Kellum and Mary his wife, on 16 May 1732, to the said William Cox. William and Amy Cox both sign by mark.

K. 1, 295. 19 Feb. 1734-5. William Cox of Newcastle County, yeoman, and Amy his wife, convey to William Cox, farmer, of O'Casson (Hockesson in Mill Creek Hundred) land in Newcastle County on the Christiana Creek, being land conveyed to him, 21 Dec. 1734, by John and Thomas Embly.

William and Amy Cox sign by mark.

William Cox died before 15 Feb. 1742-3, for in that year there was filed in the Orphans' Court (C. 1, 18) by John Cox, administrator of William Cox, late of White Clay Creek Hundred, in Newcastle County, deceased, a paper showing that the personal estate of the said deceased was insufficient to pay all his debts, and praying that his real estate might be sold to satisfy his creditors. The Court ordered so much of his real estate sold as would be sufficient for the purpose and ordered the administrator to make a return to the Orphans' Court to be held the third Tuesday in April next and to make return and final settlement of said personal estate. John Cox, of White Clay Creek Hundred, administrator of the estate of his father, William Cox, deceased, conveyed to William Patterson on 18 May 1743, a portion of the Penn Tract. The deed speaks of the Orphans' Court proceedings but does not mention from whom William Cox acquired the land. (Deeds, N. 1, 544.) On 17 Aug. 1743 the Court records that John Cox administrator of the estate of William Cox, late of this county, deceased, came into court and produced the accounts of his administration and it was approved. He had left a balance of £4. 4. 4., to be disposed of according to law, and was discharged by the Court.

The probable children of William Cox are:

i. John ², b. about 1686, his father's executor. There are so many Coxes of the name of John that it is impossible to clear them, but it is probable that this John Cox m. Jane (Jones) Phillips, 25-9m-1717 in Abington monthly meeting, was prominent in Warrenton meeting and finally removed to Cane Creek.* Ken-

*There was another John Cox in the Kennett meeting, whose certificate from Old England was accepted there 10-2m-1710; he is called John Cox, Jr., and is called Junior until 1733. He was evidently an erring brother, for he is disciplined for drunkeness and for not paying his debts, etc., and, in 1732, he with his wife are helped by the meeting, as they were in need, had no house to live in and the committee for their relief ordered one built for them. He was probably the John who married 8-8m-1720 Hannah Jettkins. As a John Cox, Sr., is not mentioned in the Kennett records it seems as if he were called "junior" because of the presence of John, son of William.

nett meeting records the granting of a certificate to John Cox to Cane Creek in North Carolina, 10-7m-1755. He probably had son John, and others. (Benjamin who m. Martha Garretson may have been his son.)

- ii. RICHARD 2, b. about 1688, m. (1) before 26-2m-1712, MARGARET POTTS, who died in 1725. He m. (2), then of Londongrove, yeoman, 15-10m-1726, ELIZABETH SCARLETT, and removed to Warrenton monthly meeting. He had children, by first wife, Nathaniel and others; by second wife, Anna, Sarah, Richard, Jonathan, Joseph and Benjamin, John.
- iii. WILLIAM, b. about 1692; m. CATHERINE ———.
- iv. Thomas, b. about 1694; m. Elizabeth Fincher, by whom he had three children: Hannah, m. James Musgrove, 13-4m-1739; Rebecca, m. James Fraser, 22-8m-1740; Isaac, m. Olive Underwood, 27-9m-1746. Abington m. m. granted a certificate to Thomas Cox and wife to settle within verge of Nottingham and Newgarden m. m. 28-2m-1729. Mary Newlin of Chester Co., Pa., in 1730 leaves in Will, to sister Elizabeth Cox's three children, and makes father, John Fincher, and brother, Francis Fincher, exes.; and John Fincher of Londongrove, in 1746, bequeaths to "Thomas Cox, living over Susquehanna, £5 for use of his daughter Rebecca, wife of James Fraiser". Thomas seems to have lived in Manchester and Londongrove and to have attended Warrenton m. m. at one time. Isaac Cox was granted a certificate for himself and wife Olive, to North Carolina.

v. Amy, b. about 1698; m. in 1719 John Allen at Kennett. Later she requested a certificate to New Garden m. m. 5 month 1728. There were probably others.

WILLIAM ² COX (William ¹), was born probably about 1692, died in Orange Co., N. C., between 20 Jan. and 15 Feb. 1767; married about 1716, CATHERINE ———, who died before him.

William Cox lived in Newcastle County, Delaware, but so near the Pennsylvania line that it seems probable that part of his farm extended into this latter state. The earliest meeting records extant of this section are the Kennett or "Newark in Kennett". There was an earlier meeting in Newcastle County but the records appear to have vanished and there is little in the Kennett records until about the time this family emigrated to North Carolina. About 1750 a large number of Quakers removed to North Carolina and settled in various sections of the state but chiefly in the central portion. William Cox evidently removed there about 1752, and settled in the Deep River section which then fell in Orange County, but afterwards was a part of Grayson County.

In 1730, the monthly meeting was held at the home of William Cox, at Hockessen in Mill Creek Hundred, in Newcastle County. The first settlers were John Baldwin, William Cox and the Irish Friends,

Henry and John Dixon. (Immigration of Irish Quakers into Pennsylvania, p. 121.) In the account of William ¹ Cox, is given a deed from William Cox and Amy to this William of Hockessen in 1734 (p. 295).

Newcastle County deeds, I, 1, 386. 16 Nov. 1730. John Garrett of New Castle County, yeoman, and Margaret his wife to William Cox, yeoman, of Newcastle County. Deed recites the William Penn grant to his daughter, Letitia Aubrey, etc., and deed from Logan and Thomas to William Mt. Macken, which land William Mt. Macken and Jennet his wife conveyed to John Garrett, and which John Garret now conveys to William Cox. (Land, part of the Manor of Henning.)

N. 1, 264. 25 Sept. 1741. Benjamin Fredd of New Garden, Chester Co., yeoman, and Deborah his wife, convey to William Cox, yeoman, land that was formerly conveyed by William Penn to his daughter, and by the daughter's attorney to Mt. Macken, and by him to John Garret, and by him to

Benjamin Fredd.

N. 1, 281. 16 Nov. 1741. William Cox, yeoman, and Catherine, his wife convey to John Dixson, part of the Penn tract, being same lands conveyed to said Cox, by deed N. 1, 264, from Benjamin Fredd and wife. This deed is signed by William Cox, not by mark.

In spite of the fact that William Cox must have been a member of the Kennett meeting for some years there is little mention of him in the records. Several of his children's marriages are given, and the births of some grandchildren. It is evident that he went to North Carolina before 1754 and it may have been earlier than 1752; his son William was given a certificate there in 1752, and they probably went there together. However, he was not granted a certificate there until 1758, although he had asked for one.

From our Monthly meeting of Newark held at Kennett in the County of Chester Province of Pennsylvania 7th of 1st m^o 1758 to the Monthly meeting at Cane Creek in North Carolina.

Whereas application was made to our Meeting on behalf of William Cox sen. for a certificate to recomend him to the care of your meeting, he being for several years removed within the compass thereof—These may therefore certify you on his behalf, that after the usual inquirie made We find that he left these parts in reputable circumstances was a diligent attender of meetings for many years, and as a member amongst us we think him worthy of the notice and care of friends—So with desire for his temporal and eternal welfare and the prosperity of the Churches of Christ everywhere, We conclude in the Gosple of fellowship and remain your loving friends. Signed in and on behalf of our said meeting.

On 11 June 1754, William Cox received two grants of land, one of 520 acres on the east side of Deep River, and the other the same number of Acres on the west side of the river (Land Grants of N. C., 14: 363, 377). On the same day he received an additional grant on the west side of 400 acres (14: 378); 13 May 1755, he was granted

586 acres on the west side (14: 377); 14 June 1756, he asked for 350 acres "Beginning at three Sweet Gums by New Hope", which was granted, 1 Aug. 1760 (14: 380); 13 Nov. 1756, he received 487 acres on little Brush Creek (14: 368); 5 Nov. 1757, two grants were made him, one of 205 acres on both sides of Deep River and the other 375 acres on the head of Cox's Mill Creek. Besides these grants he purchased land in the Deep River Section.

Orange County Deeds, 1: 86. 10 Sept. 1755. James Denny of Orange Co., N. C., sells to William Cox of same county, 70 acres, part of a tract granted to Denny by the Earl of Granville. Wit: Wm Reed John McGee. 1: 44. 4 Sept. 1755. William Piggott, sadler, conveys to William Cox,

planter, certain lands granted him by the Earl of Granville, 100 acres.

4: 558. "Indenture made the 5th November in the year of our Lord, one thousand seven hundred and fifty seven, Between the Right honourable John, Erle Granville, Visecount Cartret & Barron Cartret of Hawns in the County of Bedford in the Kingdom of grate Brittain Lord president of his Majesties most honourable privy Council & knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter on the one part and William Cox, in trust for Samuel Allen, of Orange County in the provence of North Carolina on the other part . . . all that tract or parcel of Land Lying & being in the parish of St. Matthews in the County of Orange on Both sides of Cockses Creek the Watters of Deep River, Beginning at Harmon Cocks Corner", for yearly rent of 15 shillings, etc.

William Cox became by grant and purchase the owner of a very large estate, and with the holdings of his sons, who also received Colonial grants, must have owned a large section of the county. local name of this section was Cox's Mills and it was evidently at some distance from the Cane Creek meetinghouse, for in 1762 the Freeman of the Lower settlement in Deep River request privilege of meetings which was granted, but 2d-11m-1765, a complaint was made that these meetings were dropped, which Cane Creek meeting investigated and finding the report was true the Indulgence was removed 2-12m-1765. William Cox and his five sons were sturdy pioneers and for Quakers, none too meek. Some of the first mutterings of the Revolution were heard in this section and before William's death, meetings in opposition to the Crown officers were held in which the Cox boys were prominent. The leader of the opposition, Herman Husbands, was not at first a Friend, but became one. The Cane Creek Meeting records that "at a monthly meeting held the 7th of 2 mo 1767, William Cox, William Cox jr., Isaac Vernon, Isaac Cox, Samuel Cox, Solomon Cox and Jacob Grey complained of in the 9th mo last for attending the disorderly marriage of Emy Allen, now Husbands and after repeated labour with each of them this meeting now disowns each of them". They were all reinstated later.

The men who thus early resisted tyranny were called "The Regulators", because in the beginning they became affiliated in order to

try and obtain regular and less extortionate fees from the Crown officers, but their movement grew until armed resistance was offered the government in the battle of Alamance, in 1771. The prisoners taken by Governor Tryon were held as traitors and some of them condemned to death, but later a petition was sent to Earl Hillsboro from Fort George, New York, asking him to pardon certain men convicted of High Treason at Hillsboro Superior Court and among these men was Harmon 3 Cox. This man was William's eldest son and is known in History as "the Regulator". It was at the Cox Homestead that the meetings of the Regulators were held. It is not probable that William 2 was very active for he must have been over seventy years of age, but his three sons Harmon 3, William 3 and Solomon 3 appear again and again in the deliberations. (Colonial Records of N. C.)

20 Aug. 1766. At a meeting of the Neighborhood of Deep River, it was unanimously agreed to appoint William Cox and William Moffit to attend a general meeting on the first Monday before Nov. Court at Maddox Mill.

30 Apr. 1768. Regulators advertisement No. 8, signed by William Cox, Simon Dixon. They petition the Court the same day and Solomon Cox is a signer of the petition.

21 May 1768. Wm Moffit, William Cox, Harman Cox, et al., appointed to draw up a petition of Regulators and to meet at house

of Harmon Cox on Deep River.

7 May 1768. William Cox testifies at Orange Court that he paid £2 10s. 4d., for letters of Administration, last February, was a year at Court and never has received them although application has been made by sundry messengers for them. (This is evidently his father's estate.)

Beginning for the Devision between him & my son Thomas at a Sycamond or Button wood tree on the River bank a little below my fence marked with three Notches on the West side of the River from thence running west Leading down to the mill creek . . . as also that whole tract of land Lying on the Mill Creek containing two hundred & twenty-five acres. . . . Item, I give to my son Solomon Cox that whole tract of Land lying on little Brush Creek where Benjamin Williams formerly lived, where my son Solomon now lives to him and his heirs forever. . . . Item, I give to my son Thomas Cox the Remaining part of the aforesaid tract of land I now live on . . . as also One hundred & Eighty acres of that tract my brother formerly lived on. Item I give to my five sons, Harmon, William, John, Solomon & Thomas two tenths of the land & mines & tools equally Divided lying on Crawfords Road on the Round Mountain. . . . Item, I leave to my daughter Rebecca Dixon in pensylvania five Shillings Sterling. Item, I leave to my daughter Mary Lindly, wife to James Lindly five Shillings sterling. Item, I leave the living stock as they now are with those that have them a keeping. Item, I leave my Daughter Martha Terrel, wife of William Terrel three pounds. Item, I leave my Daughter Marjory Nicholas, wife of Isaac Nicholas, three pounds. Item, I leave my daughter Catherine Hunt wife to Eliezer Hunt three pounds. Item, I leave to each of my five sons, Harmon, William, John, Solomon & Thomas, three pounds each. Item, I leave the rest of my estate both real & personal in this province or elsewhere to the Disposal of my Executors & I do appoint my trusty & well beloved Son & Cousin William Cox & Isaac Cox my sole executors of this my last will & Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & Seal this 20th day of the first month 1767." Wit: John Cox, William Moffitt, John Allen. Proved at Hillsboro, the second Tuesday in February 1767.

Guilford County Deeds, 1: 93,* 10 Dec. 1771. William Cox, (Late of Guilford Co.) and Isaac Cox of Guilford Co., N. SOLOMON ³ COX was born in Newcastle Co., Delaware, probably in Hockessing, about 1730, and died in Ross Co., Ohio, in 1812. married between 1753 and 1761, NAOMI —, who died after 1795 and probably before 1799. It is possible that he may have married first a RUTH ——— but there is nothing to prove this.*

Solomon Cox evidently removed with his father to Cane Creek. In fact the whole family may have gone together but did not apply for their certificates until they were individually sure of staying there. On 7-4m-1753 application was made to Newark in Kennett m. m. for a certificate for Solomon and Thomas Cox to be joined to a monthly meeting in North Carolina.

"From our Monthly meeting of Newark held at Kennett in the County of

Chester & Province of Pensilvania the 5th of ye 5th mo 1753-

"To ye Monthly meeting of Cane Creek or elsewhere in North Carolina these — Dear Friends — Application being made to our meeting for some lines by way of certificate from us to you in behalf of Solomon & Thomas Cox they being about to move from amongst us in order to settle within the verge of your meeting or some other monthly meeting of friends in North Carolina

Wit: Ruth, Solomon, jr., Nathan Dixon, Solomon Cox, Thomas Cox, Sarah Cox, Harmon Cox, Jane Cox. If Solomon the father, who must have been born by 1740, was identical with Solomon 3, it is probable that Ruth would be called in this record "Ruth, deceased". The two men are probably not the same. There is still another Solomon Cox who appears in the records of Cane Creek Meeting. He had a wife Amy, and although this name is used interchangeably with Naomi, the two families do not appear to be the same. The Cane Creek meeting "enters a complaint against Solomon Cox for purchasing & selling without consent of friends and they were to be in Disunity with him until he condemn his proceedings and his wife and children are to sign also", 5-2m-1780; he complied and was forgiven. "There was a certificate made out at this meeting (2-12m-1780) on the second month last for Emey Cox and her children, family of Solomon Cox, and sent to Warrenton. m. m. in Pennsylvania and by accounts received from there they have removed from thence and settled within the Verge of New Garden m. m. in N. C. and for that reason friends of Warrenton have returned the certificate to this meeting. Her certificate

It is of course possible that Solomon, with wife Ruth, may be the same man as Solomon with wife Amy, who must also have been born about 1740, but it is impossible that Solomon with wife Amy must also have been born about 1740, but it is impossible that Solomon with wife Amy could be identical with Solomon and wife Naomi, for the lists of children are totally dissimilar. In 1778 or about that time, family tradition shows Solomon to be about to remove to Virginia.

These may therefore Certifie on their behalf that usual inquirie hath been made concerning them and we do not find but that they have been of orderly conversation, frequenters of our Religious meetings for worship. Solomon also being clear from all marriage engagements as far as we know. Thomas being but young in years less may be said concerning him, & as such we recommend them to your Christian care & oversight, Delivering their growth and prosperity in the unchangeable truth we conclude and remain your friends & Brethren —— Signed in & on behalf of said meeting by ——." Cane Creek records that Solomon and Thomas Cox produced a certificate from the monthly meeting of Newark in Kennett, 5-5-1753.

Warrenton monthly meeting: "Solomon Cox produced a certificate from Cane Creek, 8-11-1759, dated 6-2-1759". "Solomon Cox being about to return to North Carolina this meeting gave him a few lines on the back of his certificate." This may refer to the other Solomon Cox but he would be rather

young (p. 303).

With John, Harmon, Naomi and Hannah Cox, Solomon witnessed a marriage at Cane Creek in 1761. He received land from his father in 1767. In 1768, he appears in the troubles with the Regulators, signing a petition on 30 April, in that year and having a claim in Court in 1773. There is no record of active participation in the Revolutionary struggle by Solomon Cox, but David Fanning, a noted Tory, made his headquarters near Cox's Mills, and in his diary (1775–1783) he speaks of "the battle at Coxes Mills, Deep River near Chatham Court House". 10 Dec. 1781, Col. Isaacs formed his Camp at Coxe's Mills in order to take Fanning but was unsuccessful and after Isaac's departure Fanning "burnt Capt. Coxe's house and his Fathers". In 1782, Fanning tried to arrange terms of surrender and asks that the two Coxe's Mills be freed from Americans. One can hardly expect that Solomon was not active in some of this warfare, even if, as a good Quaker, he was not enrolled as a soldier.

There is a tradition in the family that he went to western Virginia before the War, surveyed a plot of land and asked for the grant of it, and made up his mind to remove there, which he did at the close of that memorable struggle. He settled on a tract of land, which may have been a grant from the government or which he may have purchased. He applied in 1783 for a large grant of land in the same section which was granted him but the grant was not issued until The original parchment signed by Henry Lee, then Governor of Virginia, (p. 305) is still in existence and is owned by Rufus Edgar Cox, of Galax, Va., who also possesses the deed of gift from Solomon Cox to Enoch Cox, his eldest son, of this same property, in 1799. Just before the grant was signed, he sold the other property and after establishing Enoch on the home farm, he went back to Chatham County, N. C., where he remained for awhile. He then removed to Ross County, Ohio, where his son Joseph had gone earlier and died at the home of this son in 1812. The property in Virginia was in

Cole Creek a branch of Chestnut Creek a branch of New River. . . ." Signed by Solomon Cox, witnessed by Samuel Cox, John Dixon et al. (Naomi does not sign and it is probable she had deceased.)

When Solomon Cox made his Will in 1810 he was about eighty years old and had evidently become of unsound mind. It is probable that the children he mentions are correctly named and that he had any others is unlikely.

"In the name of god amen I Solomon Cox of Ross County & State of Ohio Considering the uncertainty of this Mortal life & being of Sound & perfect mind & Memory Blessed Be almighty God for The Same doo Make & publish this My last will & Testament in Manner & form following that is to Say: First it is My will and Desire that amediately after my Decease my Executors Hereafter named doo Collect all Debts Due & oweing to me & Pay all my Just Debts after which I will & Bequeath unto my son Solomon one Tract of land laying in the State of Verginnia In the County of Greason & on the waters of Chestnut Creek Itum I Give & Bequeath to my Son Enoch one hundred dollars & to my Daughter Catherine one hundred dollars and to my daughter Ruth one hundred dollars—and to Eli Bray one hundred dollars—And to the widow of my Son Samiel ten Shillings-The Children of my Son Samuel hath already Received one hundred & Eight Dollars and Eighty Seven Cents which is their full share of my Estate at present—and to the widow of my Son William ten shillings And to the Children of my Son William one hundred Dollars To my daughter Mary ten Shillings—and to the Children of my Daughter Mary one hundred Dollars—and to My Son Joseph one hundred Dollars and to My grandson Nathan Cox fifty Dollars—and to my son Jesse one Hundred Dollars-And all the Rest & Residue of my Estate of whatsoever kind It May Be or where ever it May Be found

And lastly I doo hereby Constitute and appoint my Son in law William Cox of the State of North Carrolina & Randolf County & Eli Bray of the Same State & County Executors of My affairs which May Be to Settle in the State of North Carrolinah: and my Grand Son Nathan Cox and William Hixon (Dixon?) Executors of this My Last will and Testement of the State of Ohio Revokeing all other former Wills by Me made in witness whereof I have hereunto Set My hand & Seal this thirteenth Day of September In the year of our

Lord one thousand Eight hundred & ten.

"Sol. Cox Will, Decr Term 1812. produced to Court & Set aside, Evidence Testifying that Testator was not of Sound mind."

The witnesses themselves testified that when they witnessed the Will they believed Solomon Cox was not of sound mind, memory and judgement. The Court ordered the Will filed for the perusal and use of all concerned or interested.

Chatham County, N. C., deeds, L: 283. 18 Apr. 1799. Solomon Cox of Chatham County N. C., conveys to William Cox of Randolph County, N. C., tract of land in Chatham County, on little Brush Creek on Deep River, containing 300 acres, part of land willed to the said Solomon Cox by his father William Cox, who obtained the same from the Earl of Granville by grant dated 13 Nov. 1756.

U: 238. 28 Aug. 1815. Enoch Cox of Grayson Co., Va., William Cox and Ruth his wife of Randolph County, N. C., and Joseph Cox, of Ross Co., Ohio, they being part of the heirs of Solomon Cox, deceased and empowered by the rest of the heirs and by law to dispose of the property, convey to William Cox Sr., a parcel of land on little Brush Creek, waters of Deep River, containing 187 acres more or less, being the remaining part of a tract of land willed to Solomon Cox by his father William Cox and descended by inheritance to the aforesaid Enoch, William and Ruth, and Joseph and the rest of the heirs.

A Solomon Cox appears in the Census of 1790 as of Hillsboro District, Chatham Co., N. C., with three males above sixteen, none below, and three females, and Samuel of same place, with one male above sixteen, one below sixteen, and three females. These were probably the sons of Solomon ³, who was in Virginia, where the Census is lost, in 1790.

ENOCH ⁴ COX (Solomon ³, William ², William ¹), was born in the Deep River section, Chatham Co., N. C., about 1757, and died in Grayson Co., Va., 28 Mar. 1840. He married before 1-9m-1781, Mary Mackey, of the Yadkin River District in North Carolina. On that date the Cane Creek meeting disowned him for marrying out. She died in 1829, aged seventy-six years. He married (2) Sally Stoneman, daughter of Joshua and Elizabeth Stoneman, born 12-7m-

1797. The Stonemans were members of the Mt. Pleasant m. m. in Grayson County, Va. Sally (Stoneman) Cox died about 1855.

It is evident that Enoch was received back into the fold after his marriage and was again disowned for conduct unpleasing to the Quakers in 1793. There are no further items concerning him on the Friends Records of Cane Creek. He is supposed to have been a member of the Chestnut Creek meeting, Grayson Co., Va., but the book contains no mention of him or his family. With his wife Mary, he is buried in the yard of this meeting house, all of which is gone except the stone step. Stones have been erected to the memory of the pair.

"Mary wife of Enoch Cox Died in 1829 Age 76 years."

They sleep together on the top of the hill, while their descendants fill the valleys at its foot. It is beautiful, farming country, the red soil is fertile and the people who dwell on the banks of the creeks that flow into the New River are almost entirely of the race of Cox.

7: 49. 18 Apr. 1829. Enoch Cox, Sen., of Grayson County conveys to son Jeremiah Cox, land where "I now live".

8:13. 1 May 1838. Enoch Cox Sen., and Sally his wife of Grayson Co., convey land to John K. Suncock.

At the time Enoch Cox made his Will, he was very old, probably about eighty-one. In some way in his Will he invalidated the title of the property conveyed to Jeremiah Cox and so a friendly suit was taken to clear the title.

"I Enoch Cox Sr of the county of Grayson and commonwealth of Virginia being this day weak and infirm but of sound mind and memory do hereby

make and constitute this my last will and testament in manner and form following, that is to say: 1st I desire that all my lawful debts and funeral expenses be first paid. 2ndly I give and bequeath unto my eldest daughter Ruth Warren (Daughter of my former wife) one Dollar over and above what I have already given her. 3rdly I give unto my oldest son Nathan Cox (son of my former wife) one Dollar over and above what I have already given him heretofore. 4thly I give unto my second son Solomon Cox (son of my former wife) one Dollar over and above what I have given him heretofore. 5thly I give unto my third son Enoch Cox (son of my former wife) one Dollar over and above what I have already given him. 6thly I give unto my second daughter Polly Lovelady (daughter of my former wife) ten Dollars over and above what I have given her heretofore. 7thly I give unto my fourth son Jesse Cox (son of my former wife) one Dollar over and above what I have given him heretofore. 8thly I give unto my fifth and last son of my wife, Jeremiah Cox, two hundred acres of land lying on the north and west part of the plantation on which I now live including the house in which the said Jeremiah Cox resides over and above what I have already given him heretofore. 9thly My will is that all my real and personal estate be vested in the hands of my last wife Sally Cox and Mark D. Stoneman both my executors and to be by them applied in the best and most economical manner for raising and educating my last set of children, namely Joshua, Elizabeth, Nancy and John Cox, infant children of my last wife Sally Cox. 10thly I request that no inventory of my personal estate be taken and apprised and lastly I do hereby constitute the abovenamed Sally Cox (my wife) and Mark D. Stoneman, executors of my last will and testament revoking all other or former wills or testaments by me heretofore made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 21st of the 3rd mo. 1840." Proved at the April term, 1840.

Nathan Cox went first to Ross County, Ohio, about 1804,† probably to visit his uncle Joseph Cox. The record of his marriage is found among the county records of Ross County. The Dixon and Cox families migrated together, from Newcastle Co., Delaware, to

> Jefferson Township, Ross Co. O. March 23 1831

Dear Children:—

I enjoy one more privilege to take my pen in my hand to send you a few lines to inform you that we are all well at present except myself. My health, at present, is not very good, by a bad cold I caught last Saturday at William Kerns' barn raising, which was a very cold day. I hope these few lines may find you all in good health. I have nothing prosperous to write to you about this world of ours. I feel my bodily strength fails daily grows weakly and I am crumbling away to my mother dust. The time and place that knows me now, will ere long know me no more but glory to God! I hope that after this old body of mine has mouldered away to its mother dust, that I shall rise in

the full vigor of youth to praise my Redeemer, where I shall never grow old nor weary. Now my children my last advise (perhaps) to you is, that your first and great concern is to make your peace, calling and election sure—that if we never see each other in this world, we may see each other where parting will be no more.






There seems so strong a possibility that John Scott of Roxbury, may be identical with John, son of Benjamin Scott of Cambridge and Rowley, and is most certainly not the son of Benjamin Scott of Braintree, that it has been considered best to put, in an appendix, the first two generations of descendants of Benjamin Scott of Braintree, and six generations of descendants of Benjamin Scott of Rowley. The two Benjamin Scotts above mentioned are confused by Savage and other writers, but the records prove that there were two of the name. The supposition that John Scott, son of Benjamin of Rowley, was that John Scott of Ipswich who died in 1720, is disproved by the Will of the latter,* which shows plainly that he was not of kin to anyone of his name in New England.

There is also placed in this appendix a slight account of a Joseph Scott of Rowley, who may be of kin to Benjamin Scott.

His inventory and accounts prove him to have been a trader on a large scale and chiefly with people in Boston. The inventory amounted to about £330.

BENJAMIN SCOTT OF BRAINTREE, MASS.

BENJAMIN ¹ SCOTT was an early resident of Braintree, Mass. He died before 1647, for in that year, on the 21 September, an inventory of the goods of widow Scott, late wife of Benjamin Scott of Braintree, deceased, and now the wife of John Harbour of Braintree, was filed in Court, and Harbour gave a bond to secure payment to the children of their shares. On the 13 July 1654, administration on the estate of Benjamin Scott, late of Braintree, deceased, was granted to John Harbour and Hannah, his wife, late the wife of the said Benjamin Scott, in behalf of herself and her children. The estate was ordered divided: to the widow, one third; to the eldest son, a double portion; and to the rest of the children a single portion at marriage or at fourteen years. (Suffolk Co. Probate, 1: 173.)

Hannah, the wife of Benjamin Scott, who married second, John Harbour, died before 1677. 17 May 1677, administration on the estate of Hannah Harbour late of Braintree, deceased, was granted to Peter Scott and Christopher Webb. Her inventory was filed the 23 July 1677, and Christopher Webb swore it was a true inventory of his late mother-in-law, Hannah Harbour, deceased. (Suffolk Co. Parkette 10, 10)

"I, Benjamin Scott being weake in my body yet . . . whole in my mind . . . for that outward Estate woh God hath graciously given me, I give & dispose it into the hands of my Brother Peter Scott to enjoy . . . until his eldest Son is of one and twenty yeares of age, He then to have the one halfe of his houses and Lands as entayled Lands from him to his heirs forever. Or if God remove him by death without heirs, to fall to the next heir . . . of the sd Peter Scott. And if Benjamin Scott, the Son of Peter Scott, live to enjoy my houses and Lands after his Fathers decease, then he shall pay to his

Brother Peter Scott ten pounds & to his Brother John Scott five pounds. . . . I give to my Brother Peter Scott all my moveable goods . . . & . . . order him to pay as a Legacy from me . . . to my brother Christopher Webbs children . . . to be divided among them, to those that are of one and twenty yeares of age within two yeares after my decease and to the others as they come to the Same age. And I also appoint my Brother Peter Scott Execut^r of this my last will and Testam^t October 7 1683.

BENJAMIN ¹ SCOTT, date and place of birth unknown, died in Rowley, Mass., between 6 June and 26 Sept. 1671; married before 1643,* Margaret Stephenson, date and place of birth unknown, executed as a witch, in Rowley, 22 Sept. 1692.

"I, Benjamin Scott Being very weeake of Body but of competent understanding and memory doe make this my Last Will and Testament. Imprimis. I will and bequeath my Soule unto the hands of all mighty god that gave it and my body to the Earth in hope of a blessed resurection. And as for my outward estait, my will is that my littel peece of land the towne gave me at the bricke kill my wife have the benefit of it dureing her widdowhood so long as she remaine relique to me and after her I will and give it unto my son Beniamin. I will also and give unto hir my bigest cow and all my househould stufe I give hir to be wholly hir owne and at her will

Item. as for my daughter Mary, I will and give hir one cow that is called Spoferd. Item my will farther is that my son Beniamin, and John according to his promise be helpfull to the getting up of a house on the land for the comforth of ther mother. And I make my well beloved wife the solle executrix of this my last will and Testament.

Sarah Scott petitions, 29 Aug. 1748, to have certain men appointed to divide the real estate amongst the children of her late husband. Division, 4 Oct. 1748, to the widow; to Abigail, the eldest daughter; to Lydia, the second daughter; to Sarah, the third daughter; to Jean, the fourth daughter; and they all sign their acceptance.

The four daughters, on the 6 Oct. 1748, agree to the payment of £36 to the widow from their father's estate, it being hers, a legacy

JOSEPH SCOTT OF ROWLEY, MASS.

JOSEPH SCOTT was an early inhabitant of Rowley, Mass., being resident there before 1678. He was a tailor. His wife was named Anna and she is sometimes called "Hannah", in the records. In 1691, Joseph Scott was paid money on account of the services of Samuel Brown in the expedition in 1690 and a deed of land to him is witnessed by James Brown. James and Sarah (Cutting) Brown, had a daughter Anna under 18 in 1674, who is probably the Anna who married Joseph Scott. She had a brother James, born in 1653, and a brother Samuel, who died at sea, 15 Nov. 1690.

Joseph Scott died in Rowley, 19 Oct. 1692. His widow Anna married (2) at Newbury, 31 Aug. 1697, Mr. Richard Syle, who died 22 Feb. 1721-2, in Rowley, she having deceased previously, in the same town on 25 Jan. 1715.
